Warming Centre compound to be near Edson RCMP station

Manager, Community and Protective Services. "It's a heated trailer[s] to act as a warming location for overnight. It is not a shelter. It is not lodging. It is not a MAT [medication assisted treatment] program. It is not a replacement for the Shelter Pods. It only operates in the evening once a threshold of -25° Celsius including a wind chill, has occurred in the forecast. And it does not open during the daytime."

The revised protocol comes with a new location and layout, including two trailers. On the days that dip below -25°C, the warming centre will be opened at 8pm, allowing people to shelter in a warm building. The trailer will then closed at 8am, with occupants being vacated so that the trailers can be cleaned.

The facility would be supervised by a third-party security contractor on-site to monitor the use of the facility, provide regular wellness checks throughout the night, and contact emergency services if required.

After the deliberation from council on Dec 5, and further research, Administration proposed a new location for the centre. "We have sited a location just west of the Provincial building, east of the RCMP station, in the vicinity of 1st Ave," said Wagstaff. The location would not be directly in line with 1st Ave, to avoid unintended traffic.

This new site has many factors that make it superior to the previous location of Griffiths Park, according to Administration. It is close to the RCMP station. It is Town of Edson owned land. It has high visibility and has no residential buildings nearby. Finally, it is close to other services commonly used by unhoused individuals. The only noted disadvantage to the location is its proximity to the Provincial building which does house an early childhood program during daylight hours.

They proposed shelter compound would be laid out with two trailers and two portable washrooms surrounded by fencing. The whole site would be supplied with electricity by a portable generator, also protected by fencing. There would be parking spaces just outside the fence for security personal. In the event that security cannot come out to the site, the centre would not be opened. Local RCMP would make routine patrols of the area.

"What is the capacity of the trailers at any given time?" asked Councillor Ed Moore. "The capacity of each trailer is about 13 persons," answered Wagstaff. "I say about because if there are chairs, which we are able to have, there can be 13. With no chairs it can be as high as 17. We do intend on having at least somewhere for them to sit with a chair inside. So, the capacity of the two trailers is between 23 and 36."

Councillor Peter Taylor directed his question towards the Edson RCMP and Fire Department representatives that came to the meeting. "If we don't proceed with this, if we decide that the \$45 to \$55 thousand dollars that we're looking at is too expensive, what kinds of things do you think will happen in



the interim?"

"To be quite honest I don't have a definite answer," said Edson RCMP Staff Sergeant Christian Delisle, Detachment Commander with Edson RCMP. "Having worked with the homeless population for many years, they have always surprised me with how they can be so resourceful. So I don't have a definite answer, although there is a high risk, if we look at the winter time, of people freezing. That would be our fear." He also added that in terms of policing, they have also seen the resourcefulness of unhoused people extend to criminal action.

Bradley Milton, Edson Fire Chief, echoed Staff Sargent Delisle's response. "One thing that could be noticed is the potential for increased fires. Those would be fires of necessity, trying to stay warm. The other side of this is obviously the fact of someone freezing, and receiving those medical calls and responding to that. Frost bit feet, hypothermia, and other stufflike that."

Councillor Greg Pasychny, had a few concerns about the new estimated price for the project. He

asked Delisle who was around for the previous trailer project and Shelter Pods, and in his experience, would the trailers see enough usage. "I will struggle with spending taxpayers money on something that one, maybe two people will go in. I'm just looking for professional guidance here."

"Was the [previous] trailer successful? It really depends on your definition of success," answered Delisle. "I will say, yes it was successful, because some people used it when it was very cold. So we probably prevented someone from getting frostbite or freezing to death. I still believe that when we're talking temperatures of -25°C we have to have a

place at least where they have the choice to go."

"How long is this going to take to get set up? What kind of timeframe?" asked Councillor Gean Chouinard. "Within 5-10 days is the anticipated timeframe for us to have it set, and to have it operational," answered Wagstaff.

Pasychny asked for clarification on why the town can't just make use of the existing shelter pods in the emergency capacity. Wagstaff answered that there were multiple issues with trying to reuse the pods. They were much closer to businesses that may be disrupted. The insurance would not cover the pods in the same way as a the new trailers without increased monitoring and manpower. Chief Administrative Officer Christine Beveridge also pointed out that the Town doesn't own the Shelter Pods themselves, just the land

Evansburg Legion asks for clarity on future plans for a community hall

Members of the board for the Royal Canadian Legion in Evansburg provided an update to County Council regarding the operational plans for the Evansburg Legion/Community Hall facility.

Presenting to Council was Murray VanEe, President of the Royal Canadian Legion Evansburg; Floyd Fausak, Past President; and Cris Grahame, Manager.

