STARS: SEVEN CRITICAL FLIGHTS OUT OF EDSON LAST YEAR 169 missions within Yellowhead County borders in last 5 years

by STARS. There were a further 22 scene and inter-facility missions flown within Yellowhead County. Over the past five years STARS has flown 33 inter-facility missions from the Edson hospital and a total of 169 missions within Yellowhead County borders (including the Edson and Hinton hospitals.)

In addition to the 1,325 missions flown in Alberta in 2020 STARS provided personnel

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training and education to 775 people in rural Alberta. The STARS emergency link centre received an average of 86 emergency request calls per day resulting in an average 8 missions per day in Western Canada.

According to the report, it costs approximately \$10M per year to run a base. Alberta provides the least government support of the prairie provinces providing less than ¹/₄ of the required funding leaving STARS to rely heavily on private donations. Saskatchewan donations are approximately 50/50 government and private while the majority of the cost in Manitoba is covered through government funding. By contrast STARS flew 1,325 missions in Alberta, 884 in Saskatchewan, and 760 in Manitoba last year.

County approves road closure and transfer to CN

At their May 11 Council Meeting, Yellowhead County Council heard from Planning & Development Manager Brent Shepherd regarding a potential resolution to close a portion of Road Plan 3764EO.

The portion that would be closed lies within the NE & NW 25-53-10-W5M, and after the closure the County would transfer the closed Road Plan to Canadian National (CN) Railways for railway purposes.

The road closure application was recently submitted by IBI Group Geomatics (Canada) Inc. on behalf of their client, CN. The purpose of the closure is to provide additional land for CN to twin their rail line.

Shepherd told Council that, if the road closure is supported by Council and the Minister of Transportation, CN plans to start construction immediately.

Upon receiving the application, referrals were sent to a variety of agencies to determine if there were any objections or concerns. This included Yellowhead County Infrastructure, Alberta Transportation, TRL Gas Co-op, Fortis, Alberta Environment & Parks, and Telus. No objections were noted, although Telus did make note that they would require a right-of-way agreement.

County Administration also sent referrals to adjacent landowners and received no verbal or written submissions. "As there have been no objections or concerns regarding the closure, Administration therefore supports the closure," said Shepherd.

Shepherd explained that if the County were to approve the passing of the resolution, they would then forward the resolution to the Minister of Transportation for approval. After the Minister's approval, the closed road plan would be able to be sold/transferred to CN for railroad purposes.

The road plan has an assessed total value of \$10,000 which would be submitted by CN following the approvals so that they can begin work on their track improvements and expansion of their railway network.

Both Mayor Jim Eglinski and Councillor Anthony Giezen made further inquiries into the exact location, wanting to be sure that the closure wouldn't lead to blockages or other interference with crossings or landowner access. Shepherd explained the area further, confirming that there would not be any issues.

After a vote, the motion was carried. Councillors Sandra Cherniawsky and Penny Lowe were not in attendance at the meeting.

County sends letters of support for Kathairos Solutions

After their presentation to Yellowhead County Council on April 20, Kathairos Solutions Inc. submitted a request for letters of support for two large funding competitions. County Council heard the request during their May 11 Council Meeting.

Kathairos Inc explained that they use liquid nitrogen to eliminate fugitive methane emissions from routine site venting on remote wells. With methane emissions being 25x more harmful than standard CO2 emissions, and with over 120,000 remote well sites in Western Canada, the Kathairos Solution has the potential to make a huge difference to the environment.

The Kathairos Solution says they are the first "zero-emission" solution eliminating methane venting. The company has been testing two prototype systems in Yellowhead County, one on a newly completed well (since September 30) and the second on two brownfield wells (since November 2). The company reported that the systems have run continuously and without issue.

Jacqueline Peterson, Manager of Government Relations & Carbon Offsets for Kathairos Solutions, reached out via email to make the request. Peterson explained that Kathairos is at "various stages" in two funding competitions, the Natural Gas Innovation Fund (NGIF)'s Natural Gas Production Challenge and the Clean Resource Innovation Nation (CRIN)'s Reducing Environmental Footprint Technology Competition.

