

Recreation Multi-Use Facility Update

Work continues by the Town of Edson and Yellowhead County towards the construction of a Multi-Use Facility for the region.

Unfortunately, due to inflationary pressures in the construction industry, the Request for Proposals for the Hillendale site came back substantially over budget. The project team was tasked with looking at alternatives which can achieve similar results, but within the approved \$70 million budget.

In June, six high-quality proposals were received from consultants to evaluate the possibility of revamping the existing Edson and District Leisure Centre to see how it could be upgraded and worked into the community needs and program requirements. It would also need to fit into the scope previously approved for federal funding.

The successful consultant will conduct a condition assessment for major building components and complete a conceptual design and cost estimate. The updated plan is expected to be complete by December 2022 and will be submitted to the funding agency for

approval at that time.

Both municipal Councils, as well as the Project Steering Committee, are continuing to meet and remain committed to ensuring a facility is developed for the community that meets the region's needs now and into the future.

Edson Mayor Kevin Zahara stated, "The numbers we received for the Hillendale site were very disappointing and unachievable. We know from the work that has been done that there are some benefits of the existing site including it's central location which is preferable to many town residents. There are also challenges but we hope with some fresh eyes and outside the box thinking we will be able to achieve a similar outcome utilizing some of the existing structure and reducing our costs. The work that is going to be done over the next few months will give us insight on what we can achieve at this site including getting an independent assessment of the major building components. We are fully committed on getting this project done as it a priority in both municipalities strategic plans."



Intersections aren't texting opportunities...

It was a series of déjà vu moments reminiscent of 'Groundhog Day'.



their phones while driving. This startlingly high figure

comes from a poll released by the Canadian Automobile Association.

Even talking hands-free on your phone while driving increases the risk of an accident by 4 to 5 times.

After many years, and at the cost of many innocent lives, it finally became firmly embedded in society that impaired driving is not only socially unacceptable —it's an irresponsible and life threatening behaviour.

That's where we need to get with texting and driving, because that behaviour causes even more harm than impairment. It has now become a sad fact that distracted driving (especially texting and driving) causes more deaths in Canada than impaired driving!

Fines can help, but education and social pressure can be far more effective tools. If we can get even one driver to put their phone down —lives can be saved.

While was driving through town I found myself repeatedly waiting behind vehicles, at otherwise empty intersections.

How many times have you been stopped behind a vehicle at an intersection, the light turns green, or traffic clears —and the car in front just sits there.

While 70 per cent of Canadians believe using their phone at a red light is unacceptable, it apparently hasn't stopped a lot drivers from engaging in this behaviour! The distraction caused by texting at a red light lingers up to 27 seconds afterwards, which makes getting through the intersection a lot more dangerous, when the light finally does go green.

People who text and drive are 23 times more likely to be involved in a crash or near crash event compared with non-distracted drivers

Yet one third of Canadians admit to frequently texting on

FCSS Advisory Committee effectiveness reviewed

During the Town's Committee of the Whole meeting on July 12, Administration brought forward a discussion regarding the effectiveness of Town Council continuing to act as the sole Family Community Support Services (FCSS) governing body.

Community Development Manager Tanya Byers pointed out possible opportunities to involve community members and Yellowhead County to a greater degree in setting direction for, and providing oversight of, the FCSS program. Research has shown that in Edson 30% to 40% of residents who partake in FCSS programs are from the surrounding Yellowhead County.

Currently the FCSS Advisory Committee is composed of Town of Edson Council members that meet with Administration quarterly. The advisory committee serves to ensure the Family Community Support Services (FCSS) program operates within the approved budget and is meeting the needs of the community.

Byers put forward three options that could be explored and which align with Provincial FCSS parameters including:

1) Status Quo: Continue with the current model of communication wherein Administration provides Council with FCSS updates as required during Council and Committee meetings only, and engages Yellowhead County administratively twice per year as per the agreement. This model limits direct involvement of County Council and residents.

2) Establish a Town FCSS Board, consisting of Town residents and Councillors, and engage Yellowhead County administratively twice per year as per the agreement. This model provides the benefit of

engaging residents directly and alleviates pressure on Council's schedule, but it does not allow for County input at the Board level.

3) Establish a Joint Town/County FCSS Board, which would include Town Council, Town residents, County Council, and County residents. This is the recommended option by Town Administration, as it provides the most input and involvement of the municipal partner, Yellowhead County, in the program.

Mayor Kevin Zahara stated the importance of having public involvement. "I think it's also important the County has a say."

Councillor Krystal Baier agreed with the mayor on option three.

Councillor Greg Pasychny, asked what would be gained by creating a new board, considering new expenses incurred by the choice. "I am not sold on what we would gain as a municipality with another board."

Administration responded by pointing out that the perspective gained by involving the community would be valuable. People in the community would be far more aware of its needs, and changing demographics within it. Chief Administrative Officer Christine Beveridge stated, "I have seen some very active boards that very much drive new initiatives. It's another way of allowing community members the opportunity to help

build their community."

Councillor Gean Chouinard advocated for option one, "If it's not broken, don't fix it."

Mayor Zahara added,
"We have had FCSS
meetings as a council
and frankly we are not
experts in this at all. It is
way outside our
wheelhouse in many
things. Council should

be acting at a more strategic and higher level and let those that are more knowledgeable in that area, especially FCSS and a lot of the social issues that we face as a community, provide that input and recommendations back to council." Zahara added, "I do not believe FCSS is getting the feedback

they needed."

