declaration. "This is what we would see in an average month," said Zahara. "No infrastructure can handle that amount of rain in that short of time. All town crews are deployed to handle this as best we can."

6th Avenue between 47th and 48th Street was closed to traffic right as the Town dealt with flooding issues in the area. The road was closed to set up water pumps in the area. "Bench Creek is up to the bridge in Centennial Park and we have localized flooding in various neighbourhoods," Zahara said.


"We've had over 85mm of this rain in a very short time and we are trying our best to minimize damage. We have extra pumps deployed to divert the water," said Town CAO Christine Beveridge.

The Town Office phone lines and internet were down on June 19. Beveridge said, "If you are experiencing flood please call the after hours emergency line at 780-723-6300."

A high water level emergency alert was issued for the town at 4 p.m. on June 19 due to the heavy rainfall. There were warnings of localized flooding in areas around creeks and ponds in the municipality, according to the Alberta Emergency Alert.

The town's storm sewer system was running at capacity as the unprecedented storm surges challenged its volume. The Edson landfill was closed "until further notice" due to deteriorating road conditions and bridge concerns [the landfill reopened June 21].

"We've been asking for rain for so long and it all came at once, which is great to see for the forest fire situation, but obviously not for what we're seeing," stated Mayor Zahara. There is some damage to road infrastructure, culverts and sinkholes. The Mayor expects 6th Avenue to be closed for some

An emergency alert was also issued for all of Yellowhead County on June 19. "We are experiencing heavy rainfall resulting in overland flooding, snow accumulation, fallen power lines, and in some areas, power outages. Please take immediate action to ensure your safety and the safety of those around you, including livestock," the alert said.

A Shelter in Place was issued on June 20 at 4pm for residents in parts of Peers due to heavy rainfall. The Peers Bridge was compromised. Emergency responders assisted in getting people out of the area, stated the County.

Sandbags and structural protection guards were being set up in communities and rural and hamlet homes. "We've talked to all the residents and everyone is safe but no one can get in or out," Yellowhead County CAO Luc Mercier said. "There's no other egress."

A flood evacuation order for lower Robb, which was issued June 19, was to remain in place until at least Wednesday. A Reception Centre was open at the Robb Multiplex. Cadomin was expected to be without power for several days due to snow pulling





Public transport options for Edson being studied

down power lines.

"We go from wildfires and we're praying for water and now we're asking for the water to shut off," said Yellowhead County Mayor Wade Williams in an update on June 20. "We're just jumping from one emergency to another and it's tough to handle. Crews are tired. Everyone is tired, but we can't stop."

Water levels in local rivers and streams were expected to peak by June 21-22 with levels expected to go down in the coming days. The Town and County advise to keep clear of flood waters due to safety and health concerns.

Due to decreased fire activity, the Yellowhead County area surrounding Edson has been downgraded to a wildfire alert advisory. In a positive update from Alberta Wildfire, the fire south of Edson/Carrot Creek/Niton Junction (EWF031) is now classified as Being Held as of June 20, 2023. This is in addition to Evansburg and Wildwood area fires (WCU001/002) being held as of June 16, 2023, and the Shiningbank area fire (EWF035) was classified as Being Held on June 18, 2023.

Wildfires can quickly become active again if conditions are hot and dry enough. A four-hour wildfire evacuation alert remains in effect for Edson. Residents should be ready to leave in a short time frame if conditions worsen.

study covering non-vehicular travel and options for public transport. Starting on June 5, EXP representative Stephen Power, traveled around Edson meeting with various groups to discuss the topic.

In June of 2020, EXP did a small survey on transportation. Participants were asked to rate Edson on a scale of 1 to 10 on how effectively their transport needs were being met. The result was an average score of 6/10, meaning that overall, Edson may be able to do better. Right now the only public transport available in Edson is the Seniors' Bus.

Specifically the study focused on how Edson can improve travel for people without a vehicle or who choose not use one. "Which means there's a big focus on active transportation. Things like walking, cycling, mobility scooters, and public transportation," said Power. Edson is in a unique position with its more compact size that come with being a highway town. The highway itself also creates unique challenges for people commuting within town limits. EXP has completed background analysis and has now moved into the public and stakeholder engagement portion of the study.

This process began on June 5 with a meetings between Power and the interagency committee, followed by public discussion with seniors at the Seniors Week BBQ, and a tours with ESTS (Edson Seniors Transport Society). They also talked with the Edson Friendship Centre, McMan, Alberta Health Services and with grade 8 students at HRH. Then on June 7, Power along with Edson FCSS representative Marsha Shack, hosted a drop-in for the public at Edson Public Library from 3:30pm to 7pm.

Power said that they have received a lot of good feedback. "We're starting to see a lot of consistency too. There are definitely a lot of themes emerging."

