New legislation to make it easier for non-profits to support their communities

(AB Gov't release) Bill 58, the Freedom to Care Act, would make it easier for non-profits to access exemptions, allow Alberta's government to grant new one-time regulatory exemptions and provide individual volunteers with liability protections. Non-profits and charitable organizations are governed by regulations, just like businesses. However, regulations for commercial purposes can prevent non-profit organizations from addressing immediate needs in their communities."Non-profits have helped Albertans make it through some of our province's worst challenges, including the COVID-19 pandemic. This legislation would ensure they can deliver the services Albertans need in a timely manner while encouraging more volunteers to step forward and serve their community," stated Leela Sharon Aheer, Minister of Culture, Multiculturalism and Status of Women.

Non-profits provide crucial supports to Albertans, and will be key to Alberta's recovery and reinvigorating our communities. To help non-profits to perform social

good, several exemptions to regulations currently exist. For example, there are exemptions to limit liability for civil society organizations that accept donated food. These organizations need to focus on helping people instead of navigating complicated regulations. If passed, a central website will be developed to help non-profits identify and access these exemptions for their organizations.

To ensure successful implementation, the minister of Culture, Multiculturalism and Status of Women will also report annually to cabinet on the outcome of exemption requests and when new exemptions may be needed. This will ensure the provisions of the act are producing the expected results, meeting the needs of communities and not putting Albertans at risk.

- Allow cabinet (through order in council) to grant one-time, shortterm exemptions for non-profits from government regulations intended for business.

- Require the minister of Culture, Multiculturalism and Status of Women to report annually to cabinet on exemption requests that cannot

be addressed through existing processes or legislation.

- Provide individual volunteers with liability protections.

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Edson's SmartCovers proving a success

The Town of Edson is finding success with the use of new sensors on specific manhole covers throughout the community.

SmartCover sensors are placed strategically around town to monitor sewer flows and take a proactive approach in mitigating backups.

This strategy has already proved successful as it prevented at least

one possible backup, which was cleared before anyone was affected. Crews are also able to capture rainfall data in inches-per-hour and compare that to the sewer flow. This has been helpful in adjusting the sewer cleaning locations and schedule.

In another case, crews discovered a broken broom handle during a camera inspection as the

SmartCover detected some abnormal rise and fall behaviour. This could have caused some major drainage issues down the road. Reducing backups has been a

priority and the Town of Edson is excited with the early benefits of this program. Currently there are 5 smart covers in use throughout the community.

ATA Responds to Draft Curriculum

Plans to undertake Independent Review

(ATA) The March 29th release of the long-awaited K-12 draft curriculum kicks off an extensive and in-depth evaluation by the true curriculum experts —teachers. The Alberta Teachers' Association is launching `a comprehensive engagement project with active teachers to gather feedback on the proposed curriculum.

"Teachers understand the readiness of young students for different pieces of content and how to bring curriculum to life in the classroom. Our Association and its members are best positioned to provide advice on the successful implementation of new curriculum. To develop a curriculum without incorporating a grassroots, classroom-based understanding of how students learn could set our students up for failure," —Jason Schilling, ATA president.


The project will feature an online questionnaire open to all teachers and principals in Alberta's public education system, including hundreds of elementary subject and grade-level specialists. A number of round-table discussions with subject-matter and curriculum development experts will follow in late spring. The ATA will provide updates and a final report to the government and the public throughout the process. Schilling also has serious concerns

about the minister's expectations for piloting curriculum in the 2021/22 school year.

"We still have a lot of pandemic ahead of us, and our current research shows that 9 out of 10 Alberta teachers are expressing concern about piloting a new curriculum during these uncertain times. What was released today is barely a plan, and certainly not a plan for success," —Jason Schilling, ATA president.

Over the last year there has been talk in our community about the professional behavior of The Aero's former coach, Bernie Lynch. Complaints were made about Mr. Lynch's sometimes hard-edged approach on the ice and his tendency to be verbally direct. Mr. Lynch was with the Aeros for two years and when his contract expired in 2020, and given the uncertainty of things with COVID, we opted not to extend his term. Our decision was not based on accusations. As president of our proud team I always have – and always will – take any and all input very seriously.

