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Land Use Bylaw Rewrite

The Town of Edson is asking everyone to get involved in the Land Use Bylaw Rewrite

As a landowner in Town, if you are planning to develop or make changes to your property like constructing a new building, installing solar panels on your home, or establishing secondary suites, the Land Use Bylaw indicates what is permitted on your property. As the bylaw is updated, it's critical to know what is important to you!

What is a Land Use Bylaw and why is it important? The Land Use Bylaw is one tool that helps the Town turn its vision for development into reality. The current Land Use Bylaw was

initially written in the 1990s. Despite many amendments over time, the Town is undertaking a rewrite of the Bylaw to make the document relevant to the community, and development in Edson today. It is time to fix the root of the issue with a new Land Use Bylaw that can address the current challenges and better adapt to the future needs of Edson.

The Town of Edson wants to understand what topics matter to you as the rewrite of the Land Use Bylaw begins. There are several upcoming opportunities for you to have your say! The first round of engagement for this project kicks off on April 18th until early May and includes a stop at the Trade Show April 29th and 30th. 

Cadomin Community Society requests use of fire hall and site

At their April 12 meeting, Yellowhead County Council heard a request on behalf of the Cadomin Community Society (CCS) from the County Director of Community Services, Deb Juch.

The CCS requested the County's permission to repurpose the old Cadomin Fire Hall building and site as part of the Society's new community hall project. Council has committed to support the CCS with a contribution to their capital project in the amount of \$1.5 million, with the Society adding their own contributions to the project.

The County will develop a lease agreement for the site involving all parties to the project, as well as finalizing the draft operating agreement for the finished hall.

The Cadomin Fire Department was disbanded in 2018 and the building has since been heated and maintained at a low service level for various County purposes, such as minor storage for the Utilities and Recreation Departments.

There are many benefits to allowing CCS to repurpose the building into the new development, including assisting the Society to develop their community hall affordably, upgrading an existing facility, avoiding operating costs for the building and demo costs at end of life, and invigorating a central part of Cadomin and the hamlet's signature community park.

Juch recommended that Yellowhead County Council approve the CCS's use of the Cadomin Fire Hall as part of its new community hall project and direct Administration to develop the necessary agreements.

Councillor Dawn Mitchell asked about the value of the Fire Hall and land so that the County could determine their full capital contribution with contributing the facility and land. Juch did not have the information on hand, but stated she would get it to Council.

Juch also noted that "a lease is not a sale" and the building and site would still be owned by Yellowhead County. "We'll enter into an operating agreement which means that the Society will operate the hall, and based on their operating costs we'll be funding at least part of that, the eligible costs. But this is a building that we will be responsible for in terms of upkeep and capital improvements in the future. We will be owners," she said.

Councillor Brigitte Lemieux asked about what "parties" would be involved in the lease, specifically mentioning the Legion. Juch explained, "The initial concept has the Legion as a key event holder, someone that will be renting the facility from time to time. They will not be

leasing a part of the facility on a permanent basis. Like any other user, they'll be using the facility as a rental kind of situation for particular events."

Lemieux also asked who would be managing the construction of the project, to which Juch replied, "It will be the Society that will be the contractor for the project itself."

CAO Luc Mercier then explained that "there will be three agreements as part of this," including a lease agreement, operating agreement for the long term, and an agreement regarding construction of the project. Mercier explained that the president of the CCS works in contracting "way bigger projects" than this one.

"We are comfortable in getting into an agreement where they would provide for the construction of this building to certain specifications to Yellowhead County's satisfaction," said Mercier. "The reason that we're recommending that is because this group can build this building way more efficiently than Yellowhead County ever could because of our procurement laws that we need to follow. They are able to do their own work, to manage grants, to do some of their own work in-kind to make the building happen. And we are very comfortable with the proponents of the Society... and their ability to making this a proper project."

Council then went into Closed Session after a question from Lemieux regarding revised construction costs. "They're negotiating prices with different consultants. I think it's definitely available to Council but we should not do it in a public part of the meeting out of respect to the Community Society," said Mercier.

Following the Closed Session, Council

discussed how they felt about the project moving forward.