Things such as popular/key destinations, places lacking sidewalks, and popular routes and trails were all recoded for the study.

Results from the project will be compiled and presented sometime within the month of August. EXP will compare and contrast the feedback from this study with what other small towns have done to address the issue. "We're looking at all the options. There's lots of different places that do a lot a different things," said Power.

Longtime Edson Principal set to retire

junior and senior high school is an extremely busy job, which it is, so when Churchill was asked what she will be doing to fill her time during retirement she said, "My plans are wide open. I would like to stay connected to both of my favourite schools through substitute teaching and volunteering." Outside of school, Churchill has plans to spend time with her family and friends through travelling and outdoor activities. "Not to mention just getting back to the balance of life. "I plan to read all of the books I have accumulated, and didn't have to read over the years." Plus she looks forward to spending some well deserved time with her husband, hunting, fishing and enjoying their new grandbaby in November.

As she looks back at her time at Vanier and HRH and the many memories she has made, there is one in particular that stands out. "One of my fondest memories was having the pleasure of presenting grade 12 graduation certificates to four very special students who were in my care from age 3 (PALS program) at Vanier to 18 (Beyond the Classroom) at HRH. I will never forget that day and the pride I felt."

Next year, HRH will welcome a new Principal in Sandy Whitten. When Churchill was asked if she had any advice for her successor, she said, "Relationships! Relationships! Relationships! They lead to a culture of commitment, excellence and respect where all students learn, develop and grow. Start from day one and let it take you where it may."

And now, the school says goodbye to Mrs. Churchill, and wishes her well in her retirement. "I am going to miss the fun, laughs, and robust culture of activity that made my job so interesting all the time"

International firefighters come to aid of local wildfire crews

In early May, the first of the Alberta forest fires ignited in Yellowhead County. This was only the first of what has become one of the worst years for forest fires in decades. Alberta Firefighters have been on the frontlines since the very beginning. However, with this year being as bad as it is, more help was needed to keep the fires under control.

In the past few months Alberta
Firefighters have received help, not
only from other provinces and the
Canadian military, but also from
international fire crews.
Detachments from South Africa,
Australia, and other countries have
come to assist the already
hardworking Canadian firefighters.

The first of the international fire crews arrived in the area on the weekend of June 3. "When we first came to Edson, we came to the base camps and we could see multiple plumes of smoke in the area. For us, we could tell from the fire behaviour we could see and the smoke we could see, that they were fairly intense moving, at a fairly rapid rate through the forest. From that we knew we were going to have some significant days ahead of us," said Andrew Stewart, Fire Crew Leader with the South Australian County Service.

Each of the crews work in a 14 days on and 2 days off rhythm, and will stay in Canada for around 40 days. Crews are working along control lines and fire breaks taking out hotspots to stop the spread of the fire. "Its a big challenge working with crews from all over the world. Everybody has different levels of training, different experiences, and they're used to different work practices. So being able to bring what I know to the team and lead them is quite important to steer the direction and strategy to contain these fires and prevent impacts to the community," said Stewart.

Stewart has never been to Canada before, but is proud to be here and helping out. "I'm very proud to be able to represent my country and come support Canada. In 2019 during fire season for us in Australia, we also received support from Canadian crews when we had a bad season. The fire fighting industry is a big brotherhood and sisterhood, so it's good to repay the favour," said Stewart. "I'm very passionate about my job. I get a lot of satisfaction helping the community. That's not just my community, but the wider human population. You get a lot a gratitude in that."

Sietse Vandermeulen, a
Firefighter with Alberta Wildfire,
said, "They're very positive and
very proud of the country they're
representing and they bring that
enthusiasm with them. We've been
bogged down working day in and
day out, so to have that positivity, to
have that enthusiasm, and that
eagerness to help out has been
phenomenal for us. A good morale
boost for sure."

"It's a good experience learning new things as we come from a different environment for firefighting in South Africa," said Antoinette Jiai, Firefighter and A-Rep with The South African crews. "It's a great exposure in learning and making sure that we make a difference to protect the environment and the communities and everything around. It's very exciting, and it's very motivating to come all the way from South Africa and lift the flag of South Africa and make a difference. We as South Africans, I think, are very passionate about making a difference. We want to be the leading integrated fire management in the world. And so we strive to make that difference and we live according to those values."

South Africa has sent at total of 215 people to fight the fires —200 crew and 15 management. This not the first time South Africa, or Jlai herself has come to Canada. She was in High Level in 2019 and Manitoba in 2021. "So far my team has been excellent in what they do. They've done a great job. When we arrived we went straight to the frontline and there was a great improvement and a great

excitement in the team that was here." She added, "In the beginning we could not understand because the terminology was different. Our terminology back home was so different. There's a lot to learn and it is a journey. We are looking forward to equipping each other with practicals that we are doing and that we are taking it home and implementing it and improving ourselves in terms of understanding that different things that Canada

uses around their fires."