"We are hoping that the County could provide us with letters of support for these two competitions. Community support can really go a long way," said Peterson. "We strongly believe our technology will bring significant benefit both to the Yellowhead community and local industry partners."

Yellowhead County CAO Luc Mercier said that the details of the request were "a little out of Administration's purview" but that from what they understand there is "no detriment to Yellowhead County giving support to this company to apply for these awards within our region."

Councillor Anthony Giezen said that he supports the motion, but he wanted to point out that Council hadn't heard other presentations from other companies of this nature. "I don't know if this is a company that's better than the rest or should get more funding than the rest," he said.

Giezen also said that there was "a little bit of confusion" after he re-read the company's proposal and presentation following the April 20 meeting. "I don't think they're basically eliminating methane gas, they're just not venting it on the site," he said. "To forward the innovation, I would support. I'm not sure this is the end-all answer, but I guess this is a step in the right direction."

Councillor David Russell agreed that the solution doesn't sound like the "be-all to end-all" but was more concerned with setting a precedent. "I'm a little concerned that this could be a slippery slope, starting to give letters of support to private industry in their chase for funding," he said. "I can support it, I'm just a little worried about starting an avalanche of requests."

Councillor Shawn Berry said he wanted to "speak against" the motion to send letters of support. "During the presentation process, I asked questions if they could still be considered green because they're not actually removing anything from the atmosphere, they're simply shipping it off to another source to be dealt with," he said. "That makes me a little leery of the project. I can't go with the word "green" project on this one." Berry also noted he agreed with the concerns of setting a precedent for requests like this.

The motion went to a vote and was carried, with Council directing Administration to send letters of support for Kathairos Solutions Inc. to the two competitions. Councillors Sandra Cherniawsky and Penny Lowe were not in attendance.





We still need plastics despite Trudeau's vow to get rid of them

- Plastics have allowed a revolution in material science that has vastly improved our quality of life -

By now, most everyone has seen the memes of Dr. Evil ordering a change of focus in his campaign to maintain global fear: "Fear of [the last crisis] is no longer working. Release the murder hornets!" To judge from recent news articles, the meme should read: "Fear of COVID-19 is no longer working. Restart the war on plastics!"

After a year of people living in morbid fear of touching something that hasn't been repeatedly sterilized with alcohol (generally transported in plastic bottles), handled by people wearing plastic gloves, while looking at people through layers of plastic shields, Christine Sismondo, writing in the Toronto Star, asks: "What can we do about increased plastic use during the pandemic?"

That's before, of course, the pandemic has actually run its course.

Marc Fawcett-Anderson, writing in Canada's National Observer, tells us: "Canada is drowning in plastic waste – and recycling won't save us." Canadians, we're told, simply have to use less plastic. It's okay in medical devices, apparently, but not much else.

Still, the war against plastics is so desperate, "cutting back production is only half the solution, they say," Fawcett-Anderson writes. "Canadian policy-makers need to take a holistic look at how Canadians eat, move and otherwise inhabit the world – then develop locally tailored systems that make it possible to live well without disposable plastic."

After all, Fawcett-Anderson writes, quoting plastics opponents, "'There are people alive (who) have memories of before there was disposable packaging,' they note. 'They ate things. They were OK.'"

Right, there are people alive like that because, at least partially, plastics saved them from COVID-19. And I'm sure they would tell you that safety, health and the environment were so much better than they are now, if you just don't talk about polio – or thalidomide, rubella, ptomaine, tetanus or the Great Depression. Surprisingly, the sudden recollection of the horror of plastics comes just in time to build support for the ban on single-use plastics that Prime Minister Justin Trudeau has cued up starting this year. One assumes the plastic-haters are worried that people won't want to put down their plastic bottles of hand sanitizer, their plastic-coated face masks or their gloriously pure and sterile firstuse plastic grocery bags quite so soon after COVID-19 consigned their cloth

bags to a year of rotting and growing germs in the trunks of their unused automobiles.

