Special Council meeting held for **Land Use Bylaws**

Edson Town Council and Administration met with concerned citizens one final times on April 8, to discuss the new Land Use Bylaws (LUB).

After months of work, the LUB is now in its final draft. During this Special Meeting it was being presented to Council and the public for final input. Town Administration and consultant Urban Systems had representatives on hand to answer questions and record concerns. Together they presented the major changes made to the LUB between February 13, 2024, and March 29, 2024.

"Administration, along with Urban Systems, have invested a great amount of time into reviewing and revising the proposed draft of the LUB taking into consideration the feedback from the previous engagement sessions and Council, while ensuring the final product meets the guiding principles," they stated.

Special Council meeting held for Land Use Bylaws

There have been five stages of community engagement for this project. This special meeting was the final time for concerned landowners to voice issues before the LUB goes back to council for final deliberations. Some revisions have already been made to the LUB, including labeling updates to the zoning map and other changes, as feedback is being constantly considered.

Listed below are some notable changes from the current LUB, as laid out in the special meeting.

- Secondary Suites in multiple forms have been included in the R1 and R2 District
- No longer require a development permit for a home business, minor (business license will govern).
- Significantly reduced the number of parcels zoned Direct Control in favour of conventional land use districts consistent with the existing approved use on the properties.
- Increased options for shipping containers in non-residential land use districts.
- CBD-Central Business District applied to parcels along 50th Street between 1st and 6th Avenues.
- Variance provisions for Legal Non-Conforming building and/or use allowing for up to 10% of alteration.
- New variance provisions that provide clarity to the extent the Development Authority can vary a regulation under the proposed bylaw.

"One of the pieces that was important throughout this process was to always question the purpose behind the regulations," said

After the presentation, council opened the floor for citizens to voice their concerns. In accordance with the meeting agenda, preregistered concerns went first, followed by walk ins. Each presenter had six minutes to voice their concerns or comments. Approximately eight people presented, although there were many more present at the proceedings.

Several people voiced concerns over the same bylaw wording. The new LUB has changed the zones of many Heavy Industrial or Business Industrial zones in the Glenwood area. The new standards have changed the stipulations for surveillance or security units on industrial zoned property. Many business owners and their families live in dwellings classified as such. The new LUB has updated limitations for the unit size. While this wouldn't affect existing structures, it will cause issues for any future developments, renovations, or rebuilds. Most presenters recommended unrestricting the surveillance unit size altogether.

A local construction contractor also presented the concerns he had with the LUB. Mostly his concerns centered around building situations for residential zones that may adversely affect new developments. This includes new minimum setback for side yards and lot sizes for the building of duplexes. His concerns were received in writing by Council and Administration.

Yellowhead County also sent in a letter of concern to the meeting. These concerns included the specific zoning of certain land parcels. Several parcels have been labeled Business Industrial - Major, as opposed to their previous labeling of District Controlled. These land pieces have acreages west of the County which could be affected by development on that land. With the new zoning, residents would have no alert or ability to stop any development that begins there. The County recommends relabeling the zones lesser industrial.

Administration and Urban Systems will add the appropriate revisions from all the feedback. The LUB will then be brought back to Council for three readings before becoming official. Following the LUB adoption, Administration and Urban Systems will continue to monitor and track how it works. If required, they will make a list of potential amendments and report back to Council.

Town of Edson considers expansion of Backflow Preventer Program

During the Committee of the Whole meeting on April 9, Council was presented an update on the Backflow Preventer Program Pilot.

Council set aside \$50,000 for the program for 2023, which covered 50% of the cost of having a backflow device installed. Eligibility was on a first come basis for those affected by flooding, until the budget was depleted. It was created in response to the 2022 flood event that caused damages to 23 private properties.

The initial rollout saw nine homeowners apply and install backflow valves before June 2023. However, the major flood event in that same month, caused damage to over 90 private properties. Following this event, another 13 homes applied to have a backflow preventer installed. Of the \$50,000 budget, a total of \$23,857.40 was used for reimbursements.

After the 2022 events, Administration decided that more research had to be done to help understand, troubleshoot, and recommend solutions to limit or prevent damage to private properties during major flood events. The Utilities Department put out a Request for Quotes to local companies to complete private property plumbing inspections. Local Edson business, Truman Plumbing and Gas Fitting, was the successful proponent.

After reaching out to all landowners affected by flooding, 46 of them consented to sewer inspection services as offered by Truman Plumbing and Gas Fitting. From this process, the Town learned that 50% of the homes inspected had no backflow prevention device installed. Many of them also had an old model weeping

tiles that feed into the sewer lines. When weeping tile feeds into the sewer system, it is more likely to flood during a rain event as water overpowers the sewer system causing backflow. The remaining homes had both a backflow prevention device and a weeping tile/sump pump that were correctly installed. It's important to note that some of the homes with properly installed devices still experienced backups due to line pressure.