As the rain falls and people return to their homes, Andrew Stewart had a few words to share, "People might be coming home to a different landscape. It's important to stick together during this time. Speak to you neighbour, speak to your family and friends, and make sure you support each other during this time. There are people who may have lost personal belongings, so it's important we stick by them and support them during these times."

NEW! Busing Distance Eligibility Update for September 2023

In April 2023, the Alberta Government approved changes to the distance eligibility for transportation service effective for September 2024.

• The eligible transportation distance criteria of 2.4 kms from the student's primary residence to the school will be reduced. **New** distance criteria for eligible service is:

1.0 km or more for children in kindergarten and students in Grades 1-6; and,2.0 kms or more for students in Grades 7-12 will qualify for transportation service.

As a phased approach to implementing the new service criteria, Grande Yellowhead Public School Division is moving to implement the changes for September 2023.

Families who qualify for eligible service under the new distance criteria are invited to register for busing as soon as possible.

The Division will try to accommodate as many newly eligible riders as possible. Registrations received after June 30, 2023, are subject to seat availability.

FEE-BASED SERVICES: INELIGIBLE AND ALTERNATE (SECOND) SEAT REQUESTS FOR SEPTEMBER 2023

Requests for ineligible bus service should also register by the June 30 deadline; however, please note that eligible students will have priority on all routes.

Based on increased eligible riders, ineligible riders may not receive confirmation of a seat until after September 30, 2023. Additionally, requests for alternate (second) seats on other bus routes may not be confirmed until after September 30, 2023.

The Division is currently looking to recruit and train new bus drivers in anticipation of increases to eligible student ridership once the mandatory service requirement comes into effect in 2024. Please visit the **Careers** page on the Division's website at www.gypsd.ca/working-at-gypsd.







Catherine Talbot, Director for Roots of Empathy and Laurie Mortin, Alberta Provincial Manager for Roots of Empathy recently had a video conference with the Weekly Anchor about their program that has been in place for over 27 years.

Talbot said, "Mary Gordon is the founder and president of Roots of Empathy. She developed the Roots of Empathy program in 1996. Mary was born and raised in Newfoundland and with having a background as being an educator, she came through the system as a kindergarten teacher. Her life shifted and she moved to Toronto, which became the birth place of Roots of Empathy. Mary got the idea and developed the program and it has been 27 years strong delivering programs in all provinces in Canada, globally on three continents, as well in several languages. It reaches over a million children. Mary's vision was to change the world child by child."

"What's really quite amazing is to be affiliated with an organization which globally is actually living that vision through the work that we do and

"We were very pleased to receive an international award through an organization called Hundred. Five years ago, they looked across the world at 100 social innovations across a number of sectors and we were awarded five years consecutively, one of 100 innovations for education in the world. What is even more significant and humbling is that this year, they started their Hall of Fame and we were inducted. Only four organizations globally were chosen. We do our work in partnership with

organizations that support children and families. We couldn't do the work we do without our volunteers," said Talbot.

"The motivation behind Mary's dream started when she was a child growing up in the inner city,

schools, school divisions, community agencies and

she saw a lot of domestic violence and abuse. She was trying to figure out how to break that cycle of intergenerational abuse. Mary decided to write this program Roots of Empathy, believing that if we can develop and support empathy in children at a very young age, then there is hope for a more civil peaceful society moving forward," said Talbot.

"We deliver this program from kindergarten to grade eight. We have a sister program called Seeds of Empathy and that is a program we offer in Childcare Centres. It is really focussed on early literacy learning and emotional skill development in smaller children," said Talbot.


Mortin said, "We often hear later from teachers who's classroom has participated in the program, that they have noticed a more positive change in how the students interact and play in the playground. They include others to come play more, they are kinder, they understand and can express their feelings. They start knowing who they can maybe help and bullying starts to shift as they become more confident about bringing their voices forward."

"Right now we have schools participating in Edson and Niton. Some of schools took a break with the pandemic, so we are just getting back out there again within the communities. We are very happy to be back in person in the classrooms again," said Mortin.





"We moved Kate's Kitchen from the Anglican Church to the Edson United Church earlier this year," said Carol Ganter with Kate's Kitchen.

"As in most cases there is always a shortage of volunteers. Their volunteer base was getting smaller and we also have a larger facility at the United Church than they do," said Ganter. "Through conversations with everybody it was determined the United Church might be a better site for Kate's Kitchen, so we brought the Kitchen over to the United Church."

"Wednesdays are prep days to get everything ready. Then on the first and third Thursday of each month from 11:30 a.m. to 1:00 p.m. we serve lunch and everyone is welcome to attend," said Ganter.


