Edson Town Council Highlights for November 1

Edson West Area Structure Plan. Council passed first reading of Bylaw 2282 - Edson West Area Structure Plan Amending Bylaw. The Amending Bylaw is a housekeeping item to capture the changes to Yellowhead County's Land Use Bylaw and does not substantively change the context or purpose of the Area Structure Plan. A Public Hearing for Bylaw 2282 has been scheduled for November 15th, 2022, at 7pm in Council Chambers.

Municipal Energy Manager Program Final Report. Council has approved the final report for the Municipal Energy Manager Program as information. The program started in 2020 and was very successful over the past 2 years. In depth assessments were conducted on municipal buildings and many energy conservation measures were identified. This allowed the Town to reduce greenhouse gas emissions by about 32% compared to 2019 levels and save nearly \$100,000 per year in saved utility costs. More details on the program can be found at www.edson.ca/green.

2022 Tax Auction Reserve Bids. Council has set the reserve bids for the properties scheduled for tax sale on November 16th, 2022.

Operational Budget – Council Inquiries. A report outlining additional budget requests from Council was accepted for information. Some of the items include two summer students to assist with road projects, the annual inclusion of a skating loop for the community, dust control for the Willmore Park access road, and additional funding for full implementation of the Leisure Assist Program. The items will be discussed further during the operational budget review during the November 15th, 2022, Council Meeting.

County makes plans to display Treaty and Métis flags

Treaty Flag – Yellowhead County Council voted to take steps to display Treaty and Métis flags alongside the current national, provincial, and municipal flags at the Yellowhead County office in Edson. Yellowhead County will contact representatives of these nations for consent and inclusion prior to putting up these flags at the County office.

Public Hearing – A Public Hearing was held for Bylaw 17.22 that would return a property in Niton Junction to districting matching more closely to what it was prior to the adoption of Land Use Bylaw 09.21. The proposed amending bylaw would change the current Urban Neighbourhood District zoning to Urban Neighbourhood District, Commercial District and Rural District.

ASB Bursary Awarded - A \$500 Agricultural Services Bursary was awarded to Taylor Eaton on the recommendation of the Yellowhead County Agricultural Services Board. Taylor met all the requirements for the bursary and showed a history of community and agricultural participation in Yellowhead County.

Letter of Support for Seniors Grant - Council approved letters of support to both the Robb Recreation Association and the Evansburg Seniors Citizens Society expressing support for their New Horizons for Seniors Program Grant. This is a federal government grant program that provides grants to senior and senior-serving organizations. Hamlet & Inter-municipal ASPs Updates Council passed amendments to six hamlet Area Structure Plans (ASPs) and the Hinton-Yellowhead County Intermunicipal Development Plan. These changes included updating the references to the land use districts in the plans so they match the

existing districts in Land Use Bylaw 09.21 (updated in 2021). Public Hearings were held on October 11, 2022, prior to Council voting to adopt

FRANCHISE FEE INCREASE NOTICE

Please be advised that the Town of Edson is proposing to increase the local access fee, which is charged to FortisAlberta Inc. (FortisAlberta) for use of municipal lands for its power lines effective January 1, 2023.

The fee is recovered by FortisAlberta from its customers as the local municipal access fee on electric billings of all customers that receive electric service in Town. This local access fee will be increased from \$3.38 (4.75%) to \$3.59 (4.91%) of the delivery charge of FortisAlberta, excluding energy related riders. This calculation is based on 640 kWh consumption in 30 days.







Yellowhead County's Agricultural Services Department has received numerous calls regarding black growths on residents' fruit trees

These tar-like black swellings are a sign of Black Knot and will distort and stunt any tree species within the *Prunus* genus.

Black Knot reduces the aesthetic value of affected trees and, if left long enough, may result in eventual death of the tree.

The disease spreads in the spring, attacking new growth on branches. The spores released by the fungi can be carried by wind and splashing rain.

The only reliable method of controlling Black Knot is pruning.

Black Knot - Pruning

- Only prune between November and March.
- Cleanly cut off at least 6 8 inches below the knot, better to prune back to a healthy collar, then leaving a stub. For knots on branches or trunks that can't be removed, use 2.
- a knife to cut away diseased tissue down to good wood and then 1/2 inch beyond the edge of the knot.
- Cleaning your equipment properly is another good way to prevent the spread. Pruning shears should be dipped in a 1% bleach/water solution between cuts and once you are finished pruning ensure you run your tools under water for 10 minutes and day therewakly. 10 minutes and dry thoroughly.
- Treat pruned branches like hazardous waste, they can release spores for up to 4 months. Burn, bury, or wrap them in plastic and throw them in the trash. Do not compost.