In an email I sent to our billeted parents last week I noted how very important it is that our team leaders, and valued community partners, act with integrity and professionalism. Our players need to feel safe and respected. To that end, as soon as complaints were received steps were taken to address the issues immediately and directly, including involvement by WSHL Commissioner, Ron White. It is also important to realize that Mr. Lynch quickly acknowledged his role, verbally and in writing, and made a commitment to adapt his approach. I can also

confirm publicly that improvement in Mr. Lynch's conduct was noted by numerous people, including by game officials.

Let me be very clear; inappropriate behavior – of any type and at any time – is never acceptable. But, it is also important to recognize that I and others could only take action on what we knew to be true. To that end we spoke with many people involved and immediately committed to provide full cooperation and assistance with further investigation of the concerns by the league, Safe Sport and the AAU/UHU. There was as much transparency, timeliness and integrity as we could bring to the situation. I can honestly say that the club collectively, and me personally, did what we thought was both responsible and accountable.

Some of you may have heard that after leaving

us Mr. Lynch was hired by the Fort Frances Lakers. I can only assume that club undertook the same level of diligence in hiring him that we had originally done, and I obviously cannot comment on any decisions made since then by the Lakers. For the sake of the club and for everyone involved I welcome any constructive, balanced and fact-based conversation about the past, and more importantly, our continued success for the future. We have a great team representing a great community. I am honoured to sponsor this source of pride for Edson and our broader community.

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GYPSD: 2020/2021 Transportation User Fees waived

(GYPSD) The Board of Trustees approved the waiver of all transportation fees for the 2020/2021 school year at the Public Board Meeting on March 24, 2021.

The Board recognized the financial hardship that many families experienced over the last twelve months. Transportation user fees are in place to offer services to our families, and we are happy to provide them as long as there is no impact to the funding that the Division receives for learning from Alberta Education, noted Brenda Rosadiuk, Board Chair and Trustee for the communities of Niton Junction, Wildwood, and Evansview.

Because of the ongoing pandemic, the cost of running transportation this year was significantly lower than previous years and lower than last


spring's projections, so we can afford to waive the fees for this current school year.

As per Board Policy 17, the Board annually approves transportation user fees to offer a range of unfunded services. Alberta Education provides transportation funding only to school jurisdictions for eligible riders to their designated school.

User fees are needed to cover transportation services that are not funded by the province including School of Choice for families who choose to attend a different school from their designated school; Alternate Second Seat for families

who request a second seat be held reserved on a different bus; Ineligible for families who live less than 2.4 kms from their designated school; and Transportation out of Division for families who reside within the GYPSD boundary but request transportation to attend school in another school division. In addition to the waiver of user fees for the 2020/2021 school year, the Board also approved a motion to not raise fees for the 2021/2022 school year.

Families who have paid their transportation fees for this school year can expect a refund by the end of





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County Council to consider new Tax Agreement Policy

At the March 23 Yellowhead County Council Meeting, Director of Corporate & Planning Services Barb Lyons approached Council for the consideration of a new Non-Residential Property Tax Agreement Policy.

With Council's approval, Administration would prepare a policy to set terms appliable to any non-residential property tax payment agreements that Council would then be able to vote to implement at a further meeting. Council was presented with background information during their 2021 Final Budget discussion of March 18.

The new policy would only affect non-residential property tax agreements. Approximately 5% of the municipal tax levy comes from residential property tax, whereas the other 95% comes from non-residential property tax. Tax payments are due in June each year.

Despite being aware of tax deadlines, several companies have come to the County each year after the deadlines asking for penalty-free deferred tax agreements. Some have requested penalty-free agreements for up to a 12month period after the due date.

County Administration expects that this will occur again in 2021, and therefore have suggested a policy be put in place to be able to firmly deal with such requests. A second tax penalty rate bylaw would also need to be implemented.

The current tax penalty bylaw (Bylaw 07.19) provides for a penalty of 6% to be applied to the unpaid tax in any current given year if the taxes remain unpaid on the due date. "This bylaw will remain in place and is applicable to any ratepayer with an unpaid tax levy on the due date if they have not entered into a formal tax payment agreement with Council," said Lyons.

It is now being proposed that if a ratepayer approaches Council proactively, in advance of the tax deadline, they could enter into an agreement with a lesser rate of penalty on any unpaid taxes after the due

date. It is also proposed that any tax agreement would follow the same term as the tax year, and all taxes would be required to be paid in full by December 31 of the year of the agreement. Any potential agreements would still have to be presented to and voted on by Council.

