Town's Rural Renewal Stream Program reviewed

to empower rural communities, in partnership with settlement providing organizations and local employers, to recruit and retain newcomers to live, work and settle in their communities.

Since being approved as a Designated Community under the program on November 8, 2022, the Town of Edson has sought to recruit, attract and retain newcomers to the community as a means to address the job vacancies encountered by local employers. The process would be employer driven, with those interested in using the program having to apply to begin the process. All application forms will go through the Town of Edson before going to the Province.

Through a partnership with the Edson and District Community Learning Society (EDCLS), a settlement service provider, the Town has been working with employers within the community to facilitate this recruitment process while adhering to the guidelines set out by Alberta Immigration. There is also a support network in place to help new-coming workers integrate with and thrive within the community.

To date, the following outcomes have been achieved under the program: 20 employers have expressed interest in the program. 11 employers in total have taken part in the program. 16 employer applications have been submitted. 8 endorsement letters have been issued. 55% of the employer applications come from the food service industry, with the second largest being gasoline stations and convenience stores at 18%.

Nyambirai stated that participation in the Rural Renewal Stream would, "attach and retain newcomers to our community, as well as address our needs for skilled and unskilled labor shortages, and lastly to bolster economic development and growth." Also that the program supports the local business community while promoting the town as a place to live and settle.

During the discussion, Councillor Gean Chouinard asked, "When we're employing people though the Town, will the Town be holding any liability if things go wrong? Because what I'm seeing is similar to Immigration or Canada Centre helping."

"All we do as a municipality is review applications," answered Nyambirai. "From there they would move on to the provincial government and then, later on, to the federal government when they make their applications. Having said that, I don't see ourselves being liable for any of these things that can take place, as we are merely a facilitator."

"In the past, when we've had immigrant workers come to Edson, sometimes the employers have had to provide accommodations, does this apply in this instance?" asked Councillor Krystal Baier.

"Within the application that they submit to us

residency, we have no way of telling them whether to stay or leave the community," he explained.

Nyambirai added that they are working with employers to make sure that they provide a welcoming and inclusive environment for employees.

"What other communities have similar programs?" asked Councillor Ed Moore. Nyambirai responded, "To date there are about 38 other communities that are participating in this program. The program is specifically for rural Alberta municipalities."

Councillor Trevor Bevan asked if employers are mostly looking for skilled or unskilled workers with their applications. Nyambirai responded, "It's definitely a mix right now. We are seeing that it's almost an even split. There are some positions that require certain certifications for the candidate to be allowed to come into that job. Overall for the program, you have to have a minimum of high school education to participate. Some industries may require a bit more." "Given that it is a bit of a cumbersome process, what is a rough time in which employers can expect to see their workers?" asked Councillor Baier. Nyambirai responded, "The rough time I would give them is about two weeks. Within those two weeks we just basically go through the rigorous process of making sure that whatever they have given to us is good enough for us to approve, so that when things go on to the provincial government everything is in order."

Mayor Kevin Zahara added that there is a great need in Edson for new employees. He then asked, "Do we know which countries the applicants are coming from?" Nyambirai responded, "Through the application process we do ask for candidate information. I don't have the stats right now to present, but they come from all over. Some are in Canada already on a temporary visa and are looking for something more permanent."



Town updates Bylaw Enforcement Officer appointments

During the March 7 Edson Town Council meeting, council reviewed a change to the Bylaw Enforcement Officer Bylaw No. 2290.

Tyler Robinson, Senior Manager, Protective Services for the Town of Edson stated that Edson's existing Peace Officer Bylaw No. 2059 is worded inconsistently with comparable bylaws of other municipalities.

In particular, other bylaws delegate the authority to appoint Bylaw Enforcement Officers to the Chief Administrative Officer.

Robinson stated that, "It's important to keep in mind the two categories of enforcement officers that are likely to be employed by most municipalities, including the Town of Edson, and how they may be appointed."

This position has the authority to enforce all Town bylaws and many Provincial statutes, but no Criminal Code offences. A CPO Level 1 appointment is granted by the Province and is automatically authorized to enforce local bylaws without separately being appointed as a Bylaw Enforcement Officer.

Bylaw Enforcement Officer – This position has the authority to enforce Town bylaws but not Provincial statutes. This appointment does not require approval by the Province.

The Town of Edson currently has a Community Peace Officer (CPO) Level 1.

Administration presented a proposed update to the bylaw with the substantive change that the authority to appoint Bylaw Enforcement Officers,

along with handling complaints and


addressing discipline, is delegated to the Chief Administrative Officer. Administration stated these changes are in compliance with the Municipal Government Act.

"Is the bylaw position a union position, and if so, does that change any of the disciplinary procedures within the bylaw?" Asked Councillor Peter Taylor. "Yes it is a union position," replied Robinson, "and as far as disciplinary procedures, they would have to take an oath and the authority to discipline is delegated to the CAO or a designate."

The update to the bylaw was then moved though first and second reading. The third reading of Bylaw Number 2290 was carried unanimously by council, bringing it into effect.

stacked calls? Why don't Red Alerts that happen outside Edmonton and Calgary get counted? Are response times still 'call to door' or is it now 'dispatch to door' as they signalled in past announcements? Is that how they got down to a 17minute response time in the cities?"

Now, imagine attempting CPR on a loved one for 17 minutes or longer while waiting for an ambulance to arrive. Or imagine being with your loved one that is in incredible pain while waiting 17 minutes or longer for help to arrive. That's simply not good enough.


A new research report by Parkland Institute — "Lights and Sirens: The Critical Condition of EMS in Alberta" — examines the current crisis facing paramedics in the province.

