The Social Innovator Award went to a local volunteer who tackles old problems in a new way and innovate despite the challenges. This award went to Sheila Buckle in recognition of the countless hours she has put into the Edson Public Library expansion project.

The Emerging Leader Award celebrates young volunteers who demonstrate growing leadership skills. This year's recipient was Maya Dalueg. Dalueg is a grade 9 student who has donated her time to multiple causes including Edson Youth Council, Edson Hospital, and March 4 A Cure.

The Long Term Service Award went to Debra Edey-Halterman. Edey-Halterman has lived, worked, and volunteered in Edson since the 1980's. In that time, she has served on the Public Library Board, as President of the Edson Fencing Club, as a part of the Edson Cultural Historical Society (ECHO), and much more.

The Community Leader Award went to outstanding volunteers who have taken a lead role in developing solutions to social challenges in communities. The award went to Dewayne Scott for helping the Edson Food Bank navigate the complexity of providing to the vulnerable people in Edson for the past five years.

Preston Langton accepted both the Business Leadership Award on behalf of Surepoint Energy and personally accepted the Biggest Heart Award. Surepoint was celebrated for their continual donations of money and volunteers to local events.

Langton received the Biggest Heart Award for continually going above and beyond with his time and effort as the go-to BBQ person for local events.

Finally, The Mayors Award of Excellence went to the Edson Cycling Association. This award goes to volunteers that Edson Mayor Kevin Zahara wishes to recognize for outstanding contribution to the Town of Edson. This year Mayor Zahara choose the Edson Cycling Association in recognition of their tremendous work developing the bike trails and skills park at Willmore.

After the awards, local band 'Not to Scale' performed a few songs to close out the night.



During a back stage interview Jaedyn said, "I'm originally from Edmonton, Alberta and travel around impersonating some of my favourite singers. I just got back from Puerto Vallarta, Mexico where I did a three and a half month gig.'

"I perform regularly around Alberta and surrounding provinces for various organizations like the Royal Canadian Legion, Lions, Rotary, Chambers of Commerce, various senior lodges, and private parties. From Edson I will be doing a private birthday party and a few other little gigs. Then on May 3, I will be going on tour with a show I call 'Elvis the Early Years'. I'll be heading off to Red Deer and Saskatchewan, until I return back to Mexico in December," said Jaedyn.

Jaedyn's mother, Jo-Ann, said, "Jaedyn started to play the drums when he was just six years old. Then he picked up on guitar and piano when he was eight. He was

born in 2002, and will be turning 21 in June. He started to show an interest in music from a very young age while watching children's shows on T.V. Once he was in grade one, he performed in a talent show and has had the music bug ever since."

"Both his dad and I take turns going on the road, or we go together helping with sound and music. We help support and encourage him in anyway we can. He did his first show when he was just 13 years old," Jo-Ann said.

Pioneer Cabin Recreation Coordinator, Fred Kuzmic, said, "I saw this young performer three years ago and he was really good. We have a sold-out venue for tonight. I could have easily sold at least another 50 tickets, but due to fire regulations, we couldn't. This was a good fundraising event for the cabin. Fundraising needs to be done to help offset the cabin's overhead costs."



Additional information can be requested from the Planning Department at 780-723-4402 or engineeringandplanning@edson.ca.

Any person who is deemed to be affected by the issuance of any one of these permits may appeal to the Subdivision and Development Authority by 4:00 p.m., on the 21st day after the date of issue as published on the Town's website. On Permitted Uses, grounds for appeal must relate only to interpretation, variance, or relaxation of Land Use Bylaw 2070. On Discretionary Uses, all aspects of the proposed development may be challenged upon appeal. Written notice of appeal, accompanied by the appeal fee as established by Town Council, must be filed through the Office of the Secretary of the Subdivision and Development Appeal Board at Box 6300, Edson, AB T7E 1T7. Direct Control District Approvals cannot be appealed.

Province wades deeper on Federal firearms confiscation program

Despite opposition from provinces and territories to the use of police



wherewithal to fulfil its plans. In normal circumstances,

resources, the Alberta government states that the Feds are signalling that they are prepared to take frontline police officers off the street to implement their federal firearms confiscation program.

Public Safety Canada also appears to be considering contracting with untrained personnel to supplement the use of policing resources, the province states in a recent release.

In a move that seem planned to hinder the process, Alberta will require individuals and organizations employed to confiscate firearms —to first be licensed by the province.

The province states, "This action fulfils a commitment under the Alberta Firearms Act to require individuals or organizations including police officers to first be licensed by the province." This regulation does not affect normal police activity, such as having to confiscate a firearm as part of an investigation.

Tyler Shandro, Minister of Justice and Attorney General, was quoted, "Public Safety Canada is a large and inefficient bureaucracy. It does not have the resources or the

the federal government

would have hit the pause button. Unfortunately, we continue to receive indications that the opposite is occurring. Their decision to move forward with the confiscation program will jeopardize provincial requirements for the safe handling, transportation and storage of firearms. We will not allow that to happen."

The Alberta chief firearms office, Teri Bryant, continues to call on the federal government to focus its resources on illegal firearms activity rather than targeting law-abiding firearms owners. "Taking firearms away from responsible owners will not improve public safety."

It goes without saying that Canadians are deeply concerned about a rise in violent crimes. However, frontline police offices are already a scarce resource, particularly in rural Alberta. The decision to potentially use officers, already spread thin dealing with criminal investigations, is not only counterintuitive —it could prove very reckless.





On April 15-16 the Girls U16 NorthWest Selects club volleyball team travelled to Calgary to participate in the Division 5 Volleyball Alberta Provincial Championships. The club team, comprised of 14 girls ages 14-16, had participated in 3 prior tournaments this year, winning the consolation gold at the Tri-Area Warriors Tournament in Spruce Grove on March 11, and losing a close game in the consolation final at the Volleyball Alberta Premier #3 Tournament on March 18-19.

The girls played well on day 1 of the provincial tournament. We lost our first match in 3 sets, won our second match in 3 sets, and lost the third match in 2 close sets. This placed us 3rd in our pool and seeded us against a 2nd place team from Brooks for our first playoff match. With strong serving and tough defense the girls won that match in two straight sets and advanced to the quarter finals the next morning.

Playing on the center court at the University of Calgary the girls faced a team from Plamondon and came out strong from the first whistle, winning in two straight sets to move on to the semifinals. There we would play the Central Alberta Wolves, a

team from Olds that we had played in our round robin pool and at a previous tournament and lost both of those matches in very close games. This time the girls were determined to beat the wolves and advance to the finals, but we lost the first set. The team rallied together, determined to win and never give up, and won the second set. The third set was a close back and forth game but with some strong serving and hitting the girls won 15-12 and were now on to the finals.

The gold medal game featured a matchup with the Sharks Volleyball Club from Edmonton, a team that we had played before in the Premier #3 tournament just a few weeks before. The girls came out very strong and decisively won the first set 25-15. The second set saw the Sharks respond with strong serving and won a close set 25-23. This set the stage for a final third set to 15. It was a back and forth game with the Sharks ahead 8-6 at the turn (the teams switch sides when the score reaches 8) but with strong attacks, tough defense and aggressive serving the girls fought back and won 15-13 to claim gold and win the Provincial Championships.