This policy would mean that ratepayers coming with their hands out after the fact would, by policy, be subject to the 6% penalty on any unpaid tax agreements, and only those acting proactively would be subject to a lesser rate. It is proposed that no penalty-free plans on tax agreements after the deadline would be made "in order to offset any financial impact to the County".

Councillor Anthony Giezen said it was an "absolute" that any agreement would have to be paid before the end of the tax year. He also wanted to ensure that the County would not be in a negative position if the policy were created. "I don't want to see somebody taking advantage of the rest of the taxpayers with this policy," he said.

Lyons made it clear that creating a policy and a second tax penalty bylaw is only to "set parameters." "It in no way, shape, or form guarantees an agreement," she said, as companies making the request would still have to come before Council and present their case for a lesser-penalty tax agreement.

"Thank you for offering to set parameters that we can use as guidelines as we go forward," said Councillor Penny Lowe, acknowledging that she appreciated the clarity that Council would be able to say no to proposed

"I support this completely," said Councillor Sandra Cherniawsky. "I think this is a very good thing for Council to have and I think it really gives us a firm footing when it comes to these companies."

Council voted to allow Lyons and Administration to prepare a potential policy and second tax penalty bylaw. They will be presented at a future

Sasquatch Program encourages recreationists to #LeaveItPristine

Camping season is almost upon us and Yellowhead County is continuing to find ways to educate and engage both residents and visitors to the area with their Sasquatch Program.

Yellowhead County has partnered with Clearwater County for the Sasquatch Program since June of 2015, and their Welcome to Our Backyard Campaign has helped bring awareness and education for the protection and improvement of the environment relating to recreation in Yellowhead County.

The campaign also promotes local recreation and tourism. Other municipal partners such as Brazeau County, Mountain View County, and MD of Greenview have also helped further the reach of the campaign.

Over the past six years, Yellowhead County has seen an influx of visitors – a number that saw an even larger jump this past summer due to the increased number of "stay-cations" caused by the Covid-19 pandemic.

Yellowhead County is expecting a large number of visitors this camping season as well, making the importance of the campaign even greater, as increased camping and other outdoor recreational usages can lead to more garbage, degradation of the natural environment, and risk of wildfires.

The campaign targets people in a number of ways, utilizing print advertisements, billboards, social media, visitor information centres, and more. These advertisements are done not only on a local level, but provincially and cross-border as well.

One such billboard that may have been spotted featured program mascot 'Sasqy da Sasquatch' saying, "Be Like Me, Don't Leave A Trace!" On social media, a Welcome To Our Backyard page found at

@SaskyDaSasquatch offers fun and engaging content for participants such as photo contests or a "Spot the Sasquatch" activity.

Visitors and residents have also been able to participate on social media by taking pictures of themselves in the area and tagging it with "Find It Clean #LeaveItPristine", a slogan that has been gaining in popularity.

The Sasquatch Program also takes the opportunity to promote public safety, with signage in different areas of the County encouraging preparedness. One such group of signs targets "River Explorers" and gives important tips and rules for using the river safely, as well as suggested items that someone should have with them before getting on the river.

The signs have also been tagged with numbers marking different locations, so that users can better be aware of where they have entered or exited the river in the event of an emergency.

Yellowhead County Communications Coordinator Stefan Felsing presented the current state of the program and campaign to County Council on March 18 at their Governance & Priorities Committee meeting and encouraged a discussion on the future priorities of the program.

"This is a really good program and I really like it," said Councillor Lavone Olson, asking if Council members could make suggestions for "problem spots" in the County that could use signage.



"That would be great to get that input," said Felsing. Other Councillors echoed how valuable the program is, with Councillor Dawn Mitchell saying, "I love the program. It just makes me smile."

Councillor David Russell complimented Felsing on the program's messaging so far and encouraged continuing to grow and expand on the work they've done so far.