While the provincial government tries to blame the EMS failures on increased call volumes, the report argues that the problem—and its solutions—go beyond this simplistic view: "The current crisis was not simply the result of increased call volumes due to the pandemic," says the report author, medical sociologist Michael K. Corman. "The pandemic just exposed the weak foundation of a system that has been teetering on the edge for some time."

Problems identified by paramedics include, for example, an erosion of key work processes that are central to being a competent paramedic. "This was in large part brought on by a system that focused exclusively on efficiency, on the idea of 'doing more with less'." At the same time, some of the policies and practices adopted resulted in a lowering of standards and a toxic work environment that made providing good care nearly impossible.

The fact remains that the provincial government has a long way to go towards improving working conditions for frontline healthcare staff — and throwing money at the problems won't fix it.

Canadian Association of Jou recent update from the current

government about the state of Alberta's healthcare system was both encouraging and frustrating.

In the release through Alberta Health Services, it stated that fulltime paramedics, acute care staff and emergency department (ED) staff are being added to the frontline ranks of AHS, as part of efforts to reduce ED wait times and improve EMS response times.

"We are happy to see our call to hire more professionals is finally resulting in action. But the

government's plan goes nowhere near far enough. Just creating new positions is not enough when there is already an abundance of unfilled positions," states Parker in a release.

AHS stated that EMS response times are improving, despite a sustained 30% increase in call volume across the province. Comparing November 2022 with January 2023, EMS response times for the most urgent calls are shorter:

- 17 minutes in metro and urban areas, down from 21.8 minutes.

- 19.2 minutes in communities with over 3,000 residents, down from 21.5 minutes.

- 34.9 minutes in rural communities with under 3,000 residents, down from 36 minutes.

- 57.5 minutes in remote communities, down from 63.9 minutes.

AHS also stated the frequency of red alerts is also coming down:

- In January 2022, in the Edmonton Zone, there were 1,092 red alerts for a total of 39.7 hours, compared to 81 alerts and 1.8 hours in January 2023.

- In Calgary Zone, in January 2022. there were 328 red alerts for a total of 8.1 hours compared to 134 red alerts and a total of 3.2 hours in January 2023.

It is of note that AHS qualifies that

these are the response times for 90% of activity.

Between November 2022 and January 2023, EMS added 39 frontline staff, including paramedics, emergency communications officers, and front-line supervisors. Overall, EMS hired 457 new staff members in 2022, including 341 paramedics.

Parker responds, "The government talks about performance measures

"Our members aren't seeing these improvements. What our members tell me is that things are a bit better than they were at the worst of the crisis, but we are still far away from Albertans having the access to care they deserve and working conditions that will keep our members healthy ... " states Parker.



Alberta RCMP officer involved shooting in Evansburg

(RCMP) On Feb. 25, 2023, at approximately 11:50 p.m., an Evansburg RCMP Officer located a vehicle that was stuck and which had been reported to have been stolen, on Range Road 102 A, north of Highway 16, in Yellowhead County, Alta. The officer approached on foot and attempted to arrest the occupants, but the driver exited the vehicle and pointed a firearm at the officer. The officer discharged his firearm and the suspect retreated into his vehicle.

Ôfficers from neighboring RCMP detachments were called to assist and surrounded the suspect vehicle. Eventually the two occupants of the suspect vehicle surrendered to police and were taken into custody. One of the suspects sustained a minor injury during this incident, while no police officers were injured.

The Alberta RCMP believes in processes that seek the facts and it's important that processes taken to assess


the actions of all those involved, including the police, are fair, transparent, and defendable. This is why, as soon as we became aware of this incident, we immediately notified the Director of Law Enforcement and initiated our internal review process. The Director deemed the incident to be "in scope" for ASIRT, however assigned the investigation to the RCMP, with AISRT oversight.

Alberta RCMP Serious Crimes and General Investigation Sections have taken over carriage of the investigation. An update will be provided when available.

Independent of ASIRT, the Alberta RCMP's internal review process has been implemented to gather a full account of what took place during this incident. RCMP training, policy, police response, and the duty status of the members involved will be subject to review. The Alberta RCMP is, of course, fully cooperating with ASIRT.



Alberta Municipalities:

Provincial budget focused on the 'now' not the future

The provincial government's 2023-24 budget clearly shows it has taken the political temperature of Alberta and decided to address many of the emergent issues Albertans face. It appears to be concentrating its spending on several important issues, including healthcare, education and public safety.

This is necessary and understandable, and Alberta Municipalities (ABmunis) believes this spending will help. We look forward to watching the funding flow and we encourage the provincial government to honour its commitments beyond the next provincial election in late May.

Our association is pleased to see the Government of Alberta listened to us and others when it decided to fully index funding to municipalities so that local governments' funding increases and decreases as the provincial government's revenues wax and wane. In this respect, ABmunis' members feel more like full partners, rather than 'children' of the province.

Where this budget falls short is in the allocation of funding to address

Alberta's growing infrastructure deficit. Alberta communities face a \$30 billion infrastructure deficit. Put simply, Alberta's municipalities own 60 per cent of the infrastructure, but they received just 1.0 per cent of this provincial budget. Many Albertans will be surprised to learn that per-capita provincial funding to municipalities has declined by 61 per cent since 2011.


While numerous infrastructure projects will receive funding in the 2023 provincial budget – things like hospitals, schools, roads and bridges - these projects represent a small fraction of the infrastructure projects needed to build a province that attracts and retains talented people so that Alberta remains economically successful and prosperous.

Alberta Municipalities will continue pressing the provincial government to commit to additional strategic infrastructure spending in the coming weeks and months. We also plan to raise this issue with all provincial political parties in the run-up to the 2023 provincial election.