"Our community Hall houses many organizations such as Cadets, line dancing, square dancing, markets, and community events. Groups like the Legion Ladies Auxiliary use our facility to fundraise and support many of our community projects and requests like our schools, the Legion Lodge, and assisting those in need," stated Grahame.

Yellowhead County has been deliberating for the past several years whether to build a new standalone community hall in Evansburg for the region. In the meantime, the Evansburg Legion has been receiving grants from the County towards its operation. "We want to thank the County for helping with the utility costs for the hall for the last two years and are hoping that you are willing to continue that for the next few years as we choose our directions," said Grahame.

"Naturally, we would love to stay

exactly where we have been for the past several decades. This would mean that upgrades would need to be made to the Hall and we have intentions of seeking funding through CFEP, UFA Grassroots Initiative Fund, and several other sources to upgrade our facility as laid out in the Stantec report in 2014," said Grahame. To bring the Legion building up to code would require a \$1.3M+ investment, based on a 2014 report. The building was put up for sale recently, but has since been removed from the market.

"This option would require a commitment from the County that no new Community Hall would be built within the next 10 years as our community is too small to necessitate two community centers such as ours," said Grahame.

"Should Yellowhead County choose to continue with their planned Community Hall, our space will no longer be relevant and we will not be able to afford to keep it as our budget relies on the community events and rentals we currently receive," Grahame stated.

The Legion representatives presented three possible options should the County determine building a new Community Hall is their preferred direction.

"The first option for our legion would be to move the lounge to the Evansburg Lodge restaurant area. As we already own the building, it would only need renovations compared to a purchase somewhere else," said Grahame.

The second option would be to collaborate with the Evansburg Senior Citizens Society to share use of the Heritage House.

"The third option would be to continue using our lounge space until we totally renovate the upstairs hall to include the lounge in the middle with two apartments on the north side and a meeting area on the south side. Once this is complete, we would renovate downstairs to include two more apartments and a rentable sports and/or party area," said Grahame. This would provide an income to enable to Legion to continue operating in their current building.

"With the help of the county and community, we are committed to providing an active Legion for the Evansburg area residence," Grahame added. "Definitely working together will make a stronger and more viable community."

"What are you asking from Yellowhead County today?" asked Mayor Wade Williams.

"We need to know a direction to go for the Evansburg Community Hall. We are fully prepared to go after the big grants. There are quite a few out there. To renovate that community hall does take a dedication from us to these grants. They are multi-year

grants. In the duration we would appreciate the continued assistance with our utility costs as you have done over the past couple of years through the operational grant," said Grahame.

Councillor David Russell asked, "What is your current membership and what direction is your membership going in?" Grahame responded, "Our current membership is at 167. With that is an increase of over 30 members from last year. She noted the new members represent a younger demographic.

Councillor Shawn Berry said, "I really appreciate the fact that the Legion has kept this community hall open for so long and has taken care of it as well as you have." Council members all concurred with that appreciation for the Legion's efforts.

Mayor Williams asked, "What is the likelihood of selling the existing hall if that was the decision that you make?" Fausak replied, "Realistically, if there's other community hall built or there is going to be, it's going to take some real critical thinking to transform that building into something profitable for somebody." However, the delegations remains hopeful.

Council accepted the presentation for information and will deliberate further on the matter.

9-8-8 number for mental health and suicide prevention

A new three-digit number, 9-8-8, has been implemented across Canada, for mental health and suicide prevention services. You will be able to call or text 9-8-8 from anywhere in Canada for free and will be directed to the appropriate mental health crisis or suicide prevention service in your area.



In the face of increased demand for crisis services, 9-8-8 will provide:

- A number that's easy to remember in a crisis situation.
- Support in English and in French, by phone and text.
- Quick access to support from trained responders, available 24/7/365.
- · High quality, evidence-based, equitable suicide prevention and crisis support for everyone in Canada.

In 2021, the Canadian Radio-television and Telecommunications Commission (CRTC) began a public consultation to determine if Canada should have a three-digit service for suicide prevention. In 2022, they issued their decision, adopting 9-8-8 as the number. This is the same number already in use in the United States.

The number went into service on November 30th, 2023.



Yellowhead County's Agricultural Services Department has received numerous calls regarding black growths on residents' fruit trees.

These tar-like black swellings are a sign of Black Knot and will distort and stunt any tree species within the Prunus genus.

Black Knot reduces the aesthetic value of affected trees and, if left long enough, may result in eventual death of the tree.

The disease spreads in the spring, attacking new growth on branches. The spores released by the fungi can be carried by wind and splashing rain.

The only reliable method of controlling Black Knot is pruning. Go to www.yhcounty.ca for pruning tips.