Mitchell said, "I would just like to say that Council has decided that we would like to have a community hall in each hamlet, and Cadomin as you know, we're proud of Cadomin. They work hard and they really are fundraising hard for this building and this hall. So I think it's worth supporting."

Councillor Shawn Berry said, "I'm really glad to see the fire hall being reused, and I want to thank the community group that's going through all the motions here and the effort to get this thing built. I think it's a really good idea and I fully support it and I believe that it will be built to a very professional standard by the community association so I'm very much in favour of this project."

Councillor Ken Groat said, "I agree with Councillor Berry that, to utilize the fire hall, and in addition to a new attachment to it, is the way to go. And I'm 100% behind this group and I think that the day has come to get a Community Hall and I know the people there are looking forward to having it so I'm in favour."

Councillor David Russell said, "I think Cadomin is a gem in the rough and a new hall there will move the community a little closer to shining the way it should. Now if we can get this done in Cadomin along with the community group, and have our Administration have some oversight over them and a successful project there, that will only leave one [hamlet] left to build a community facility. So good job. Let's get after it."

Mayor Wade Williams said, "I was very happy to see that the fire hall will be included in this project. I think that the community group has worked extremely hard on trying to get this project off the ground. With the cooperation of Administration, I think we have a good go-forward plan."

Council unanimously approved the CCS's use of the Cadomin Fire Hall as part of its new community hall project and directed Administration to develop the necessary agreements.

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UCP leadership review underway with Kenney's speech

Kenney urges UCP to back him as leader or risk losing election to Alberta NDP...

...Say what?

- As the 2nd least popular premier in Canada, recent polls suggest Kenney would not win against Notley.
- The UCP lags seriously behind the NDP in fundraising
- Kenney's litany of Covid sagas including Aloha-Gate, Sky Palace and Best Summer Ever.
- A divided caucus.
- A polarized province.
- Kenney lowered the traditional leadership bar to a polarized 50% plus one, yet offers little or no vision in his speech of how he would heal differences within the party should he win the review. (Ralph Klein resigned with 55%. Far lower than the 75% he felt he needed in order to continue.)

These issues simply won't disappear if Kenney does win a simple majority, in fact many of them may get worse. So why does he insist he's the best choice to lead the party into the next election? After all, there are some very strong leadership candidates ready to toss their hats into the ring.

It is clear that many within his party, and many Albertans in general, have lost faith in Kenney's leadership.

So, despite the outcome of this leadership review, it's clear the UCP has a lot more pressing work to do to unite the party, and the province, if it wants to remain a viable, credible option for voters in 2023.

After all, Albertans don't often vote parties in, they vote them out.

was tasked with considering how best to implement economic recovery strategies following COIVD.

of the day implemented an emergency budget that included a 5% tax decrease to ease some of the financial burdens being faced by residents due to the reduced the original pandemic. A five to six year plan was then created which would ease the loss of the taxation revenue and allow for service levels to continue. If that plan was to remain in place only 0.06% of the 2022 budget would go towards the recovery and would require tax increases of between 1.07% and 1.45% to be implemented every year for the next four years just to reach the 2020 taxation level.

At Tuesday's meeting administration presented the current council with two possible courses of action to accelerate recovery efforts and decrease the reliance on reserves. The first

scenario administration continued Council called an "all in" approach. This would require an increase of 3.29% (on top of the 4.52%) to bring the tax rate to 7.81% for 2022. In 2020, the Council Doing so would result in a larger taxation increase in 2022 but would save approximately \$855,000 in reserves usage.

The second scenario plan to a two-year recovery and would see an additional 2.60% in 2022 tax rate and 2.63% in 2023. Doing so would save \$560,000 in reserve usage but would lessen the impact on taxation.

Councillor Krystal Baier immediately spoke in favour of the first option stating she was "struggling with the thought of using the reserves to reduce Baier said taxation." without keeping funds in reserves it would be challenging to complete other projects in the Town's strategic

Councillor Peter Taylor said while he agreed scenario one would be the financially

six months ago he would likely have voted for it, he now felt that scenario two was a better way to go. Taylor said he believes rising costs for electricity, gas, inflation and everyday living has placed a strain on residents and was hesitant to add more. "People only have so much to give," said Taylor, "We recently toured the food bank and their numbers are increasing. Yes, we could eliminate the 5% decrease but the hit to some residents would be substantial."

