

thanks to the international firefighters with a small gift for each of them before they left. Katarynchuk used his own money to create and procure stickers, pins, and customized pictures for all the inter-national firefighters. For logistical reasons, meeting at the park was the easiest option. Alberta Wildfire decided to turn the meeting into a whole event for the community. All 215 South African firefighters turned out alongside other firefighters from Canada, Australia, and the USA.

The event started with the South Africans performing a song and dance while marching around Centennial Park. It is commonplace for South African firefighters to start each day with song and dance. So, as a final send-off to the town and county they worked so hard to protect, they decided to showcase some of those songs. They went up through the parking lot, around the museum, and across the bridge. From there they made their way to the front of the stage where they took up formation, did a small marching demonstration, then sang the South African national anthem.

All firefighters present then gathered in front of the stage for a final group photo. All of this was done while proudly carrying flags for Canada, South Africa, and Australia.

Following that, the South African A-Rep, Antoinette Jini, took a few moments to thank Edson and the County for their hospitality. She said they all felt very welcome here and were proud to represent their country and fight a longside their firefighting brothers and sisters.

Caroline Charbonneau, with Alberta Wildfire, also thanked the International Firefighters from South Africa and all

"Alberta Wildfire put out the call for assistance, and thanks to the many agreements we have with other agencies in provinces, territories, and countries, they sent us their highly skilled professional firefighters to help with these wildfires," Charbonneau said. "Today is the last day for most of our international firefighters. We want to wish them safe travels home in the next few days. And from bottom of our hearts, thank

Charbonneau and Jini then welcomed up Katarynchuk to thank him for his gifts while also giving him a chance to voice his thanks. "The fire was on three sides of me, I thank everybody because they came from all around the world to be on my doorstep. I'm truly appreciative of all the

help."

Edson Mayor Kevin Zahara also added words of thanks and appreciation. Mayor Zahara, West Yellowhead MLA Martin Long, and other members of the Edson Town Council then handed out pins to each firefighter present. The groups then spent some time mingling before heading back to camp.

Today there are nearly 2,400 wildland firefighters currently working in Alberta, 1.287 from Alberta and 1,077 from other jurisdictions. So far this season, more than 3,300 wildland firefighters have come to assist from across Canada, United States, Australia, New Zealand, Costa Rica, Chile, and South Africa. 400 members of the Canadian Armed Forces also gave assistance.

Grocery rebates don't add up

The additional **Energy Tax** imposed by the federal government on July 1, will

continue to drive up the price of groceries for everyone.

The federal government's onetime grocery rebate is a nice idea, it's just too bad that most Canadians won't quality for it.

To qualify, you must either have a household income of \$38,000 or less, or an individual income of less than \$32,000.

The maximum a person with no children can qualify for is \$234. A couple with four children can qualify for up to \$628. Many families will receive much smaller amounts.

While every little bit helps, does this one-off rebate make any lasting impact as food costs keep increasing?

Food producers, farmers, and transportation companies are all

being taxed more. And as the new tax reaches the gas pumps, Member Canadian Association of Journalists everyone will pay more for pretty

much everything.

Artificially inflating fuel costs as a mechanism to force societal change is a heavy-handed approach. It fails to take into account the multitude of logistical challenges of moving to new energy paradigm include vehicle range, payload, scarce recharging, availability, high cost and more.

Without having these 'ducks in a row' the new tax amounts to little more than a tax grab that impacts disproportionately on lower income residents, as well as an entire industrial sector.

What this government seems to fail to understand is that when greener energy begins to make financial –and– logistical sense to Canadians, many will rush to make the switch.

Have you noticed that grocery prices have gone up? That the cost of housing has increased? Life is

becoming more expensive every day. The price of this government continues to drive up the cost of living in all areas for Canadians.