Ag Chemical Jugs RETURN TO RETAIL Starts January 2023

WHAT TO KNOW: As part of a province-wide initiative, Starting January 1, 2023, Ag jugs will no longer be accepted at Yellowhead **County Transfer Stations: Peers, Parkcourt** (Evansburg), and Wildwood.

Remember to get a free Cleanfarms collection bag when the product is picked up or delivered, and then:

1. Rinse

- Use a chemical handler or a pressure nozzle to triple-rinse the containers to ensure no product is wasted







Opinion/Comment The world requires abundant, reliable, affordable energy; Canada is the solution

The European Parliament is endorsing a dangerous and misguided "fossil fuel non-proliferation treaty" that would cause harm to people around the world.

The political forum is recommending that European Union member states phase out fossil fuels as soon as possible and stop all new investments in fossil fuel extraction.

The " treaty " implies that the ongoing use of oil and gas is an imminent threat to human society as dire as the atomic bomb. That is wrong.

And it's an odd stance to take for a region without enough natural gas, countries face winter emergency measures like community "warming halls" and widespread power blackouts.

Reducing emissions from oil and gas is essential, but shutting down the industry would only hurt humanity.

Canada is a global leader in responsible oil and gas development.

Europe should work with Canada to accelerate oil and gas exports to ensure affordability and reliability while moving to reduce emissions. It should not endorse dangerous rhetoric that would result in a more insecure world.

Fact: The world needs oil and gas to function.

Modern life relies on oil and gas, for transportation and home heating/cooling, food supply and everyday products like your cell phone, computer and your clothes. And everything from health care items like heart valves and anesthetics to critical infrastructure like buildings, roads and bridges.

Today, oil and gas supply about 52 per cent of global energy needs, according to the International Energy Agency (IEA). That's projected to still be at 47 per cent in 2050, despite the rise of renewable and alternative sources.

According to the European Commission, "adequate warmth, cooling, lighting, and energy to power appliances are essential services that underpin a decent standard of living and health. Access to energy services is essential for social inclusion."

Fact: Europe's largest economy is walking back on renewable energy.

A leading architect of Germany's "Energiewende" push

towards wind and solar over coal, oil, gas and nuclear recently admitted that renewable energy alone is insufficient to maintain reliable supply.

"We have to acknowledge that no country in the world is able to provide 100 per cent of energy demand by renewable energies," said Peter Altmaier. He served as federal minister for economic affairs and energy from 2018 to 2021.

Even before Russia invaded Ukraine, Europe was facing an energy crisis partly due to over-reliance on wind power when the wind wasn't blowing.

Countries, including Germany, are now extending the life of coal-fired power plants to ensure sufficient energy supply during the coming winter.

Germany is even dismantling wind turbines in order to expand a coal mine that supplies a power plant. The mine expansion also includes the demolition of a small town west of Cologne.

"The challenge today is that even if you expand the capacities of renewable energies, you still will need classical traditional energies like oil and gas and nuclear," Altmaier said.

"We have to find solutions that are affordable and do work in practice ... We have to realize that energy transition is not as simple as some people would like."

Fact: Renewable energy is not reliable at scale to replace oil and gas.

Alternative and renewable energy is increasingly important in the world energy mix, but the reality is these technologies alone are not yet capable of providing the energy the world needs.

This January, the European Commission published draft changes to its "taxonomy," or sustainable investor guidelines, adding natural gas and nuclear power because of their proven potential to reduce emissions while providing a stable energy supply.

The commission said that renewable energy sources "are not yet commercially available at sufficient scale" at an appropriate threshold.

Fact: The world's growing population requires more energy, not less.

More than 730 million people around the world do not have access to electricity, primarily in Sub-Saharan Africa, according to the IEA. The COVID pandemic has made the situation even more challenging.

NJ Ayuk, executive chairman of the African Energy Chamber: "Oil and gas remain critically important to meet Africa's economic and energy needs, and that need is greater than ever."

According to United Nations forecasts, the world's population is expected to grow by about two billion to reach 9.7 billion by 2050.

They will need access to abundant, affordable, reliable energy – and much of it will come from oil and gas.

Fact: Canada is a responsible, reliable oil and gas supplier.

Canada should be the solution as European nations and countries worldwide look for reliable energy suppliers while reducing greenhouse gas emissions.

