# **County continues Over 50 Fitness** Classses in Peers

Yellowhead County is happy to announce the return of the Over 50 Fitness Classes. Starting on April 6, anyone 50 or over can come out to the Peers Multiplex to enjoy an hour of professionally instructed fitness, modified to fit your level.

The over 50 Fitness previously happened over the course of February, with the last official class taking place March 6. But now, it's back with a new name for the month of April. The first 'Prime Time Fitness' class starts on April 6 from 2pm to 3pm, and then repeats every Thursday until April 27. "It's going to be a bit shorter, just four weeks, but it'll be the same day, same place, same time, same instructor," said Nicole Tarves, Recreation Coordinator with Yellowhead County.

Like its predecessor, the Prime Time Fitness Classes are led by Janine LeBlue of Wise Moves Fitness based out of Edson. Each Class contains exercises that can


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

# More taxes: Thanks shrinkflation!

It is unacceptable that, with 'shrinkflation', consumers get less and are taxed more

As if shrinkflation wasn't painful enough for all of us, it looks like the taxman is making shrinking packages even more painful for our wallets.

Shrinkflation occurs when a food manufacturer reduces quantities but continues to sell the product at the same price. We have seen this happening pretty much everywhere in all sections of the grocery store. It's even happening in the fresh section, with strawberries and blueberries.

The Canada Revenue Agency (CRA) has provisions that make some smaller products taxable that aren't in their larger forms. This policy is not new: it actually dates back to 2007, when the GST/HST Memorandum was revised. Some articles of the memo even existed back in 1997.

But what is new is the number of products now subject to this Tax Act due to reduced quantities. An increasing number of products, hundreds, are now taxed that weren't before.

The Act's policy section Schedule VI, Part III clearly defines a snack and the meaning of a single serving. For instance, the threshold for ice cream is 500 millilitres. Anything below that means the product is taxable as it is considered a snack, not as part of basic groceries. Cakes, muffins, pies, pastries, tarts, cookies, doughnuts, brownies, croissants with sweetened filling or coating, or similar products are all taxable if quantities are reduced below the thresholds specified by the Act.

If food items are pre-packaged for sale to consumers in quantities of less than six items, these products are taxed. Grocery shopping is complicated enough, but now, due to shrinkflation, consumers have to worry about how much more they need to pay. Depending on the province you live in, it could add five to 13 per cent more to the price tag of some products you're buying. And chances are, you have likely never noticed.

Consumers are being double slammed by the industry and the taxman, in most cases, without knowing it. By "shrinkflating" a product, consumers get less and are taxed more. Just great.

CRA's GST/HST Memorandum 4.3 on taxable food products includes 156 articles. Few will ever understand or even know how to interpret the Act and appreciate how it applies to the 18,000 to 25,000

food products you can find in a regular grocery store. Knowing how many items were taxed in compliance with the law is practically impossible.

A recent survey conducted by Dalhousie University, in partnership with Caddle, shows that 67 per cent of Canadians have found at least one mistake on their grocery receipt in the last year. That is an astonishing number. And according to the same survey, only 9.2 per cent have seen tax on a food item that shouldn't have been taxed. The true number is likely much higher. One can only assume that many consumers wouldn't have been able to pick up on mistakes related to taxable items. The law is incredibly confusing for everyone. Even some grocers have admitted to having made mistakes and having applied taxes on food products when they shouldn't have.

With shrinkflation, many products which are now taxed find their way into lunchboxes for school children. Most of these products were designed to bring convenience to our lives, but paying more taxes is certainly not what most consumers would consider convenient.

Food at the grocery store should never be taxed unless it is serviced to be consumed right away. Or, at the very minimum, the Act should be changed to exempt smaller single servings and packages that include less than six items.

Skrinkflation has been around for well over 30 years, perhaps even longer. The strategy has angered many consumers for obvious reasons. With food inflation at a 40-year-high, most consumers are blaming the industry for their ills at the grocery store.

Yet many tend to forget how our own fiscal regime also makes our food more expensive. For example, the carbon tax, which impacts food affordability through the supply chain, will rise to \$65 a metric ton on Apr. 1 and will reach \$170 a metric ton by 2030. It is incumbent that Canadians know how the policy will influence our food bill over time.

But while the carbon tax is hidden, sales taxes are very real for all of us. Higher food costs due to more taxes adds insult to injury. This is not unacceptable.

County and the Towns of Edson and Hinton," stated County CAO Luc Mercier. "All the agreements are coming due in 2023-2024 and will require negotiation".

The bylaws and agreements regarding the ICF were finalized in 2020. As part of the ongoing process and review of the ICFs, a recommending body known as the ICF Committee is required. Each ICF committee consists of two representatives from each Council and their respective CAO from each municipality.

"Administration is recommending that the Mayor and Deputy Mayor be appointed as the members for each of the committees, to provide consistency when negotiations commence on the ICFs," said Mercier. Agreements reached by through committee meetings would still need to be ratified by Council.

In addition to that recommendation, this fall during the Organizational Meeting, Mercier recommended that the Mayor and Deputy Mayor be appointed to the Edson and Hinton ICF committees for consistency.

