

Pediatric Covid-19 vaccine rollout begins

(AB) November 23: With more than 394,000 pediatric doses of the Pfizer COVID-19 vaccine arriving in the province, Alberta began taking vaccine bookings for five to 11 year olds on Nov. 24.

The doses are being distributed to 120 Alberta Health Services vaccination clinics across the province and four pharmacies in communities where AHS clinics are not nearby.

Appointments will be required for all pediatric vaccinations and bookings opened at 8 a.m. on Wednesday, Nov. 24. Appointments for first doses began as early as Friday, Nov. 26. More details on locations where parents can book appointments will be available in the coming days.

"The wait is nearly over for Alberta families with children between the ages of five and 11. Now that there is a safe, effective vaccine approved for use for these youngsters, and with doses arriving in the province, we can start booking appointments. Within days, we will begin administering the first pediatric doses, helping to ensure even more Albertans are protected from COVID-19." —Jason Kenney, Premier

"Provincial teams are quickly distributing the newly arrived Pfizer pediatric vaccine to more than 100 locations across Alberta. Our immunization program continues to be one of the best in Canada and we are ready to safely and quickly make these doses available for young Albertans." —Jason Copping, Minister of Health

"The evidence is clear that the pediatric Pfizer vaccine is highly effective at limiting the spread of COVID-19. Parents who choose to have their young children vaccinated against this virus will not only help to protect their kids but their families and communities too." —Dr. Deena Hinshaw, chief medical officer of health

Booking a vaccination appointment for children aged five to 11

Pediatric vaccinations will be administered at Alberta Health Services clinics around the province. First-dose appointments must be booked through the Alberta Vaccine Booking System at alberta.ca/vaccine or by calling Health Link at 811. Walk-ins are not available at this time.

Children five to 11 years of age who live on a First Nations reserve will also be able to access doses through nursing stations or public health clinics on-reserve.

The recommended interval between the first and second doses for children aged five to 11 is at least eight weeks. It is also recommended that children should wait at least 14 days between receiving the pediatric COVID-19 vaccine and another type of vaccine.

Restrictions Exemption Program Children under 12 years of age will continue to have access to businesses and venues participating in the Restrictions Exemption Program, regardless of their vaccination status. This will provide parents and guardians the time to decide if and when their young children

will be protected against COVID-19. Children aged 12 and under are able to access facilities with their parents or guardians who meet the program requirements, as well as participate in youth activities while following current public health measures.

To date in Alberta, for children aged five to 11, there have been about 30,700 cases of COVID-19 diagnosed since March of 2020,

with 78 of those cases ending up in hospital and 20 in intensive care.

Following the last snowfall we have had a number of questions about the snow removal process. We endeavour to be as open and transparent with the public as possible, and have answered some of the most common questions below.

For more FAQs, as well as priority maps and the snow removal policy, visit www.edson.ca/snow.

FAQs

How do you determine the plowing priorities?

The priorities have been set based on emergency vehicle access, school zones, downtown parking, and residential access. 49th Street and 6th Avenue are always done first to open up the Town to emergency vehicles. Once priority routes are cleared, commercial zones and high traffic areas are completed before moving into residential zones. The commercial zone criteria is based on access to food and medical supplies. High traffic areas include our facility parking lots, senior housing, and 10th Avenue.

What triggers snow removal and what are the timelines?

A snow event is defined as snowfall accumulation of at least 5 cm. This triggers the priority routes to be cleared once the snow has slowed down. Depending on the severity of the snow event, and the type of snow (heavy, wet snow can take substantially more time to clear) crews can generally clear priority routes, commercial district, and high traffic areas within 3-4 days. Residential zones take a bit longer as signage must be posted, and vehicles may be required to be removed from the working zones. Staffing and equipment failures could impact these timelines.

Why do certain streets get down multiple times before residential streets are complete?

If we receive another snow event following the clearing of priority routes, crews are currently required to start over. The system is designed this way to ensure emergency access to as much of Town as possible. Some streets also allow for the moving of snow into a ditch, making it a much faster process than streets that require snow to be hauled away.

My street or cul-de-sac is near a priority route. Why can't crews do this while they are in the area?