Councillor Baier responded that she was "the single mom working two jobs with the \$350,000 house" and therefore she "got it." Baier said the impact per month for the first scenario was still less than what her home internet went up this past month.

Mayor Zahara said while he would like to "rip off the Band-Aid" and implement the first scenario he is conscious of seniors on fixed incomes and of resi-

prudent option, and that dents who are struggling to make ends meet. Zahara said he is also aware that the municipality will be responsible for approximately \$500,000 in retroactive pay for RCMP and has little confidence there will be any help from the federal government. 

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

Project Agriculture expands to include new junior high social studies and science topics

Four of Alberta's crop commissions – Alberta Barley, Alberta Canola, Alberta Pulse Growers, and the Alberta Wheat Commission - have launched a new educational offering to the Project Agriculture program with a focus on the crop sector. The new modules will complement the existing Project Agriculture platform and align with junior high social studies and science topics.

Originally designed and implemented by Alberta Milk, Egg Famers of Alberta, Alberta Chicken Producers, Alberta Turkey Producers and Alberta Hatching Eggs Producers, Project Agriculture is a free online education program for teachers and students aligned with Alberta

curriculum and offering classroom activities, original videos profiling Alberta farmers and Alberta and agriculture-specific information for students from grades 7 to 12.

The new additions to the website include Agriculture Histories for grade 7 Social Studies, Sustainable Practices and Food Diversity for grades 7 and 8 Science curriculums. Mountain Pine Beetle Removal in Your Area



Mountain Pine Beetle Surveys are being conducted on pine trees in Yellowhead County.

Survey crews may require access to private property to conduct surveys and will provide identification upon request.

Follow up control activities will be conducted until completed. Only trees that are heavily hit by beetles will be removed.

You can expect to see smoke and flame in the forest. However, if you suspect it's a wildfire, please report it by calling 310-FIRE.

How can I tell if my trees have been attacked? Look for creamy globs that look like crystalized honey, called pitch tubes, and sawdust at the base of the tree and in the bark's crevices.

If my tree is attacked, will it die?

Unfortunately, yes. Trees successfully attacked by mountain pine beetles usually die within one year.

What do I do if my tree is infested?

If you suspect a Mountain Pine Beetle infestation on your property, please contact the Yellowhead Agriculture Department in Wildwood for assistance at 1-800-814-3935.

GYPSD Transportation ServicesInformation for 2022/2023 School Year

What Transportation Services are School Jurisdictions Funded to Provide?

Alberta Education provides transportation funding for eligible students. The criteria for eligibility is:

- students reside more than 2.4 km away from their designated school
- students with special needs who require specialized transportation

Under the School Transportation Regulation, school divisions are not required to transport students beyond their designated school.

How Do I Determine my Child's Designated School?

- · Every student in GYPSD has a designated school.
- Find your designated school at www.gypsd.ca under Transportation Services/School Bus Registration and enter your home address on the link What is My Designated School?

What Transportation Services are Offered through GYPSD?

GYPSD offers a range of unfunded services. The fees for unfunded services are subsidized by the Board and average out over the year to \$2.60/school day to families requesting these services. Services are available for:

- Ineligible: students who live less than 2.4 km away from their designated school
- School of Choice: students who choose to attend a school other than their designated school
- Transportation Out of District: students who choose to attend a different school jurisdiction
- Reserved Second Seat: students who require a second seat on a different bus to an alternate address

How Do Families Register for the Bus?

- All new and returning students requiring transportation services must register by June 30th for the following school year.
- The registration deadline for busing for the 2022/2023 school year is June 30th.
- If there is a request for an unfunded service, payment must be received by June 30th.
- Families who miss the June 30th deadline are subject to seat availability.

When Do Families Receive Confirmation that Their Child is Registered on a Bus?

- Families will receive an email from the transportation department before the start of the new school year with their route number, driver information, and pick-up times.
- Applications and payment for unfunded services received after the June 30th deadline cannot be guaranteed.
- Only those families who have registered and paid any applicable fees (including overdue accounts) will be assigned a seat on the bus.