Councillor Patrick Soroka made the motion, "That Yellowhead County Council appoints the Mayor and Deputy Mayor to the ICF Committees for MD of Greenview, Parkland County, Lac Ste Anne County, Woodlands County, Brazeau County and Clearwater County". Council voted all in favour.

Ministerial Meeting – Yellowhead County will coordinate a meeting with Minister Dreeshen of Alberta Transportation and Economic Corridors to discuss transportation and recreational infrastructure development in the Cadomin and Coal Branch areas and Highway 40 North, including highway improvements and promoting tourism in the area.

Joint Municipal Promotions – Council approved participation in an Alberta Focused Reception at the 2023 Federation of Canadian Municipalities Convention to promote Alberta municipalities at the convention. Yellowhead County will provide a video showcasing the county and \$2,500 towards the initiative.

Roadway Classifications – A new Roadway Classification Design Standards was adopted by Council that updates the County's roadway classification hierarchy. These are arterial, collector, local access, and industrial local and are consistent with federal, provincial, and municipal standards and design guidelines.


Edson Forest Products is commencing timber harvest planning activities in the Sundance 14 compartment of our Forest Management Area.




#### **Supporting Canadians Aging at Home**







# Oil sands producers not greenwashing net zero plans

Greenpeace complaint of greenwashing against Pathways Alliance's CCS project ignores the

Greenpeace has filed a complaint with the Competition Board of Canada claiming that the oil sands Pathways Alliance is "greenwashing" about its plan to reach net zero emissions by 2050.

Oil sands producers are not greenwashing. Here are the facts. Fact: Carbon capture and storage

Pathways is an alliance of six companies representing 95 per cent of oil sands production. The anchor project of the group's target to reduce emissions by 22 million tonnes by 2030 on the way to net zero by 2050 is carbon capture and storage (CCS) technology.

According to experts, including the United Nations Intergovernmental Panel on Climate Change (IPCC) and the International Energy Agency (IEA), expanding CCS operations worldwide is vital to achieving climate targets.

Canada is already a leader in CCS, with five of the world's 30 commercial CCS facilities. This accounts for about 15 per cent of global CCS capacity even though Canada generates less than two per cent of global CO2 emissions.

Since 2000, CCS projects in

Saskatchewan and Alberta have removed more than 47 million tonnes of emissions, or the equivalent of taking more than 10 million cars off the road.

Fact: Pathways is moving fast toward building one of the world's largest CCS projects

The first phase of the Pathways CCS project will connect 14 oil sands facilities to a CO2 storage hub in northern Alberta. At an expected cost of \$16.5 billion by 2030, it is a huge undertaking.

A \$10 million engineering contract has been awarded, early engagement is underway with more than 20 Indigenous communities, and 135 environmental experts are conducting fieldwork to support a regulatory application.

The reality is it is impossible for the group to invest billions right now because governments have not approved its CCS project to proceed.

Building major projects around the world happens in phases: spending increases over time as work moves through phases of feasibility studies. to the procurement of equipment, and then construction. Pathways is in the feasibility studies phase, working on all the items governments require, and plans to file its application in late

Fact: Scope 1 is the best place to start reducing emissions

The complaint says that Pathways' plan to achieve net zero is not credible because it does not yet

include the full value chain of emissions

This is otherwise known as all of Scope 1 (emissions an entity makes directly), Scope 2 (emissions an entity makes indirectly, like from electricity use), and Scope 3 (emissions from everything all the way down to the end-use of an entity's products, like gasoline in a

The Pathways plan starts with Scope 1 and Scope 2 emissions but will ultimately include Scope 3. president Kendall Dilling recently told BNN Bloomberg.

"We wanted to really start with our own business first and take care of our own backyard," he said.

"We are looking at ways we can partner with end users of our product to also tackle the consumption emissions, and over the course of this path to net zero, we'll be coming at this from all ends of the spectrum."

To be effective, emissions reduction strategies should focus first on the fastest and most effective solutions while developing long-term answers.

It makes sense that a company should start with Scope 1 and Scope 2, that is, emissions that are within its direct control.

Fact: Canadian oil benefits Canadians and the world

The complaint takes issue with the fact that oil sands production is growing. Activists would prefer

that the industry reduce production and shut down. But shutting off Canada's ability to supply oil to the world would not impact how much oil the world uses or how much emissions that use generates.

The International Energy Agency projects that oil and gas will still meet 47 per cent of world energy demand in 2050, compared to about 52 per cent

Shutting down Canada's oil sands would only shift supply to regions that are less responsible actors in areas like social progress, environmental protection and worker safety. Meanwhile, it would rob Canadians of substantial economic activity and opportunities for economic reconciliation with Indigenous communities.

As IEA executive director Fatih Birol said last year, "We will still need oil and gas for years to come ... I prefer that oil is produced by countries ... like Canada, (which) want to reduce the emissions of oil and gas."

Coal has many important uses worldwide not only in providing energy but also in building modern societies. It's used in electricity generation, steel production, cement manufacturing and as a liquid fuel.