It's utterly insane that in 2021, one needs to once again point out that plastics have allowed a revolution in material science that has vastly improved the quality of life for billions of people. From medical devices to consumer products, plastics have given people the ability to package, transport, store and preserve foods, medicines and an uncountable number of consumer products that improve quality of life.

From artificial limbs, to carbon fibre car bodies, to the Plexiglas, polyurethane and polyvinyl chloride that, just last year, saved the lives of untold millions of people.


That phone you used to call an ambulance for your parent? Made of plastics, undoubtedly by machines made of and with plastics, sent to you wrapped in more plastics and transported to you by the same hydrocarbons that make up the actual plastics of the phone.

Oh, and those hygienic wipes? The ones that you would have mortgaged the house to buy last March but were already out of stock? According to the U.S. Food and Drug Administration, those wipes are made of "materials such as polyester, polypropylene, cotton, wood pulp, or rayon fibers formed into sheets." Polyester and polypropylene are plastics. And would you really want more trees harvested for sanitary wipes? No? How did going without wipes feel in March 2020? Do we want that joyous feeling back?

Yes, we can do better about disposing of plastics safely to protect the environment and the same is true of everything else we use, from wood to metal to stone and glass.

But banning things that people have concluded are vital goods or trying to unreasonably reduce the use of such materials out of an abject fear of drowning in it is not only irrational, it's also a waste of taxpayer time and money to even discuss.

Plastics are ubiquitous because people find them valuable, and that should be

So no, it's not time to release the murder hornets. If there's a problem with plastics disposal, then reform waste disposal regulations and see to the enforcement of safe disposal laws.



Fox Creek RCMP investigate catalytic converter theft and give tips

RCMP release:

On May 10, 2021, Fox Creek RCMP received a report that sometime overnight two trucks in a construction site had their catalytic converters stolen in the area of 120 street and 1 avenue in Fox Creek.

The Fox Creek RCMP recognize catalytic converter theft is a concerning crime trend and want to remind vehicle owners of some Crime Prevention tips.

"Crime Prevention Through Environmental Design is a key factor in reducing theft of catalytic converters. Think about where you park your vehicle. Think about how the criminal would gain access to it, if there's any way to prevent access or add a barrier, that's what we recommend," says Corporal James Deibert, Fox Creek Detachment Commander.


This is predominantly a crime of opportunity where the vehicle has been left unsecure or is easily accessible by the offender.





HRH's March 4A Cure Smashes Fundraising Goal

(HRH) Holy Redeemer's March 4A Cure campaign returned for its 11th year this past March. Even though the fundraising campaign was happening in the middle of a pandemic, the students did not let it deter them from fundraising an incredible \$14,000+!

"Each year we organize a silent auction on one night during the month," says Bachinsky who added that trying to do that this year would have been impossible. "So, we decided to hold an online fundraiser through Patterson's Parts Supply."

The March 4A Cure group collected a number of items from local businesses, all of them donated, and put them up on the auction site. Then they scheduled one week in March for the auction to run. What happened next was nothing short of incredible. "The whole thing just blew up online," says Bachinsky. "We saw tons of bids throughout the week. Everyone seemed to love it!" Bachinsky added that many people who were 'stuck at home' because of the pandemic sat by their computers watching their bids throughout the week. And when the dust settled, the group raised an incredible \$14,770 smashing their original goal.

This year's fundraising effort will be added to the 11-year total of \$115,860. All of the money raised goes to the Alberta Cancer Foundation. On top of this, this year's money will be donated in the memories of Normande Tannas and Shandy Reichenbacher.

This year's March 4A Cure event would not have been made possible without the amazing donations from the Edson business community, the outstanding group of student volunteers, and of course, Patterson's Parts Supply who were instrumental in organizing the online auction.

One more person who should receive tremendous praise is Bachinsky, who has led the March 4A Cure campaign for the past eleven years ever since he joined the teaching staff at HRH. He was even recently awarded the 2021 Edson FCSS Volunteer Award for Leadership.