Homelessness TaskForce survey underway for Edson and area

Reflections Empowering People to Succeed and the Edson Homelessness TaskForce are reaching out to ask the community's assistance with a data estimation survey in Edson and surrounding area.

This is an inclusive survey, designed for everyone in the community to fill out, not just those experiencing potential homelessness.

"Homelessness is often hidden in rural communities, and rarely look like they do in urban centers," states Marsha Jensen with the TaskForce. "Individuals experiencing housing insecurity in rural and remote communities are more likely to couch surf, live in overcrowded housing, or own/rent housing that may need major repairs, often leveraging the relationships around them in for support." Consequently, rural communities are often met with disbelief when attempts are made to address the issue of homelessness within their communities.

This "skepticism" is the reason that the Edson Homelessness TaskForce and Reflections Empowering People to Succeed have contracted the Rural Development Network (RDN) to coordinate a rural homelessness count in our community. "This Rural Homelessness Estimations Project is based off of RDN's step-by-step guide to estimating homelessness in rural communities," say Jensen.

The guide, published in 2017, uses a

population estimation methodology wherein survey data is gathered through local service agencies such as food banks, shelters, libraries, outreach programs, income support services, etc.; that is any agency that provides supports or services to individuals who might be homeless or at-risk of homelessness. "RDN initially developed the guide due to the lack of available, accurate, and current data on rural homelessness. This limits the ability of rural communities to advocate for better resources for their residents in greatest need," Jensen says.

Reflections Edson has partnered with Rural Development Network, and the Town of Edson to create a customized survey to collect information and data on the housing and services needs of Edson.

"The survey is designed to be completed by all residents of Edson, not just those experiencing homelessness or housing issues," emphasises Jensen. "It is designed to help our community gain a better understanding of the needs of our residents and the services required to improve and enhance community wellbeing."

"The responses will be compiled and help us to identify the types of services that are currently being accessed, which ones are seeing the most use, as well as what needs in our community are not being met," stated Jensen. "Your answers will help articulate the

importance of regional housing and service expansion, apply for funding to support housing needs, influence service and program development and inform housing and service policies and practices in the region."

The success of this project will be determined by receiving the highest level of participation as possible, gathering as much information as they can. "We are reaching out to local agencies and businesses in the hopes that you willing to participate in a concentrated data count beginning on March 28 and running until April 26," Jensen concludes.

The survey is for everyone to fill out, as comparative data is very important, Jensen says. It only takes a few minutes, the link is https://www.surveymonkey.com/r/EdsonComm unity, or if you have a smart phone, the QR code is also available for scanning.

RCMP warns against speeding this spring

(RCMP) As the weather gets warmer and the roads begin to clear, the Alberta RCMP reminds motorists that speeding is still prohibited despite spring driving conditions.

Unsafe speeds increase the risk of collision and serious injury for all road users.

Unfortunately, this traffic safety violation is a common habit among many drivers. Last year, there were approximately 70,580 speeding-related offences in Alberta RCMP jurisdiction — with officers issuing 5,220 speeding tickets in April 2021 alone.

Don't be a speedster. R e m e m b e r t h e following when out on the roads this April:

• The faster you go, the longer it takes you to stop. Speeding affects your ability to come to a quick stop in the event of an unexpected traffic hazard.

· Always drive to conditions. Posted limits indicate the

maximum, legal speed permitted in ideal conditions (Government of Alberta, 2022). Alberta's road and weather conditions are unpredictable; ensure you adjust your speed accordingly.

· Give yourself a few extra minutes. Allowing yourself extra time to get to your destination helps you to avoid feeling rushed in traffic.

· Be aware of speed limits in playground and construction zones. These areas often have high pedestrian traffic — you must slow down.

"According to Alberta Transportation, more than half of all fatal collisions involving unsafe speeds occur in rural areas," said Insp. Chris Romanchych, Alberta RCMP Traffic Services. "We want our communities to feel safe out on our province's roadways. Speed shouldn't be the reason a loved one doesn't make it home."