Coal is critical to our world, through its use in providing much-needed affordable electricity and also in building our societies through its use in steel and cement. 37% of the world's electricity and over 70% of the world's steel is produced using coal.

Of the world's steel production relies on coal. It's the backbone of both the steel and cement

Coal supports numerous non-energy industries including steel and cement production, coal-tochemicals, rare earth element extraction, carbon fibre production, industrial electrodes and many

Cement is critical to the construction industry - mixed with water and gravel it forms concrete, a key construction material.


To produce cement, energy is required. Coal is an important source of the energy needed. A

high-temperature kiln, often fuelled by coal, heats the raw materials of calcium carbonate (generally in the form of limestone), silica, iron oxide and alumina to a partial melt at 1450°C, transforming them chemically and physically into a substance known as clinker. This grey pebble-like material comprises special compounds that give cement its binding properties. Clinker is mixed with gypsum and ground to a fine powder to make cement.

Coal combustion products (CCPs), such as Fly Ash also play an important role in cement manufacture and in the construction industry generally. . (WCA)

# **COVID-19 & vitamins** and supplements

"The global pandemic focused consumers' attention on health, wellness and how a healthier lifestyle can help provide protection against disease," says Ava Duering, competitiveness analyst with the Alberta government. "Multiple surveys have shown that consumers reacted to the pandemic by taking more vitamins and supplements than they did before."

The latest Consumer Corner, which shares consumer trends related to the agri-food industry with Alberta's agriculture and food industry, highlights these studies.

The Council for Responsible Nutrition's 'COVID-19 Consumer Survey on Dietary Supplements' found that 65% of supplement users aged 18 to 34, 50% of users aged 35 to 54, and 23% of users aged 55+, altered their supplement routine in 2020. Of these, 91% increased supplement use.

"Consumers reacted to the prospect of catching a potentially deadly illness by focusing on immunity. While general health products such as multivitamins also fared very well, immune support is the big story," says Duering. "Overall, people wanted to do all they could to strengthen their immune system. Consequently, sales of immunity-oriented supplements surged in 2020. These sales were made by new customers, further evidence that the pandemic has shifted buying patterns."

Duering says there were a number of key takeaways from these studies:

Gummies provide the fastest growth opportunity among vitamin and supplement products. The gelatin contained in gummies is often sourced from beef and pork, offering a potential market opportunity to both Alberta beef and pork producers.

Consumers in Canada and the U.S. share similarities in terms of demand for vitamins and supplements, with immune support being the number one reason for purchase.

While there is no way to know for sure, it stands to reason that those who believe that supplements helped them stay healthy during the pandemic will continue to turn to supplementation as part of a healthier lifestyle going forward. AgriNews





It would be amusing, if it wasn't so tragic, that if you want to know which





information to an unknown caller;

- Do not allow yourself to be pressured by a caller with false deadlines:
- You have the right to say no to any questions and directly contact a business to speak to a designated representative.

"With technology evolving at such a rapid rate, it's no surprise that mass marketing and phone scams are adapting just as quickly. With the click of a button, scammers can make direct contact with potential victims over the phone or online," states Cpl. Sean Milne, Alberta RCMP Provincial Economic Crime Team

Bill C-234 will allow farmers to invest in practices that drive innovation and new efficiencies that reduce fuel usage by putting money back in their hands.

"C-234 is a cornerstone of our work this week," Harpe said.
"Unlocking innovation is key to achieving sustainability in agriculture. Carbon surcharges on necessary farm activities only add to the financial strain and divert capital away from critical investments."

During National Grain Week, GGC members from across the country gather in Ottawa to share their diverse experiences and perspectives with parliamentarians. GGC is bringing together farmer members, parliamentarians and legislators to discuss and promote policies that align with the federal government's goals and the sector's unique needs and opportunities.



## Addressing unpaid oil and gas municipal taxes

Alberta's government states it is issuing a new directive to the Alberta Energy Regulator (AER) to require oil and gas companies to pay taxes owed to municipalities.

Energy Minister Pete Guthrie is issuing a ministerial order under the Responsible Energy Development Act requiring the AER to receive evidence that municipal taxes have been paid when approving licence transfers or new licences.

"While most companies pay their taxes regularly and on time, there are a few delinquent companies that owe overdue property taxes. That is why we're putting in place this ministerial order – to continue building on our recent work. Our goal is to reduce unpaid taxes throughout the province." -Pete Guthrie, Minister of

The departments of Energy and Municipal Affairs have worked together on this directive. Companies will now have to confirm that their unpaid municipal taxes

across the province do not exceed the maximum threshold allowed or that they have a repayment agreement in place whenever they apply for new licences or for licence transfers because they're seeking to sell their assets.

Under Alberta's liability management framework, which launched in 2020, the AER revised their licence eligibility requirements to include a more holistic assessment of a company's financial health that is applied through the life cycle of an asset. The new directive strengthens the AER's approach by making payment of municipal taxes a necessary and mandatory condition for approval, based on available data.

Municipal Affairs and the AER will work together to create an annual list of companies whose unpaid municipal taxes exceed the threshold amount. Companies on this list will be targeted by the AER to provide proof of tax payment.

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
