

Who is behind 9-8-8?

In 2021, the Canadian Radio-television and Telecommunications Commission (CRTC) began a public consultation to determine if Canada should have a three-digit service for suicide prevention. In 2022, they issued their decision, adopting 9-8-8 as the number. This is the same number already in use in the United States.

The number went into service on November 30th, 2023.





Yellowhead County Development Permits are also posted online at www.yhcounty.ca. The public is considered officially notified of approved development permits once posted online, in accordance with the Public Notification Bylaw. The Yellowhead County Land Use Bylaw NO 09.21 provides that any person claiming to be affected by a decision of the Development Authority may appeal to the **Subdivision and Development Appeal Board or Alberta's Land and Property Rights Tribunal** dependent on jurisdiction of the appeal authority. Appeals under the jurisdiction of Yellowhead County's Subdivision and Development Appeal Board require a written notice of appeal and a payment of \$300.00 payable to Yellowhead County within 21 day of the publishing of the Notice of Decision.

Ann was born in Idaho Falls in 1937. Her father was a beekeeper, but passed away before Ann was in her teenage years. Her mother was strongly independent, and made her living as a professional photographer, raising Ann and her sister Sabina on her own. Ann completed her high school in Idaho Falls, and moved to Missoula, where she studied journalism at the University of Missoula. In the first part of



1962, she met Paul Steffes. They were married in the fall of that year, and settled in Plains, Montana, where Paul was working for the US Forest Service.

Their son Nick was born in 1966 in Missoula, Montana, and not too long after, Paul moved the family to Grande Prairie to work for the Alberta Forest Service. After a few years, they moved to Edson, into the house they have been in for the last 54 years. Patrick was born in 1969 at, what was at the time, the new Edson Hospital.

Ann worked for Alberta Recreation and Parks in Edson for many years at the original Provincial Building on Main Street, and later at the new complex on Second Avenue. She served as a union steward with the Alberta Union of Provincial Employees during this time. She was downsized during the Klein-years, turning her energy towards an incredible range of volunteer activities in Edson.

Books were a big part of Ann's world. She was involved with the design and planning of the new Edson Library in 1979-1980 and served on the board for many years. Regular library visits (and to Bill's Book Exchange in Edson) were frequent family outings. Ann's literature interests stretched far and wide, from the great classics to science fiction, and thrillers to obscure world history. There was no topic that remained unread, and the most wonderfully diverse and obscure titles fill every square inch of the house.

Ann loved music, and she had an enormous record collection that is as comprehensive as her collection of books. Whether it was Elvis, Pavarotti, Trooper or Pete Seeger, she enjoyed it all. As the digital world started to erode her ability to play a record, she discovered the "internets." This gave her a newfound delight to listen to and watch the great opera classics being performed.

There were few that could challenge Ann in her knowledge of all things. A game of Trivial Pursuit needed to have special rules for her, or the game was over too fast for everyone else. She enjoyed the annual Seniors Transportation Society trivia night, and she and her teammates were always at the top of the leader board.

From her early days, Ann was a prolific volunteer in the community. She volunteered with the library, the refurbishment of the Red Brick School, the Edson Cultural Heritage Organization, the Edson 100-year reunion, the Parkland Lodge Auxiliary, Family and Community Support Services and probably many more we will never know about. Her love of writing has always remained, and writing stories of the incredible lives of people in the Edson community has been consistent through all of her volunteer projects. Ann always had a warm smile for those around her and an incredibly clever sense of wit. She dealt with her burdens and challenges with an unbelievable positive attitude: "Everyone has maladies, some are just better at hiding them than others." Ann leaves behind Paul, her husband of 62 years, her two sons Nick and Pat (Joanne), and three grandchildren. A Memorial Service was held at the Sacred Heart Catholic Church at 4803 6th Avenue, Edson on Wednesday, December 20, 2023, at 2:00 PM. 
Quebec (Bill C-33) Hypocrisy Could Affect West Yellowhead Jobs

Dear Editor:

Recently the Bloc Québecois put forth an amendment to Bill C-33, the innocuous-sounding "Strengthening the Port System and Railway Safety in Canada Act" that could strike another blow against Western Canada and our energy sector, including in Hinton [and hundreds of jobs in the Yellowhead County region]. The amendment would accelerate the phasing out of thermal coal mining, including allowing the Federal Minister of Transportation Authority to establish a new schedule to implement a ban on the loading of thermal coal onto ships in port. At risk are hundreds of local jobs at the coal plant near Hinton which has been shipping thermal coal since 2019, dock workers in Vancouver, and railroad jobs.

The Bloc approach runs contrary to the Federal Government's current direction to phase out thermal coal by 2030. By utilizing the Federal Marine Act, the Bloc's original plan could have the transfer of coal stopped as early as the summer of 2024 – a full six years earlier then previously planned. By accelerating even the current Federal Government's 2030 plans, it will leave too little time for local communities and governments to prepare for the impacts of these job losses.

The Bloc's position also seems odd considering that Quebec is one of the largest recipients of Federal equalization payments in Canada and that Alberta is one of the largest contributors. And one



wonders if these Quebec nationalists aren't being hypocritical in their approach to the environment.

A few years ago environmental reviews were bypassed, and their own Provincial Government handed out hundreds of millions of dollars, to allow the construction of a cement plant in Port-Daniels-Gascons that became the largest emitter of "greenhouse gases" in the entire province. And we hardly need to be reminded of the massive quantities of raw sewage that Montreal has been allowed to dump into the St. Lawrence Seaway.

It is true that in 2021 the Federal Minister of Environment announced that "The Government of Canada considers that any new thermal coal mining projects, or expansion of existing thermal coal mines in Canada, are likely to cause unacceptable environmental effects". The Minister also ruled at this time that the coal expansion project near Hinton should face a federal environmental review. So the Province of Alberta and Alberta Municipalities must continue to speak out against external opposition to coal and fossil fuels until some key issues can be addressed: the steep and probably unnecessary costs of hasty implementation of such policies, and the need for practical implementation plans that are in sync with our international competitors.

Clearly the Federal Government and Bloc think the environment in Quebec isn't worth sacrificing any jobs for. But out West, well, no price is too high for us to pay to satisfy their patchy green credentials.