When dealing with priority routes, the main goal is to get them priority roads cleared for emergency traffic as quickly as possible. Cul-de-sacs may require special equipment to make the sharper turns and to haul away the snow. These are generally done while residential clearing is underway and the staffing/equipment is available.

Why doesn't the Town of Edson run multiple snow removal shifts?

Our snow removal schedules are based on available resources, which does have staff and equipment limitations. However, shifts are designed to maximize progress, including multiple shifts and weekends as required, as well as the hiring of contracted trucks/equipment.

Some communities do overnight snow removal, can this be done here? While there can be a benefit to overnight shifts in some situations, in residential areas it becomes problematic with vehicles parked on the street and noise levels. Early morning and night shifts are often utilized when contracted to clear along the highway or when working in the downtown

core because vehicles and noise are less of a concern.

How do you let people know what areas are being worked on?

The Town of Edson endeavours to keep residents informed at every step of the snow removal process. Notices are placed on the Town website www.edson.ca/snow, the Town of Edson mobile app, and Town social media channels. As well, signage is placed in each neighbourhood as crews work through the priority routes and residential neighbourhoods.

What does the Town of Edson spend on snow removal each year? Actual costs can range anywhere from \$300,000 to over \$600,000, depending on the number of snow events we receive. This cost includes our staff labour, fuel, sand, and any contracted services. For example, 2019 saw 11 snow events (greater than 5cm accumulation) with a cost of about \$635,000, while 2020 only had 5 snow events with a cost of about \$315,000. A special reserve is set up to help cover costs for extreme circumstances.

Yellowhead Agricultural Society requests funds from County

Committee Meeting, Yellowhead County Council were given a presentation and funding request proposal for a new facility by the Yellowhead Agricultural Society (YAS). YAS last presented on July 14, 2021, but with some new Council members and project progress, the project and asked some questions regarding the numbers Society wanted to provide Council with an update and share new information.

Christine Davis, Business Consultant and Bookkeeper for YAS, presented on behalf of Consultant Klay Dyer who could not attend the meeting himself due to road conditions.

Davis began with a brief overview of the Society, explaining that it was founded in 1975 and currently has over 250 active members who "consistently use the arena on a daily basis" - and this is on a "COVID year."

"On an average year we have been up to almost 500 members at a time," said Davis. "It's a little slow right now only because there's not as many big events happening out there that bring in a lot of new memberships.'

Davis explained that the Society's mandate "focuses on agriculture-focused recreational, educational, and business events that emphasize community involvement and sustainable economic impact.'

The group is currently 100% debt free with capital assets valued at over \$1 million. Of the group's members, 76% self-identify as being from Yellowhead County and 7% self-identify as being from Edson.

Over the past 26 years of operation of the current indoor riding facility, the Society has successfully managed many agriculture-focused events and clinics including lessons and training, 4H shows, equine shows, canine shows, trade shows, and drop-in opportunities for riding, jumping, dressage, etc.

Unfortunately, the current facility has reached the end of its projected lifespan. The wood-framed facility requires reinforcement of the sinking wood infrastructure, mitigation of condensation and hazardous mold issues, replacement of the ceiling, and a full reinsulation of the building

Even without these challenges, the current facility has some big limitations when it comes to what events the YAS can offer. It only has a permanent seating capacity of 30, there is no onsite potable water or indoor plumbing, and the group has to rent sea cans for operational storage.

These issues have led to a loss of business, including not being able to run the following events at their site: Rocky Mountain Futurity Derby (3 days, 300+ participants), the Edson Bullrama (2 days, 50 participants, 300+ spectators), the Edson Stampede (3 days, 250 participants, 500+ spectators), and the MJ Memorial Barrel Race (3 days, 300 competitors).

The project's proposed facility would be a steel building that would be 49,000 sq ft (as opposed to the current 16,000 sq ft facility). It would have full onsite services including potable water, indoor toilet facilities, and growth-ready electrical, and would offer a permanent seating capacity of 500+.

The facility would also offer designated operational and event storage, a full warm-up arena, a variety of meeting rooms, a rough stock area, and a state-of-the-art concession with its own designated seating area.

Should the facility move forward, the YAS is confident that their current facility revenue of \$35,000 will "increase substantially." They project that by year five, their annual net revenue could be as high as \$677,288.

