

New Alberta Extended Producer Responsibility Regulations will Harm Local News

Recently, the Government of Alberta unveiled its new Extended Producer Responsibility (EPR) Regulation. The regulations apply to packaging as well as to products such as newspapers. Literary books and textbooks are exempted from the regulation.

"We are strongly supportive of the Alberta government's objectives of reducing unnecessary packaging and waste," said Dennis Merrell, executive director of the Alberta Weekly Newspapers Association. "Unfortunately, the capture of newspaper in the regulation fails to recognize that newspaper is the product, not the packaging, and effectively subsidizes actual waste producers at the expense of local news.

"Given that newspaper is the product and not the packaging, like books, we believe newspapers should be granted an exemption," added Mr. Merrell. "An exemption would protect the journalism that so many Albertans continue to rely on to stay connected to their communities, our province, and the world."

Until recently in Ontario, EPR programs in most provinces of Canada treated newspapers the same as waste packaging. Unlike product packaging, the newspaper is the product. Publishers have moved to thinner paper to lower our footprint. Driving up the cost of newspaper production with EPR fees drives down the content as newspapers are forced to cut pages and, therefore, value to readers. The knock-on effects are a loss of jobs in a sector that is already facing many external challenges, and a less informed citizenry.

"Newspapers have always been a public good; the dissemination of news to the public is a necessary element of a vibrant and healthy democracy and a well-functioning society," said Paul Deegan, president and chief executive officer of News Media Canada. "EPR levies on newspapers are bad public policy, and we urge Alberta to follow Ontario's lead and exempt newspapers."

"Alberta's regulation is misguided and based on a flawed premise that newspapers are waste packaging, and it puts newspapers at risk at a time when the public needs trusted sources of information more than ever before," added Mr. Deegan.

Editor's Note: Isn't it odd that the UCP government, who touts themselves as pro-business and pro-free speech, is heaping added costs onto newspapers, while exempting literary books and textbooks. This is particularly disturbing for newspapers like the Weekly Anchor which are printed on post-sawmill waste newsprint using vegetable based inks. No trees are ever cut for the production of our newsprint. And it's 100% recyclable -unlike

most packaging. - DM



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Wild boars detected in Yellowhead County

During the Yellowhead County Council meeting on Oct. 25, Administration provided an update on wild boar in the county.

Wild Boars (Sus scrofa) are considered a pest when at large in Alberta. Raising wild boars or starting a wild boar farm in Yellowhead County is not allowed, as wild boars are prohibited animals under Yellowhead County's Animal Control Bylaw and Prohibited Animals Bylaw.

Wild boars can weigh over 150 kilograms (330 lbs) and stand about 1 meter (3.28 feet) at the shoulders. They are protected from cold weather by a thick woolly undercoat. These highly adaptive animals can travel more than 40 kilometres in a day. Their ability to survive in almost any climate makes them among the most prolific and invasive species in North America.

Wild boars usually live in the forest and emerge to devour crops, contaminate water sources, and harass livestock. They also carry diseases that can be transmitted to domestic pigs. "In May 2022, Yellowhead County Council received an update on the Wild Boar Bounty program, and as per the recommendation by Administration, Council declined to continue participating in the program," stated Jennifer Benson, County's Agricultural Services Supervisor.

Since that time, Administration twice received reports of sightings of wild boar within the County from Agriculture Forestry Rural and Economic Development (AFRED).

"Information was not provided regarding whether these sightings have resulted in damage to property and/or livestock, the report was mainly to notify staff that wild boar are present," said Benson. "Additionally, we have not heard from landowners regarding wild boar impacting their property."

Staff will continue to remain in contact with provincial representatives to stay informed on the status of the wild boar population as well as any new initiatives or strategies that can be implemented to address the concern.

"We are not getting a lot of sightings and because we don't have a bounty program, we are not getting [boar] ears sent in. But it is of the opinion of Administration that a problem does exist," said Benson. "The two neighbouring municipalities to the north have a significant problem. It's just a matter of time before those boar encroach our borders."

Councillor Brigitte Lemieux said, "I read an article on eDNA testing to monitor wild boar populations. Could you expand on that?"

Benson responded, "eDNA stands for Environmental DNA. What they do is test water bodies in the area for wild boar DNA. What it allows us to do, is know if its a single boar or a sounder [herd of wild boar] in the area." Benson explained they do not have plans currently to bring the technology to the county, but Administration is talking with neighbouring municipalities regarding the costs and benefits to residents.