Yellowhead County mailed the 2023 Combined Assessment and Tax Notices June 8, 2023. The deadline for paying taxes for Non-Residential properties is **July 31st, 2023**, and the deadline for paying taxes for Residential/Farm properties is **September 29, 2023**.

Beefing up access to capital for livestock producers

(AB) Alberta's government is ensuring the province's cattle sector can continue to grow and remain competitive.

Beef is Alberta's biggest agri-food export and raising loan limits will ensure the province's cattle producers are able to continue producing the world's best beef.

Amendments to the Feeder Associations Guarantee Regulation give feeder association members more options to purchase and market livestock and to generate better cash flow for their operations.

The changes raise individual and joint membership loan limits, excluding advances, to \$3 million from \$2 million.

"Feeder associations are an essential part of Alberta's livestock industry and are a proven way to support new entrants in primary agriculture. These amendments ensure thousands of producers across the province have access to the capital they need to keep producing Alberta's world-renowned beef." - RJ Sigurdson, Minister of Agriculture and Irrigation

Cattle prices have increased 25 per

cent since the start of the year and are expected to keep rising.
Alberta's livestock producers are in greater need of easily accessible, low-interest capital backed by a government guarantee.

Made up of local livestock producers, feeder associations take in cattle and sheep and feed them to get them to market weight before shipping them for processing.

Alberta's Feeder Associations Loan Guarantee Program helps local, producer-run cooperatives get competitive financing to ensure they can continue being a player in the global market.

"These changes will help to ensure continued sustainable growth in Alberta's livestock feeding sector, providing much-needed support to our existing feeder members while making this capital-intensive business more viable and accessible to new entrants and young farmers in the current market environment." - Philipp Lammerding, chair, Feeder Associations of Alberta Ltd.

These amendments follow last fall's Feeder Associations Guarantee Program's overall loan guarantee limit increase to \$150 million.

Appointment of County Weed and Pest Inspectors – Council appointed Nancy Brochu, Mackenzie Bull, Janet Miles, Abigayle Walker, Elizabeth Jones, Wesley Walker, Maddison Evarts, Josie Sexsmith, Stephanie Perrault, Ty Dickson, and Tannis Grant as Yellowhead County inspectors for 2023, pursuant to the Alberta Agriculture Pests Act and Weed Control Act.

Municipal Planning Commission (MPC) – Council adopted a Policy and Procedure for the Municipal Planning Commission. This helps to ensure all meetings are conducted in a consistent manner.

Brule Horse Holding Lease Request – Council approved a ten (10) year lease to Mr. Mark Halbert for the purpose of horse holding for the 6.20 acres of land described as Part of the NW-10-50-27-W5M, Roll #309381, for a yearly sum of \$300.00.

First Reading of Bylaw 02.23 – Council gave First Reading to Bylaw 02.23, a bylaw to amend the Land Use Bylaw and rezone Plan 7622234 Block 4 Lot 1 from Country Residential District (CRD) to the Protection District (PD). A Public Hearing for the Bylaw has been set for July 25, 2023 at 9:30 AM.

Hinton Area Grader Beat Tender

- Council awarded the 2023-2027 (multi-year) winter and summer gravel road maintenance contract to West Ridge Sand & Gravel Ltd. at the average rate of \$185/hour (GST excluded). This decision allows the gravel road maintenance program to proceed as planned.

Long Lake Road Embankment Slope Failure (Landslide)

-Council directed Administration to conduct remedial measures immediately on an embankment slope failure located on the south side of TWP Rd 560, approving an un-budgeted expenditure of \$785,000.00.

East-West Rural Major Connector Roadway Upgrading Options – A site tour of Twp Rd 542 and Twp Rd 544 was conducted on June 20, 2023, for Administration and Council members to discuss potential roadway improvement options. Following discussion on feasibility and the most economic options pertaining to both roadways, Council directed Administration to proceed with the engineering and design process of upgrading Twp Rd 542. This will allow for future consideration of the construction and paving of this roadway, subject to availability of funds.