"Education is key. We need to hammer the message home, we really need to up our game a bit," said Russell. "The numbers going in on the river is a fantastic concept. I think some of our busier areas away from rivers, where we have lots of people going in, we could do pin drops and do a numbered sign there and say, 'Write down this number because if you get lost in the bush, when you call emergency services, quote this

"These kinds of concepts are invaluable. We need to drive home the message that we all need to start taking care of our wildlands together or we risk losing them and losing the use of it," Russell said. He also suggested putting up example pictures of Dos and Don'ts regarding recreating in the County.

Following the meeting, Felsing spoke positively about Council's input on the program. "It was great to hear that Council is still very supportive of this project and sees the benefits of this type of education campaign. I think the recommendation of increased signage in high-traffic and wellutilized recreation and problem areas was a good direction from Council," he said. "The suggestion of the use of photos of illegal usage as part of this educational campaign can be implemented in a very practical way. It will help people quickly see what is not considered appropriate or legal use of recreational land."

Felsing also said that a 'Visit Us Again Sign' will likely be implanted this year or next, that will "thank visitors for doing their part to help keep our backyard beautiful and pristine."

Vision Park Well and Washroom Building

Edson, Alberta, March 31 – A new Well and Washroom Facility is coming to Vision Park.

The Town of Edson has received approval from the Government of Alberta to use \$1.1 Million in Federal Gas Tax Funds for the Project.

Federal Gas Tax funds are distributed to provincial governments which allocate the funds to all municipalities. This funding, along with the \$300,000 contribution from The Trans Mountain Expansion Project, will ensure the project moves ahead this year. The treatment facility will allow the town to tie-in a high producing water well on the east end of Edson, improving water security for east-end residents and major consumers including the local mill and hospital. It will also provide washrooms and a tournament central building for Adult Slopitch, Minor Ball and other users at Vision Park.

Edson Mayor Kevin Zahara says this project fulfills some important strategic priorities for Town Council. "Those priorities include ensuring a vibrant and healthy community and addressing our water needs in a financial and environmentally sustainable way. Vision Park is an important asset in our community, and this is an important piece of a larger plan to revitalize the ball facility."

MLA Martin Long is also excited for the project to move forward. "Edson has taken a creative and innovative approach by combining two facilities into one, enhancing what the community can provide to its residents. This project will create much needed construction jobs and provide opportunities for the community to once again host major ball tournaments which will bring economic spin-offs to the community."



Canada's Prairie provinces are pursuing equitable, timely and predictable business risk management programs for producers

(Alberta Agriculture and Forestry) The March 25 federal, provincial and territorial agriculture ministers' meeting resulted in a deal for farmers and ranchers. All three Prairie provinces voted in favour of removing the reference margin limit (RML), which will provide support to producers across the country experiencing declines in farm income.

The Prairie provinces also proposed that the

federal government provide their 60 per cent share of the cost to increase the compensation rate while allowing the provinces flexibility in the level of funding that they can provide. A number of provinces supported this motion, representing the vast majority of Canada's agricultural production. The Prairie provinces will continue to encourage the federal government to commit their 60 per cent share of the proposed compensation rate change.

"A majority of provinces participating in the FPT meeting voted in favour of the federal government's \$170-million change to AgriStability. This constituted the majority of agricultural production across the country. However, the federal government chose to withhold \$75 million in compensation funding for farmers, costing Alberta \$12 million per year in federal transfers. We are disappointed that the federal government chose to withhold these publicly communicated funds, especially when you consider that Alberta net transfers more than \$20 billion to Ottawa annually."



"Reliable business risk management programming is essential for the continued growth of the agriculture sector. Producers have made it clear that removing the reference margin limit will help the AgriStability program function as intended and make the program more effective and equitable. Removal of the RML will improve AgriStability so that producers can continue supplying the world with safe, high-quality food." —David Marit, Minister of Saskatchewan Agriculture

"We have listened to producers express

concerns that AgriStability is complicated and unpredictable. The reference margin limit creates additional uncertainty in the AgriStability program, especially for certain sectors of ag production, so Manitoba has agreed to remove it. We will continue to ensure our farmers and agri-food stakeholders are supported and remain a strong, sustainable sector."—Blaine Pedersen, Minister of Manitoba Agriculture and Resource Development

The Prairie provinces are working closely to advance policy reforms as part of the next agricultural funding framework in 2023 to improve AgriStability for all agriculture producers. The provinces are looking for solutions to make the next suite of programs simpler and more timely across all sectors.





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
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