"Mr. Bachinsky is a true professional," says Principal Betty Churchill. "His dedication to the March 4A Cure campaign shows his commitment to our strong Catholic ideals of helping those in need. We are so proud to have him at HRH.'

This year is also the swan song for a number of grade 12 students who have helped with the campaign for as many as the past six years. Fear not, as there is a great group of younger students ready to take hold of the reigns.

With that, the books are now closed on another March 4A Cure campaign. Everyone looks forward to next year as they set an even bigger fundraising goal.

Enbridge Line 5: Statement from Minister Savage

May 11, 2021: Minister of Energy Sonya Savage issued the following statement in response to the federal government filing an amicus brief in the United States federal court regarding Enbridge's Line 5:

"Alberta's government has consistently advocated for the continued operation of Enbridge's Line 5 and all other pipelines.

"We're pleased that the federal government has listened to the concerns raised by a number of provincial governments and is working with the provinces to defend Canada's energy security, economic prosperity and Canadian jobs. A shutdown of Line 5 would have significant consequences across Canada, as well as the United States.

"Energy producers, and the hard-working Albertans and Canadians they employ, have dealt with a number of challenging years and the uncertainty with Line 5 is not helpful. But what is the most concerning to us in Alberta – as it should be for everyone – is the dangerous precedent that a shutdown of a safely operating pipeline would set for future oil and gas infrastructure projects.

"Our province and our country will continue to be a stable, secure and responsible energy supplier to the U.S., and that's why governments across Canada need to continue to work together on this important issue. Our province remains committed to engaging with elected officials on both sides of the border, reinforcing the importance of the pipeline as a safe and responsible source of needed energy for U.S. and Central Canada.

"When it comes to the responsible production and transportation of our natural resources, I truly believe, as Canadians, we are more aligned than we are divided."

About Line 5


As it travels under the Straits of Mackinac, Line 5 diverges into two, 20-inch-diameter, parallel pipelines. This is why people sometimes call the pipeline system the "dual" or "twin" pipelines. They start underground onshore, taper deep underwater and cross the Straits for 4.5 miles.

The products moved on Line 5 heat homes and businesses, fuel vehicles, and power industry in the state of Michigan.

Line 5 supplies 65% of propane demand in the Upper Peninsula, and 55% of Michigan's statewide propane needs. Overall, Line 5 transports up to 540,000 barrels per day (bpd) of light crude oil, light synthetic crude, and natural gas liquids (NGLs), which are refined into propane.

Built in 1953 by the Bechtel Corporation to meet extraordinary design and construction standards, the Line 5 Straits of Mackinac crossing remains in excellent condition, and has never experienced a leak in more than 65 years of operation.

The Line 5 crossing features an exceptional and incredibly durable enamel coating, and pipe walls that are three times as thick—a minimum of 0.812 inches—as those of a typical pipeline. What's more, the Bechtel Corporation—renowned for the iconic Hoover Dam-designed and built Line 5 in an area of the Straits that would minimize potential corrosion due to lack of oxygen and the cold water temperature. This setting contributes to preserving the integrity of Line 5, which has enabled it to serve the region safely and reliably for more than six decades.

NOVA Gas Transmission Ltd. North Corridor System Expansion Project Approved with 37 Conditions

OTTAWA: Gerald Soroka, Member of Parliament for Yellowhead, wishes to advise that the Minister of Natural Resources has announced approval of the NOVA Gas Transmission Ltd. (NGTL) North Corridor System Expansion Project with 37 conditions related to safety, environmental and wildlife protection, Indigenous engagement, and protection of Indigenous rights and interests.

As part of these conditions NGTL will be required to establish an Indigenous Working Group for the Red Earth and Chinchaga Caribou Ranges. This will ensure Indigenous involvement in the efforts to create new caribou habitat, given the importance of caribou to their culture, traditional land and resource use, and intergenerational transfer of knowledge.