"We will be drawing hundreds if not thousands of more people to the community and to the area, so we will of course be helping the economic growth not only for Edson but for Yellowhead County as well," added Davis.

The estimated overall project cost for "the first phase of usable building space" is \$2,648,000. Davis explained that certain items, like the concession, would not be implemented right away as the focus is getting a usable building up-and-running. Once a building is in place the Ag Society would then able to access grants to complete other parts of the project. Of the total project cost, the Town of Edson has committed \$400,000 and the Society is prepared to contribute \$495,000 in organizational funding. They also have a confirmed \$123,000 in sponsorships from local businesses and have pending grants and sponsorships worth \$130,000. They are requesting \$500,000 in funds from the County. Another large portion of the funding (\$1 million) is hoped to be in the form of a CFEP grant from the government of Alberta. The grant decision will be made in mid-December, and Davis explained that the more confirmed funding they have in place, the more likely their application is to be successful. The group also completed a feasibility study in July, surveying Edson and Yellowhead County residents. 100% of respondents agreed that a new facility is needed.

"We have finished every single step – the geotechnical, the environmental studies, the building design, the At their November 16 Governance & Priorities surveying, everything has been completed," explained Davis. "The only thing we need is the funds and start digging and we are ready to go.'

> Davis explained that she had checked with the Town of Edson this summer and confirmed that the funds were still theirs as long as the remaining 80% of the project gets funded.

Councillor Shawn Berry thanked Davis for the presentation. "I've always wished you the best in being able to push this project forward. I still approve of the project. I really approve of your children's programs... that's a real big plus for me to stand behind it," he said.

Berry asked about operational costs if the facility goes forward, and Davis explained that between government grants, funding, casino fundraisers, and facility revenue, their operational costs will be "well covered." "We've never been in an operational loss at any time," said Davis.

Mayor Wade Williams thanked Davis for the presentation and funding proposal. "We will be discussing this at later meetings and we will be getting back to you," he said.








Helping drought-stricken Alberta farmers bounce back and beyond

It's been a tough year for many Prairie ranchers and farmers who have suffered through the worst drought in 70 years. Last summer, I visited some of the hard-hit regions of the Prairies during the peak of the drought. It was heartbreaking to see the sun-scorched fields and to meet farm families forced to send the majority of their breeding herds to market, selling genetics developed over generations at a fraction of their worth.

Farmers needed their governments to act, and fast. Working closely with each of the affected provinces, the Government of Canada rapidly deployed programs that would deliver



a total of up to \$825 million in shared disaster relief funding under the AgriRecovery framework. In Alberta, more than 12,500 ranchers have already received nearly \$170 million to help cover extraordinary costs, and there is more to come. We also changed the crop insurance program so that grain producers could offer their damaged crops for animal feed and still be eligible for crop insurance payments. And we got more money into the pockets of farmers through larger advance payments under the AgriStability program.

This week, I came back to the Prairies in my first outreach since being re-appointed Minister of Agriculture and Agri-Food to hear how producers are overcoming the immense challenges and what more can be done to help them bounce back from this tough year.

The drought was a stark reminder that farmers and ranchers are among the hardest hit by climate change. And we are now seeing the devastating effects of natural disasters in neighbouring British Columbia. My heart goes out to our farm families as floodwaters wreak immense destruction on their lands, livestock and livelihoods.

As we respond to catastrophes now, we must also look to the long term.

Extreme weather events like this are adding more stress and unpredictability to farm businesses. How are we to build a sustainable sector that ensures clean water, air and soil for the next generation of producers? Farmers have made great gains in sustainable agriculture, but now is the time to double down to improve our resilience to the effects of climate change and reduce greenhouses gas emissions within the sector. Because without continued sustainability, we compromise our competitiveness. Canadian and international consumers are asking for more efforts, and this is where our trading partners are moving. That's why this year the Government of Canada launched over half a billion dollars in new programming to help farmers adopt sustainable practices and clean technologies. We're also working together with provinces to shape the next five-year, multi-billion dollar agricultural policy deal with a shared vision that prioritizes the sustainability of the sector.

The sky is the limit for Canada's agriculture and food industry. We will have a huge role to play in feeding a growing world population. Alberta's farm families can rest assured that we will stand shoulder-to-shoulder with them to support their growth, resilience and sustainability.