Councillor David Russell said, "Wild boar are a problem and they grow exponentially. Currently we are dealing with the viewpoint that they are a recreational opportunity for hunting. This is an erroneous viewpoint, because once the population grows to a certain point, there is no stopping it. They will grow completely out of control. The State of Texas estimates the impact on their agricultural industry at \$1.4 billion per year. We have an opportunity to stop this 'infection' now and we need to continue working on it."



Councillor Shawn Berry was not in favour of eDNA testing at this time, "There are trappers out there who want to trap them for the ears, and people who want to use them recreationally for hunting. So it's a divisive topic at this time, and I am hoping for more clarity on what we want to do in the future. It's hard making a decision because we are not seeing them, we are not testing for them, and people are arguing on the side of keeping them wild —and others want to be farmers. It's still way too controversial at this time."

Councillor Russell pointed out that these are not "pink little piggies" running around, "These are large nasty creatures. The first human fatality has been recorded in the United States. These animals will attack human beings without hesitation. The time to deal with this is now."





Provinces oppose federal use of police resources

Provinces joined together at the 2022 Meeting of Federal, Provincial and Territorial Ministers Responsible for Justice and Public Safety to discuss the federal government's plan to use police resources to confiscate legally acquired firearms.

Alberta, Saskatchewan, Manitoba and New Brunswick called on the federal government to halt plans to use scarce RCMP and municipal police resources to confiscate more than 100,000 legally acquired firearms from Canadians. The Prairie provinces had already written to their RCMP divisions indicating that provincial funding should not be used for this purpose.

The four provinces also called on the federal government to ensure that no funding for the Guns and Gang Violence Action Fund or other public safety initiatives be diverted to the federal firearms confiscation program. Instead, funding should be used to fight the criminal misuse of firearms by tackling border integrity, smuggling and trafficking.

The four provinces also called on the federal government to direct all communications related to the federal firearms confiscation program through appropriate channels - provincial and territorial ministers responsible for Justice and Public Safety.

"Two years ago, the federal government said that using police resources would be 'expensive and inefficient.' Now the federal government has resorted to using police resources to seize firearms from Canadians. Make no mistake, the federal firearms confiscation program will cost

us billions and will not improve public safety. Alberta's government is not legally obligated to provide resources and will not do so." - Tyler Shandro, Minister of Justice and Solicitor General for Alberta

"While we fully support crime initiatives that focus on the issues related to the criminal use of illegal firearms, preventing and combating gang violence and addressing the issue of illegal or smuggled guns in our province, we don't support those that impact law-abiding hunters, sport shooters, ranchers, farmers and Indigenous people who use firearms for lawful and good reasons." - Christine Tell, Minister of Corrections, Policing and Public Safety for Saskatchewan, and Bronwyn Eyre, Minister of Justice and Attorney General for Saskatchewan

"Manitoba has consistently stated that many aspects of the federal approach to gun crimes unnecessarily target lawful gun owners while having little impact on criminals, who are unlikely to follow gun regulations in any event. In Manitoba's view, any buy-back program cannot further erode our scarce provincial police resources already suffering from large vacancy rates, and away from focusing on investigation of violent crimes." -Kelvin Goertzen, Minister of Justice and Attorney General for Manitoba

"New Brunswick's bottom line is this: RCMP resources are spread thin as it is. We have made it clear to the Government of Canada that we cannot condone any use of those limited resources, at all, in their planned buyback program." -Kris Austin, Minister of Public Safety for New Brunswick

AB Minister of Justice statement on the federal handgun freeze

Minister of Justice and Solicitor General Tyler Shandro issued the following statement on the federal handgun freeze:

"The federal government's national handgun freeze is now in effect. The ban means that Canadians interested in becoming new handgun owners are unable to do so. Sadly, with no new purchases being made, ranges, sport shooting clubs and firearms-related businesses will slowly be forced to shut down, compromising livelihoods and recreational opportunities for tens of thousands of Canadians.

"This freeze led to a massive surge in handgun purchases from law-abiding firearms owners as they sought to make legal purchases for the last time. Ironically, there are now more legally owned handguns than ever before in Canadian history.

"The federal government will pretend that this is about public safety, deliberately conflating legal handgun ownership with the violence that we see in many urban centres across Canada. In reality, the handguns used to perpetrate criminal acts in our urban centres are typically illegally obtained and are smuggled across the U.S. border by weapons traffickers.

"The federal government's real goal is to scapegoat handgun owners and use wedge politics to appeal to a narrow base of voters who wish to see legal firearm ownership in this country eliminated entirely.

"Alberta's government will always stand with lawabiding firearms owners as we strive to keep our communities safe, put criminals behind bars and protect Albertans' property rights.'