This \$632-million project is of significant importance to workers in Alberta. The project will create \$307 million in labour income, and the anticipated direct employment will be the equivalent of 1,740 full-time jobs during construction and contribute about \$425 million to Alberta's GDP. The North Corridor Project provides natural gas producers better access to markets for their products and contributes toward the phase-out of coal-fired electricity by 2030.

The NGTL North Corridor Expansion Project will add 81 kilometres of new pipeline to the existing NOVA Gas Transmission system in three different sections and associated facilities in



northwestern Alberta.

The Canada Energy Regulator will continue to engage Indigenous groups throughout the project's lifecycle and is committed to reconciliation with Indigenous Peoples by building relationships based on the recognition of rights, respect, cooperation and partnership. The CER has established an Indigenous Advisory Committee with members representing First Nations, Inuit, and Métis, to advise the Board of Directors on the involvement of Indigenous Peoples in CER activities.

About the North Corridor Expansion Project

NOVA Gas Transmission Ltd. (NGTL), a wholly owned subsidiary of TransCanada PipeLines Limited (TCPL), an affiliate of TC Energy Corporation, is planning to construct, own and operate the North Corridor Expansion Project (Project).



AB gov't release: In response to concerns raised by Albertans, including those who participated in a recent online survey, Alberta's government is halting all coal exploration projects in Category 2 lands.

Almost 25,000 Albertans from across the province shared feedback to help inform the next steps of the coal policy engagement through an online survey from March 29 to April 19.

An initial review of the results illustrates that many Albertans have significant concerns about coal exploration. Based on this insight, the Coal Policy Committee – an independent group appointed to lead comprehensive public engagement to inform the development of a modern coal policy – has recommended to the government that coal exploration in Category 2 lands be suspended.

Energy Minister Sonya Savage has directed coal companies to halt exploration. The affected companies have indicated they will cooperate with the pause.

"Thank you to the thousands of Albertans who took part in the initial survey. Your voices are being heard. We are halting exploration activities in Category 2 lands because we remain steadfast in our commitment to having an open and honest conversation about the long-term approach to

coal development in our province." Sonya Savage, Minister of Energy

"As promised on March 29, the Coal Policy Committee is here to engage with, and listen to, Albertans. We have heard clearly that halting exploration on Category 2 lands was a necessary first step to ensure that the public engagement process can continue in good faith. Our committee has made that recommendation to the minister and she has accepted it. Now that the minister has established this moratorium on exploration, we encourage all Albertans to continue to participate with our committee in the widespread public engagement over the coming months as we develop our broader policy recommendations." Ron Wallace, chair, Coal Policy Committee Preliminary analysis of the survey results indicates:

Coal's economic benefits

Over 42,000 people are directly and indirectly employed thanks to the coal industry. This includes those who work in mine production, construction, exploration, transportation and reclamation activities as well as those who supply goods and services to the industry. Coal mining is an important contributor to Canada's GDP – contributing an estimated \$5.2 billion in direct and indirect impacts.

Coal companies are important to the economic well-being of rural communities. They provide high quality job opportunities; contribute to the municipal tax base, and support area businesses by acquiring local goods and services. - Coal Association of Canada

"Environmental impacts of coal development" and "if and where coal development takes place" were ranked by respondents as the most important issues when discussing Alberta's coal policy.


• The majority of respondents feel there are areas of the province that are not appropriate for coal development, while almost one-third of respondents say there are areas of the province where development could be appropriate.

Amputee's story highlights importance of farm safety

With farming season here, Merrill Loeppky, a War Amps Regional Representative, is reminding parents to pass on an essential and possibly life-saving lesson to their children -PLAYSAFE!

Merrill grew up on a farm in Manitoba, and at 3 years old, his curiosity led him to get too close to a grain auger, resulting in the loss of his right arm. "Accidents can happen in a split second," says Merrill. "I hope my story will prevent even just one child from being injured."

The War Amps PLAYSAFE Program aims to make children more aware of the dangers in their play environment and believes that no one is better qualified to deliver the message than amputees, many of whom have lost limbs in