Canada's oil sands is the world's only major oil basin where producers have jointly committed to reaching net zero emissions by 2050.

And Canada ranks number one among the world's top oil reserve holders for environmental, social and governance (ESG) performance.

ESG measures a variety of metrics, including greenhouse gas emissions, water use, Indigenous engagement, worker safety, diversity and inclusion, absence of violence/terrorism, and regulatory processes.

Fact: Canada's natural gas can help the world get off coal.

Using natural gas instead of coal to fuel power plants reduces emissions by about 50 per cent on average, the IEA says.

Liquefied natural gas (LNG) carried by tanker from Canada can deliver an even more significant decrease, reducing emissions by up to 62 per cent, according to a 2020 study published in the Journal for Cleaner Production.

According to Shell's latest report, global LNG demand is expected to nearly double to 700 million tonnes in 2040. The rise is driven by emerging economies working to get off coal power.

Future of Coal will be Abated, says World Coal

The World Coal Association (WCA) says abatement technologies exist to eliminate up to 99 per cent of CO2 emissions and the spate of global energy challenges prove that clean technologies must be accelerated.

Speaking to a panel discussion at the ASEAN Energy Business Forum today, World Coal Association CEO, Michelle Manook, said efficiency, reliability and abatement technologies must be prioritised if the world is serious about assessing energy security in the context of economic reality and climate ambitions.

"We support countries that have adopted energy pathways which exemplify a more sustainable approach to the use of coal resources, consistent with the Paris Agreement.

"This is especially applicable to less developed countries where both energy supply and socio-economic circumstances are under considerable stress, but it makes

sense for all countries which require energy security, reliability and affordability."

Some of the key technologies which fall into this abatement category are:

- High Efficiency Low Emissions (HELE)
- Carbon Capture and Storage (CCS/CCUS)
- **Coal Gasification**
- Coal Biomass co-combustion
- Pollution Control Technology

In addition, given global investment in coal power and heating, particularly in a young South Asian fleet, coal plants should not be considered as 'stranded assets' but instead as major contributors to the future coal agenda.

This includes the repurposing of coal plants so they can switch to producing coal to fertilisers as a catalyst for increased food production, and coal to other post-combustion derivatives including hydrogen, chemicals, polymers, carbon fiber and foam.

Ms Manook says coal suffers from misinformation and a general lack of understanding about the raft of technologies which can abate up to 99% of coal pollutants.

"Today government and investment policies

can be better informed and remain agnostic to fuels and inclusive of all technologies if the focus is on a cost benefit realistic analysis inclusive of both the economics and science."


"The reality is that with technology, coal will be cleaner and operate at efficiency levels rarely seen in ageing coal fleets across much of Europe and North America."


Ms Manook says it is clear that as an industry, coal cannot remain the same.

"We will need to work harder as a united coal value chain to educate and provide a sustainable coal pathway to all stakeholders."

"The current and future coal industry is being called on to define and navigate sustainable development and decarbonisation solutions which address poverty, economic development and the energy security that the global community demands."





The Evansburg Legion: Then and Now

Part 3 of the Weekly Anchor's Remembrance Day three-year series on local Legions. Part 1 and 2 included the Edson and Wildwood Legions

The Evansburg Legion Branch No. 196 has been an important part of our local communities since they were granted their charter in 1946.

Branch No. 196 had 12 founding members who started off meeting in a small room in the top of a red house, as they had no Legion building for the first three years. After the local community hall burned down, Branch No. 196 collaborated with Evansburg community groups to help rebuild the hall as "The Royal Canadian Legion Community Hall."

While part of the rebuild was covered by insurance, much of the funds came from money raised by the Legion. The hall reopened to the public in 1949. Since that time, the hall has gone through several expansions, adding wings on each side and digging out the basement.

Legion membership has also grown considerably over the years. Currently, there are just under 200 members, although pre-COVID they saw numbers as high as 350.

Past President Floyd Fausak noted that about 75% of members are locals from the Evansburg, Entwistle, and Drayton Valley areas, however they still have long-time Legion members who keep up their membership despite having moved away.

Fausak said that he has been a member for about 15 years now, and a board member since 2013. "We're a pretty proud group, and our main goal is to be of service to veterans and veteran's families," he said.

Fausak became involved with the Legion through his father, who was a World War II veteran. He said that there were many soldiers from the Evansburg area, both male and female, who went off to fight in WWII.