Both, Darin Borysko, Fleet & Utilities Manager for the Town of Edson, and Colin Truman of Truman Plumbing and Gas Fitting, presented their findings to council. They, and Town Administration, were seeking feedback from Council on making the pilot program a permanent program funded through Sewer Contracted Services as proposed in the 2024 Operating Budget. They also recommended an update and expansion to the program.

They proposed that the program reimburse owners for the installation of a backflow valve and a full sump pump. They also wanted to open the program to all residents of Edson and not just those who had experienced flooding. If Council approves the proposed operating budget for this program, the Communications department would inform landowners of the continuation and expansion of the program.

Following the presentation, Mayor Kevin Zahara asked Borysko if he believed that the \$50,000 allotted would be enough to cover the program after expansion. "Do you think that is a sufficient amount to include sump pumps in this program as well?"

"I was actually pleasantly surprised," replied Borysko "In doing the program, a lot of the builds were anywhere from \$1,500, to \$3,000 just for the backflow preventer. I was expecting a little bit more." Truman agreed, saying that installing the sump pump and back flow preventer at the same time would reduce the overall cost. "As long as they are in the same location, it's not that much more work to add. One at a time would be about \$3,000 each, but both together would only be a third more. Borysko also reminded Council that the full \$50,000 hadn't been used last year. Assuming the program is as popular, it shouldn't be an issue.

Councillor Peter Taylor commented that if the program reached the \$50,00 maximum, Administration would simply have to come ask for an extension. "If people are really enjoying the program, and want to take part in it, I would rather see them do that than deal with a flooded basement." He also added that with the amount of people who just don't know what kind of system they have, maybe they could also create a program that educates. It may also be a good idea to prioritize people who would financially struggle to pay for the installation on their own.

Mayor Zahara added that while he is in support of an education program, he wouldn't want to complicate things by limiting the program to those who need financial aid. "As soon as you start adding different mechanisms, it becomes more of a burden to administer."

"Would this program apply to anyone who has this system or just those who have been flooded?" asked Councillor Greg Pasychny. "It would apply to anybody," answered Borysko, "Even if you were a business owner within town and had a connected sump."

The program will not be put into action until the full 2024 budget is approved on April 23. If approved during this process, interested residents can reach out to the town for more information on the program.



The Sparks and Embers attended a bee presentation recently by Shirley Mitchell. After the presentation the girls got to make bee hotels to take home with them.

When asked what inspired her to start having her own bee hives and how long ago, Mitchell said, "I started honey bee keeping about twelve or so years ago. The biggest reason was I kept hearing about the issues honey bees were having almost worldwide."

"Alberta agriculture offered beekeeping courses, so I thought I would go to find out more. I found beekeeping very interesting so I decided to keep a few hives as a hobby.

In turn, I also learned a lot about how to help our endemic pollinators as well. Of course I like the honey, however also enjoy wildcrafting, so I make many things with beeswax such as candles, lotions, soaps, beewax wraps, and more," said Mitchell.

"The honey bees assist with pollination for some crops including vegetables, fruit, flowers, and some feed crops. It is estimated we can thank pollinators for assisting with over 60% of the food we eat. They are such interesting insects and I really enjoy this hobby," added Mitchell.

"I appreciated speaking about pollinators with the Sparks and Embers. They paid such close attention and asked some great questions. They were keen to learn and made some beautiful mason bee houses to take home," said Mitchell.







An infestation of zebra mussels can cause millions of dollars of damage, compromising water intakes, dams, water treatment plants and other infrastructure. Commonly spread by boats travelling across borders, zebra mussels pose a threat to Alberta.

For nearly 10 years, Alberta's inspection program has kept Alberta zebra mussel free by inspecting boats at international and provincial borders.

Zebra mussels have been detected in Ontario, Quebec, and Manitoba. Alarmingly, there has been an increase in the spread of zebra mussels in Manitoba and neighbouring Idaho. And recently, Parks Canada moved to restrict watercraft in Alberta's Waterton Lakes National Park.

In order to confront this growing threat, Alberta's provincial budget increases the number of inspection stations, inspectors and expands the K-9 dog inspection team.

Our government is also calling on the federal government to require the Canadian Border Services Agency to conduct mandatory inspections and decontaminations of all boats entering Canada from the United States.

Alberta will also launch a new task force to examine further restrictions on transporting boats, increased fines, and other actions that can be taken to build a firewall between this invasive species and our lakes, rivers, and infrastructure.

You can act too. Remember to clean, dry, and drain your watercraft, trailer, and gear and always stop at boat inspection stations, which have been mandatory in Alberta since 2015