Highly pathogenic avian influenza in Alberta flocks

(AB) Minister of Agriculture, Forestry and Rural Economic Development Nate Horner issued the following statement on positive cases of highly pathogenic avian influenza (HPAI) in Alberta flocks:

"Recently, Alberta poultry farms have tested positive for highly pathogenic avian influenza (HPAI), which was previously detected in migratory waterfowl, backyard flocks and commercial poultry flocks in the eastern United States, Manitoba, Ontario, Quebec, and in a wild bird in Vancouver.

"Albertans can be assured there is no risk to food safety and that the risk to human health is extremely low.

"The quick discovery of these cases is a testament to the effectiveness of our disease surveillance and response system and the commitment of our poultry producers.

"The Canadian Food Inspection Agency

(CFIA) is leading the investigation and response. Alberta has supported the CFIA with testing and mapping, and we have offered our help wherever possible and needed

"We are in regular contact with the CFIA, industry, producers and other stakeholders to ensure a timely, coordinated and effective response.

"This case is an important reminder of the importance of strict biosecurity measures and early detection. HPAI is a reportable disease, so if you suspect or confirm a case in your flock, you are required to report it to the CFIA or the Office of the Chief Provincial Veterinarian.

"This is an incredibly difficult time for the affected producers. We appreciate the steady support of all stakeholders as we continue working together to resolve this issue."

Edson RCMP execute search warrant and seize drugs and money

(RCMP) On March 3, 2022, Edson RCMP executed a search warrant on a residence which concluded a month long investigation on a suspected drug house.

RCMP officers attended the residence, located and seized a substantial amount of drugs and money, as well as drug trafficking paraphernalia.

A large quantity of cigarettes, missing tax labels, were also located and seized. Two people have been charged in relation to these offences.

A woman (55) of Edson, Alta., has been charged with: Possession of a Controlled

Substance for the Purpose of Trafficking X 2; Possession of Property Obtained by the Commission of a Crime; and Illegal Possession of Cigarettes under the Tabaco Tax Act.

A male (49) of Edson, Alta., has been charged with: Possession of a Controlled Substance for the Purpose of Trafficking X 2; and Possession of Property Obtained by the Commission of a Crime.

Both parties were released on an Appearance Notice and will be appearing in Edson Provincial Court on May 17, 2022.

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RCMP Serious Crimes Branch investigate suspicious packages; explosive found

The RCMP Serious Crimes Branch took carriage of two complaints on April 8, 2022 related to suspicious packages.

At approximately 9:00 a.m. Apr. 8, 2022, a suspicious package was reported in the area of 50th Street and 45th Avenue in Entwistle, Alberta. The RCMP's Explosive Disposal Unit (EDU), RCMP Police Dog Services (PDS) with support from Yellowhead Country Fire Services, Parkland County Peace Officers and Fish & Wildlife Officers responded to the immediate area. The team was witnessed employing a remote robot to investigate the package.

Police investigation continues into this incident. Confirmation through the assistance of RCMP Forensic Identification Services was that this suspicious package contained an Improvised Explosive Device (IFD)

In a second incident, at 1:00 p.m. on Apr. 8, 2022, the Parkland RCMP responded to a complaint from security officers with Trans Mountain Pipeline of a suspicious package in the area of Range Road 43 and Township Road 531 near Wabamun.

The locations of these incidents were approximately 15 kilometers apart from one another.

The explosive disposal unit from Edmonton was dispatched to investigate a

duffel bag found on the scene.

According to the corporation's statement, "Trans Mountain has voluntarily shut down its pipeline out of an abundance of caution."

Parkland RCMP were supported in their initial response and the ongoing investigation into this incident by RCMP EDU, PDS, RCMP Air Services, FIS and RCMP Serious Crimes Branch – General Investigation Section.

Police can confirm that the location in relation to the Trans Mountain Pipeline was not an explosive device, and is not connected to the incident in Entwistle.

Trans Mountain confirmed the pipeline was later restarted without incident at 6:40 p.m.





Yellowhead County Council Meeting Highlights: April 12

Letter of Support for GYPSD Donation Application to CN.