Fausak estimated the number to be around 250 people who went off to fight for our freedoms during the second world war, based on photos and records he was able to find. Afterwards, many WWII veterans continued to make the Evansburg area home. The Evansburg Legion also has a cenotaph, which is erected near The Royal Canadian Legion Community Hall. The cenotaph represents all veterans lost in any war or in peacetime.

One important aspect of any Legion is its dedication to the community. The Evansburg Legion has been a great example of this throughout the years, donating to and helping many organizations, both local and outside the community.

Hockey, dance, seniors' groups, and Camp He Ho Ha are just a few of the beneficiaries of the Evansburg Legion. Fausak noted that, in the "glory years with lots of volunteers" there were "10s of thousands of dollars given away every year." While donating to that extent is not currently possible, Branch No. 196 continues to find ways to help when they can.

One way the Evansburg Legion has continued to give back is through their purchase and operation of the Evansburg Lodge. Out of 22 residents, 4 are veterans. The Evansburg Lodge is run by volunteer board members.

The community hall is also benefited by "dedicated volunteers" who "work very hard" on everything from events to facility maintenance. With "massive utility bills," these volunteers make such a difference in the continued operation of the building.

You can also help support your local Legions by taking part in events, visiting their establishments, or buying a membership. The Evansburg Legion holds several events that you can support, including weekly meat draws, holiday-related events and, of course, their yearly Remembrance Day celebration.

Fausak noted that the Evansburg Legion's celebration is "traditionally one of the largest" in the local areas, often seeing approximately 250-300 people. During COVID, only a cenotaph ceremony could be had, but this year the group is able to do a full service, parade, and wreath-laying. After the ceremony, the Lounge will

be open, and the band Flat Broke will also be providing some live entertainment later in the day.

Everyone is welcome to attend, no membership is required. You can find more information about this event and others on the Evansburg Legion's social media. Fausak also encouraged the public to support your local Legion, wherever you're located. "We're all struggling right now," he said. "The main thing is to get out and support your Legion. The very least we can do is be grateful for our freedom."

2022 harvest results in above-average yields

Alberta's crop producers continue to show resiliency despite dry growing conditions and the rising costs of farm inputs.

For more than a century, agriculture has contributed to Alberta's economic success and identity. As global events threaten the viability of supply chains and food security, the international community is looking to Alberta to put food on tables and feed a hungry world.

Alberta's final Crop Report of the 2022 growing season indicated significantly higher yields – about 10 per cent above the five-year average.

Overall, quality for hard red spring wheat, canola and dry peas was above their five-year averages, while durum wheat and oats was lower. Quality for malt and feed barley was on par with the five-year average.

Due to favourable conditions, farmers across the province were two to three weeks ahead in harvest progress for the second straight year.

"Alberta's producers have faced a number of challenges over the years, but through their hard work and dedication, continue to show the immense value of the agriculture sector and the contributions this industry makes to our economy and communities." -Nate Horner, Minister of Agriculture and Irrigation

Soil moisture

Soil moisture reserves declined due to dry conditions in late summer and fall. As of Oct. 11, surface soil moisture was rated as 40 per cent poor, 32 per cent fair, 27 per cent good and one per cent excellent. However, it is anticipated that soil moisture reserves and surface water supplies will build up to an acceptable level before the 2023 growing season.

Supports for producers

Agriculture Financial Services Corporation continues to provide much-needed business risk management tools to producers facing adverse conditions.

Quick facts

- The Alberta Crop Reporting Program has delivered timely information on crop production since 1940.

- As of Oct. 11, about 99 per cent of all crops have been harvested, two to three weeks ahead of the five-year average.

- The south region had the highest yields at 18 per cent above the five-year average, followed by the Peace region, where yields were 12 per cent above the average.

- Dryland yields for the central and northeast regions were estimated at nine and eight per cent above the five-year averages. For the Peace region, yields are estimated to be six per cent above the average.


- About 94 per cent of hard red spring wheat and 78 per cent of durum wheat are grading in the top two grades.

- About 34 per cent of barley is eligible for malt and 54 per cent is grading as No. 1 feed.

- Agriculture Financial Services Corporation's current suite of business risk management programs serves producers faced by adverse conditions, providing needed financial support.

- The suite, which includes AgriRecovery, AgriInsurance, AgriStability and AgriInvest, is designed to respond to each producer's unique situation and offset the financial impacts of weather-related challenges such as hail damage.

OTTAWA: Gerald Soroka, Member of Parliament for Yellowhead stood in the House today and asked the following question on the economy:


