

Kate's Kitchen restarts with community lunch on February 22

Kate's Kitchen community lunches are returning after a hiatus during Covid.

"Kate's Kitchen is restarting again at St Catherine's on Main Street. Wendy decided to start up after shutting down for Covid and then teaming up with the United Church these past two years," said Alison Reid on behalf of Kate's.

"There were many folks asking Joan Carter and others when we would be starting up as they missed coming to St Catherine's not just for a meal, but for fellowship and interaction," said Reid. "We held our Christmas dinner in December and served over 80 meals. Then we had our first monthly meal and fed 24 sit-downs and 16+ take-homes."

"The lunches will be the fourth Thursday of each month from 11:30 a.m. to 1:00 p.m. If we

have food left over we will be providing meals to shut-ins when possible. We will be asking local restaurants to possibly provide one meal once in a while. Mountain Pizza and Steak have always been so generous in supporting meals over the past several years," Reid said.

Carter said, "We started Kate's Kitchen in November of 2009. We were St. Catherine's Anglican Church at the time and we saw a need in our community to help the people who were struggling. We decided to provide a meal once a month, which doesn't seem much, but it was a start. The name came from the nickname that comes from either Catherine or Katherine, which is Kate."

"When we joined together with Grace Lutheran Church our volunteer base increased and we have enjoyed this joint venture together since then," Carter explained. "During the summer months we held barbeques which were very popular. Of course, in 2019 we had to close the doors because of Covid. At that time the United Church started their program and invited us to join with them, and the United Trinity Kitchen was born. It has continued up to the present time."

"Towards the end of last year, we received requests to start Kate's Kitchen up again, so we started with a Christmas Dinner in December," said Carter. "We are now continuing with a meal on the fourth Thursday of each month, which alongside the United Trinity Kitchen meal, provides a third meal in the month for our community friends to enjoy."

On February 22 Kate's Kitchen will hold another community lunch, which you are invited to join. Lunch will be available from 11:30 a.m. to 1:00 p.m.



Business Licence Renewals



With the beginning of every year, we would like to kindly remind our business owners to renew their business licence before the February 15th deadline for renewals.

The following changes were enacted last year with the updating of the Business Licence Bylaw.

- 1. Following a review and comparison of fees from similar sized municipalities, the fee structure has been adjusted and 'early bird discount' has been repealed;
- 2. Although Business Licences technically expire at the end of the year. Your business will remain compliant and is allowed to operate within the Town up until the February 15th deadline. Per our newly enacted Business Licence Bylaw No. 2280, failure to renew by February 15th, would deem the Business Licence invalid and the Business not being permitted to operate within Town limits until such a time when the Business Licence is renewed;
- **3.** Moving forward, to reduce paper waste, the Town of Edson will no longer be issuing paper Business Licence Certificates annually. We would ask business owners reaching their 5-year mark to place their new Business Licence stickers over the older stickers on the certificate.



Any person who is deemed to be affected by the issuance of any one of these permits may appeal to the Subdivision and Development Authority by 4:00 p.m., on the 21st day after the date of issue as published on the Town's website. On Permitted Uses, grounds for appeal must relate only to interpretation, variance, or relaxation of Land Use Bylaw 2070. On Discretionary Uses, all aspects of the proposed development may be challenged upon appeal. Written notice of appeal, accompanied by the appeal fee as established by Town Council, must be filed through the Office of the Secretary of the Subdivision and Development Appeal Board at Box 6300, Edson, AB T7E 1T7. Direct Control District Approvals cannot be appealed.

Even eliminating GST on carbon tax would lead to significant savings for Canadians

Even just scrapping the GST on carbon tax could save Canadians hundreds of millions of dollars

The Canadian Taxpayers Federation (CTF) is urging the federal government to put an end to its tax-on-tax practice, following the release of a report by the Parliamentary Budget Officer (PBO) that reveals substantial potential savings for taxpayers.

The report indicates that eliminating the Goods and Services Tax (GST) applied to the carbon tax could save Canadians hundreds of millions of dollars annually.

Franco Terrazzano, the Federal Director of the CTF, emphasized the significance of the PBO's findings. "The PBO is clear: the GST on the carbon tax will cost Canadians half a billion this year and more than \$1 billion every year by 2030," stated Terrazzano. "Prime Minister Justin Trudeau and his ministers are having a retreat in Montreal trying to figure out how to make life more affordable. Here's an idea: they could save Canadians real money

right now by picking up the PBO report and ending their tax-on-tax."

The federal government's practice of applying its sales tax after all per-litre taxes are added is commonly referred to as tax-on-tax.

According to the PBO's estimates, removing the GST paid on the carbon tax would result in immediate savings of \$486 million this year, with the potential to exceed \$1 billion annually by 2030.

A separate PBO report indicates that, even after rebates, the carbon tax costs the average family up to \$710 this year.

On April 1, the federal government plans to raise the carbon tax rates to 17 cents per litre of gasoline, 21 cents per litre of diesel, and 15 cents per cubic metre of natural gas.

"Ending the tax-on-tax would save Canadians every time they fuel up to go to work and heat their homes during the cold winter months," Terrazzano asserted. "Trudeau can and should make life more affordable by ending the taxon-tax and scrapping his carbon tax."

(RCMP Release) On Jan. 24, 2024, at 2 a.m., Edson RCMP responded to a complaint of a disturbance at a local residence. Upon arrival, it was determined that two people were injured and both were transported by EMS to a local hospital. They have since been released from the hospital.

An investigation ensued and as a result a 64 year old

resident of Edson was arrested and charged with attempted murder.

Local Ticket Challenger brings 28 years experience in law enforcement

Residents of Edson, Yellowhead County, and Hinton have a new resource when faced with a traffic ticket. Lindsey Carter and her team at Ticket Challenger are the only ticket agent based out of the County —close to home to better serve you.

As a ticket agent, Carter brings her expertise to help you fight back against fines, traffic demerits, and much more. "Unlike a lawyer, you can hire us for any provincial charges that you have against you," stated Carter. Throughout the whole process, both outside and inside the courtroom, the team will be working for you. They will look over the disclosure (evidence against you) and even complete your courtroom appearance.

"Like a lawyer, I look at disclosures to see if there's a good case against you or not, and if there are issues that I can look at or not. The other thing I will look into is the possibility of an early resolution. I can look at getting reduced charges, if people are looking at possibly losing their license, or getting their license suspended, or even jail time," explained Carter. Unlike lawyers, ticket agents cannot practice criminal law. But also unlike lawyers, they charge much less to complete the process. Their skills can be applied to any Provincial statute including traffic violations, violations of the Alberta Fisheries Act, Stray Animals Act, Tobacco & Smoking Reduction Act, and much more.

Carter doesn't come to this challenge unprepared. With over 28 years as a Police/Peace Officer with 22 years Traffic Enforcement, coupled with two years as a Provincial Prosecutor; she knows what she's doing.

"So now I'm going, I guess you could say, to the other side helping people with their violations," said Carter. "So I'm quite familiar with reviewing court packages and seeing if the evidence is there or not. I'm quite familiar with running trials, I've prepped for thousands of trials and run hundreds of trials."

Carter does the work to stay on top of all the latest changes to the system as well. One of the more recent changes will actually have a big effect on drivers. "It's concerning because it's going to affect a lot of people who don't even

realize it," explained Carter. "The Government of Alberta and insurance companies have now categorized all driving violations as either 'major violations' or 'minor violations'. If you get one major violation against you, they consider you a poor driver and your insurance rates can really skyrocket. If you get more than one minor ticket in three years the same thing applies, you're considered a poor driver and your rates can go up substantially —they can even refuse to insure you."