Council agreed to explore option three with Administration bringing back more information on how the board would be structured and better define the role of its members. Those options would then be brought back to council for further deliberation.


Edson RCMP partner with Crime Reduction Unit to combat thefts from oil sites

Yellowhead County – Edson RCMP have noticed an increase in thefts from oil sites throughout Yellowhead County. In efforts to curb the criminal activity, Edson RCMP engaged the Western Alberta District Crime Reduction Unit (WAD CRU), who are an Alberta RCMP Unit mandated to target rural property crime. With the assistance of a criminal intelligence analyst, WAD CRU are available to support detachments in Western Alberta and assist them in addressing these crimes.

Between June 13 and 17, 2022, WAD CRU, based out of Grande Prairie, worked in the Edson RCMP jurisdiction in an effort to curb the thefts at oil sites. WAD CRU were able to establish a list of possible suspects responsible for cable thefts on these sites, and conducted surveillance on these suspects throughout the County for five nights.

As a result of these efforts, three known offenders linked to cable thefts were located on outstanding warrants and were arrested.



Over \$40 million investment to kickstart \$20 billion in carbon capture projects

Emissions Reduction Alberta's Carbon Capture Kickstart to accelerate Alberta's transition to a low-emissions future

(G of A) The Government of Alberta is investing over \$40 million through Emissions Reduction Alberta (ERA) in 11 projects focused on advancing the province's global leadership in carbon capture utilization and sequestration (CCUS). If successful, these projects could lead to over \$20 billion in capital expenditures, create thousands of jobs, and reduce about 24 million tonnes of emissions annually—this is the equivalent of reducing Alberta's annual industrial emissions by almost 10 per cent.

On July 13, 2022, ERA and the Government of Alberta announced the approved projects for the Carbon Capture Kickstart: Design and Engineering funding opportunity. This funding advances CCUS-related technologies in step with emerging Provincial and Federal policies. Many of these projects represent the first stage of significantly larger overall project plans. All funded projects plan to be up and running by 2030.

Funding recipients represent industrial sectors including power generation, cement, fertilizer, forest products, and oil and gas. Large emitter sites across Alberta, from Medicine Hat to the Industrial Heartland, Hinton to Exshaw, and in the Alberta Oil Sands, will participate. This investment is sourced from the Government of Alberta's Technology Innovation and Emissions Reduction (TIER) Fund. Hinton Bioenergy Carbon Capture and Storage Project ERA funding: \$2.49 million Project cost: \$15.58 million.

Carbon Capture Kickstart helps position Alberta companies to take advantage of the Federal Government's tax credit for capital invested in CCUS projects starting in 2022, the Government of Alberta's carbon sequestration hub approach, and aligns with the \$305 million over four years earmarked by the province for future carbon capture projects.

Natural Resources Canada (NRCAN) is also committing up to \$50 million through its CCUS Front-End Engineering Design (FEED) Studies funding program to 11 projects, five of these are Alberta-based projects also receiving funding from ERA. ERA and NRCan worked closely to jointly leverage funds for projects based in Alberta.

"Blue-green algae is actually cyanobacteria, and can produce toxins that can be dangerous," says Shawn Elgert, agricultural water engineer with Alberta Agriculture, Forestry and Rural Economic Development (AFRED). "It can cause organ damage or even death if ingested by livestock or pets."

"If you are trying to determine a cause of poisoning, there are other potential toxins on the farm that can also cause harm to cattle such as water hemlock or batteries. You may need to talk to a veterinarian for assistance in determining the cause.'

Elgert says the first and most important step is to identify the type of growth. "Blue-green algae can look like blue-green scum, pea soup or grass clippings suspended in the water. You should start watching for it when the temperatures rise above 25°C.

If blue-green algae is suspected in a dugout, it is best to be cautious, says Elgert. "You should contact a water specialist to diagnose the growth to determine if it is potentially a toxic growth. You should also remove your livestock from the water source in the interim and prevent them from accessing it. One rule of thumb is that if you can grab it as a solid mass in your hand, it is not blue-green algae."

If blue-green algae is present, the dugout can be

treated using a copper product registered for use in farm dugouts. "Once you treat it, consumption should be restricted for up to a month. The use of copper will break the cells open and release the toxins if present into the water all at once. It is important that cattle do not drink the water during this time so the toxins can degrade. You can follow up with aluminum sulfate and/or hydrated lime treatments afterwards to remove the nutrients from the water to prevent regrowth. Sometimes these coagulant treatments are better than a sole copper treatment.'


Elgert says there are also preventative measures that can be taken to try to avoid the problem. "Temperature is an important factor in the growth of blue-green algae, so a deeper dugout with steeper slopes while avoiding slope deterioration would help make the dugout water cooler."

Nutrients are required for growth of blue-green algae. "We have information on how to reduce nutrients from entering the dugout in our Quality Farm Dugouts manual. Buffer strips, grassed waterways, culvert controls and off-source watering systems are examples of how you can reduce nutrients.'

Dugouts should not be built in the waterway, as sediments can bring more nutrients into the dugout and depth can be lost quickly, adds Elgert.

"Aeration of the dugout can also help improve the water quality. A dye packet can also be thrown into the dugout to help prevent photosynthesis from occurring, thereby reducing the growth of blue-green algae. However, one action alone may not be enough to prevent growth."

Elgert also notes that the wind can push the blue-green algae into highly concentrated pockets where the risk of harm is higher. "Since blue-green algae can rise or fall in the water column, inspection of the dugout should include peering into the deeper part of the water. Always be safe around the dugout by going along with another person and have a rope with a flotation device attached."