Grande Yellowhead Public School Division sent a letter to County CAO Luc Mercier requesting a letter of support for a donation from Canadian National Railways (CN). The division is in the process of combining three schools in Evansburg and Wildwood into a single, modernized K-12 school that will serve the families and students living in the Lobstick area. The approved project from Alberta Infrastructure provides funding for one gym, however based on input from stakeholders, the Board determined that an additional gym would be needed. The Board passed a motion to contribute \$3 million towards the construction of a second gym and are fundraising to supplement the construction and other aspects of the Grand Trunk modernization. The letter of support will be for a grant application from GYPSD to CN for bleachers in the second gym.

Councillor David Russell said, "While I am certainly in support of facilities for children at schools, or anywhere else for that matter, reading [GYPSD's] letter to our CAO requesting support for their donation request, it discusses amalgamating three schools within Yellowhead County into one school. In other words, closure of public schools in

Yellowhead County. For that reason, and that reason alone, I will not be voting in favour of this." Councillor Anthony Giezen agreed with Russell's stance. Berry also said he would not be supporting the letter due to "having some trouble with the financial side" and GYPSD not providing a dollar amount that they'd be asking for.

Mayor Williams said, "This is a letter of support. That's all it is. There is no financial commitment from Yellowhead County at all. Whether we agree with the closure of any schools or not, that is out of our hands, and that is going to proceed, whether we agree with it or we don't agree with it. I understand their need for the second gym and for those reasons I will support this motion." Even with the dissenting votes, the vote carried and a letter of support will be issued.

Edson Intermunicipal Development Plan Amendment

Council was also asked to provide three readings and a motion for unanimous consent prior to Third Reading for Bylaw 01.22, a bylaw to amend Bylaw 03.17 (The Edson/Yellowhead Intermunicipal Development Plan). Doing so would finalize the process of officially amending the Plan to be consistent with the new Land Use Bylaw. A Public Hearing on the matter was held on March 8, 2022 so the County was now in a position to formally

process the amendment. Unanimous consent was provided for giving all three readings to the Bylaw.

Letter regarding Alberta Provincial Police concept

The Town of Edson drafted a letter outlining continued concerns about the Alberta Provincial Police concept following an "Engagement Session" in Edson that left much to be desired. County Council was asked to support the letter, asking for more engagement as well as a meeting with Minister Tyler Shandro as well as MLA Martin Long. Mayor Williams attended the session as an elected official, but noted that, "There was no public engagement whatsoever because the public was not invited to the meeting." Councillor Penny Lowe said, "I just thought it was an

extremely ineffective point of, 'This is how it's gonna go. I hope you like it.' To me it was very disappointing and there was absolutely no way that I could take that back to my constituents and answer any questions." Councillor Berry said, "I think the presenter did a good job of keeping us quiet, dodging our questions. And I felt that was extremely negative on behalf of the contractor to the province of Alberta who was trying to get feedback. We could not give feedback, he wouldn't accept it. So I was very disappointed in the process. I'll support this letter." The motion to approve the letter and authorize Mayor Williams to sign it on behalf of Yellowhead County was carried.



CPTED is a set of design principles that aim to reduce opportunities for crime to take place. Making recommended adjustments to a home or business can deter criminals by making it more difficult or less desirable to commit the crime. It can also make you feel safer.

"Citizens play a critical role in keeping their communities safe," says C/Supt. Peter Tewfik, Alberta RCMP Officer in Charge of Community Safety and Well-being. "By using the principles of CPTED and making simple changes to your property, you can help reduce property crime in Alberta."

Here are some things to consider when renovating your property:

- Trim your trees and shrubs Trimming the bottoms of trees allow clear sight lines from inside your house to the curb or edge of the property. In addition, keeping your bushes and shrubs short removes potential hiding places.
- Lighting Consider installing LED or motion sensor lights around your property. Ensuring your house is adequately lit at night deters criminals for fear of being seen. Solar powered lights are a great option to light up the most remote places on your property. Also leaving lights on in the house when away can provide the illusion that someone is home.
- · Cameras Install exterior cameras around your property. Even the perception of someone watching can be enough to deter a crime.
- · Lock up your outdoor valuables After a long day of yard work, store your lawn mower and other tools in a locked shed

or garage and out of sight.



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