"You don't have to be looking at losing your license or going to jail to hire me to have a look at your case," said Carter. "There are many people who just don't understand the process and would rather pay their violations instead of taking the time when they have a reason to fight it."

Ticket Challenger isn't limited by geography. Their services can reach to Hinton, Jasper, Edson, Evansburg, Whitecourt, Mayerthorpe, Drayton Valley, Alexis, any locations in Alberta, and even into Saskatchewan.





Training was provided through the Learning Disabilities Association of Alberta and informed participants how to administer the screening tool to students.



Investing in natural drought

Watersheds are areas of land that drain rainfall and melted snow into streams, rivers and lakes. Healthy and resilient watersheds play an important role in preventing drought, reducing the risk of floods and supporting healthy communities and ecosystems.

This year, Alberta's government is providing \$3.5 million to fund eight projects in communities across the province through the Watershed Resiliency and Restoration Program. These projects will help restore riverbanks and watersheds, stabilize stream banks and improve natural drainage, supporting communities affected by recent droughts and floods.

"It has never been more important to improve the resiliency of Alberta's watersheds. By working with local communities and partners, we are helping mitigate the impact of future floods and droughts in communities across the province while creating healthier water bodies for future generations." - Rebecca Schulz, Minister of **Environment and Protected Areas**

Each year, communities and local partners receive project funding through the Watershed Resiliency and Restoration Program to increase the natural ability of Alberta's watersheds to reduce the intensity, magnitude, duration and effects from flooding and droughts.

Projects receiving funding are led by stewardship organizations, non-profits. Indigenous communities and municipalities to restore critical wetland and riparian areas while promoting the ongoing stewardship and preservation of critical watersheds.

To date, Alberta's government has allocated more than \$46.5 million to flood and drought resilience projects through the Watershed Resiliency and Restoration Program. -AgriNews

Grocery landscape in and flood protection Alberta and Canada

As the main food source for many consumers and the main sales outlet for many processors, the grocery sector plays a critical role.

"Amid increasing food costs in Canada, the grocery sector has become the focal point in food price conversations," says Jeewani Fernando, provincial consumer market analyst with the Alberta government. "The situation has prompted a parliamentary Standing Committee on Agriculture and Agri-Food to study grocery affordability and the Canadian Competition Bureau to study the retail grocery market and competition."

In addition, the federal government recently demanded leading grocery retailers in the country change their food product pricing practices. Canada's Office of Consumer Affairs has also established the Grocery Task Force, a dedicated team with a focus on the retail sector.

Meanwhile, representatives from grocery retail and food and consumer product manufacturing have worked together over the last 2 years to jointly develop a Grocery Code of Conduct. This code promotes predictability, transparency and fair dealing as products make their way from suppliers to stores, and ultimately to Canadians' homes.

"With so much happening in the grocery sector, it is important to understand the grocery landscape in Canada and Alberta. The information may help Alberta agri-food producers, processors, retailers and consumers better understand the grocery sector and make informed decisions."

As the primary food source for many consumers, and the primary sales outlet for many producers and processors, the grocery sector plays a critical role in Canada. Fernando points out some key factors about the structure of the grocery market in Canada and Alberta:

Canada's grocery industry is concentrated. Most Canadians buy groceries from one of 5 companies: Loblaws, Sobeys, Metro, Costco and Walmart. These companies hold about 76% of the grocery market share.

The rest of the market consists of a few large regional chains and thousands of independent retailers and convenience stores.

There are a number of banners operating under Loblaws, Sobeys and Metro. They compete with regional chains and independent stores.

The online grocery segment is still developing in Canada.

The grocery landscape in Alberta is more or less like the Canadian landscape. Four of the 5 largest grocers operate in Alberta under various banners (Loblaws, Sobeys, Costco and Walmart).

Compared to the national industry, Alberta ranks fourth in total annual sales and store locations. -AgriNews



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
