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Edson Fire Department upgrading communications system

Bradley Milton, Fire Chief for the Edson Fire Department, came to the Edson Town Council on October 1, to request an upgrade to the first responders radio system.

Due to deficiencies identified with the current equipment, Milton requested the implementation of the Alberta First Responders Communications System (AFRRCS) for Protective Services and Emergency Management. This implementation would come with a cost of \$120,000 in additional funding to be added to the 2024 Capital Budget.

"AFRRCS is a two way radio network for first responders in municipal, provincial, and First Nations agencies across the province," explained Chief Milton. The system allows agencies to create and share 'talk groups' greatly enhancing communication between agencies. Operation and maintenance for this system is provided by the Government of Alberta. This system has been live since July 1, 2016, and is used by many different agencies province-wide.

This change is being proposed as a direct response to feedback after the 2023 wildfires. The 2023 Edson After Action Reviews conducted by TSI (Transitional Solutions Inc), provided two recommendations that specifically referenced the use of AFRRCS Radios.

"Deficiencies have been identified with the current radio communications equipment in both the After-Action Reviews as well as internally within Town operations. Large emergency scenes are not capable of being controlled through the existing radio system without difficulties, and the use of multiple radio systems or various other communications means. The current radio system, while working, it is not ideal to be using several different communication modes as a standard operating practice," said Milton. He added that the deficiencies were again noted during Edson's involvement in the Jasper wildfires.

The current radios and pagers used are also reaching the end of their lifecycle. This makes it the perfect time to make the switch. Instead of ad-hoc repairs, Chief Milton and Town Administration are recommending a full scale upgrade to the AFRRCS. Upgrading would ensure long-term reliability, compatibility, and provide better value and enhanced operational effectiveness.

Administration is also actively seeking third party donations and grant funding opportunities. They have already received \$55,000 in external funding specific to the implantation of AFRRCS.

Councillor Ed Moore asked about the security of this proposed system. "What are the odds of the public eavesdropping into this system?" Milton replied, "These systems are designed though a VPN system, so they are encrypted and are not able to be scanned."

"How often will you have to do upgrades on

these [AFRRCS radios] or will they last for a while?" asked Councillor Trevor Bevan. Milton stated the new radios will have the same lifespan as normal radios, about 10-15 years.

Councillor Krystal Cacka and Councillor Greg Pasychny voiced their approval for a system-wide upgrade.

Councillor Pasychny noted that when other fire departments came to Edson to help with the 2023 wildfire, they came with AFRRCS. "I think this is a long time coming and it's a really good thing for our fire department."

"I was actually quite surprised to learn that we weren't on AFRRCS already," said Mayor Kevin Zahara. "Is Yellowhead County already on AFRRCS?" Milton responded, "They do have AFRRCS accessibility right now and they have the current radio system. So, it would be an easy transition for us to their dispatching system."

The motion to approve \$120,000 additional funding in the 2024 Capital Budget to implement the AFRRCS for Protective Services and Emergency Management to be funded from the Protective Services Capital Reserve was carried unanimously.

Support for the Edson Community Care Foundation: Council approved a \$10,000 funding request to assist the Edson Community Care
Foundation with start-up costs of sub committee to help recruit doctors and healthcare works to the area. A member of Council will be appointed to the sub committee.

Notice of application to be filed for approval to renew the natural gas franchise fees between the Town of Edson and Yellowhead Gas Co-op Ltd.

The Alberta Utilities Commission expects to receive an application from Yellowhead Gas Co-op Ltd. to renew its franchise fee rates with the Town of Edson in return for the use of municipal lands for its natural gas, effective January 1, 2025. The franchise fee applies to all customers that receive gas services in Edson from Yellowhead Gas Co-op Ltd and is required to be invoiced as a separate charge on the gas invoices.

The franchise fees will be set at 22.5% effective January 1, 2025. For an average customer using 140 gj per year, this will result in a monthly increase of \$11.67 per month. The franchise fee is anticipated to account for approximately \$3.67 of the average monthly residential invoice in 2024.

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

Renting from Trudeau is Not the Canadian Dream

(OpEd) As a Member of Parliament, I constantly hear from Canadians who feel that the dream of homeownership is slipping further out of reach. The Trudeau government's latest housing announcement does nothing to change that. Instead of empowering Canadians to own their homes, this plan keeps them renting—literally—from the government.

The idea of converting federal lands into housing might seem promising at first. Selling off unused public land to create homes is something Conservatives have long proposed. But here's where the Liberals' plan goes off the rails: instead of selling the land to Canadians, they want to lease it to developers, ensuring that Canadians remain tenants, not homeowners. This approach does nothing to address the underlying issues that have made housing so unaffordable in our country.

Under this plan, Canadians won't build equity, and

they won't gain the security that comes with owning both their home and the land it sits on. Instead, they'll be stuck in a cycle of rent, at the mercy of government-controlled leases that could change at any time. This isn't homeownership; it's another form of dependency, where Canadians are

Let's be clear: this is not a solution to our housing crisis. It's a bureaucratic maneuver that keeps people trapped in a rental system, rather than

This committee adjudicates property owner appeals of orders and penalties issued by the County's Agricultural Services pursuant to the provincial acts the County enforces. AGRICULTURAL SERVICES BOARD [3 positions, 3-year terms]

This Board meets at the Wildwood County office at 9:30 AM on the 3rd Wednesday of the month, 4 times a year.

LIBRARY BOARD

[1 position, 3-year term]
This five member management board is

responsible for the provision of library services to county residents. The board provides for the library services in the three rural libraries of Evansburg, Wildwood, and Green Grove (Niton) as well as providing funding to the libraries in Edson and Hinton. Board members develop the annual budget, develop library policies and



- For the best protection, interconnect all smoke alarms. When one sounds, they all sound. It is important to have interconnected smoke alarms if you sleep with the bedroom doors closed.
- A smoke alarm should be on the ceiling or high on a wall.

How to Choose an Alarm

It is important to purchase a smoke alarm that is listed by a qualified testing laboratory. The two most common types of smoke alarms are ionization and photoelectric alarms.

- For the best protection, or where extra time is needed to wake up or help others, both types of alarms or dual sensor ionization photoelectric alarms are recommended.
- An ionization smoke alarm is more responsive to flaming fires and a photoelectric smoke alarm is more responsive to smoldering fires.
- Photoelectric smoke alarms are the best type of alarms to be installed near the kitchen and bathrooms to reduce nuisance alarms.

When the smoke alarm sounds, get outside and stay outside. Go to your outside meeting place. Call 9-1-1 from a mobile phone or a trusted neighbor's phone.

Reflections relocates to better serve the community

Reflections has recently moved the to the former location of the Derrick Liquor Store, a block away from their pervious location.

Reflections is a registered not-for-profit that assists individuals facing adversity in daily living achieve meaningful lives, and to offer support and assistance to individuals who may have mental health challenges, brain trauma, or any adult needing a safe secure place for support and understanding.

Reflections Coordinator Michelle Hickie said, "We have taken over ownership of the building and we are excited to be able to offer more services to individuals for the next 30 years or more."

"It has been well thought out and we have had an architect and four engineers working on it, so it meets every requirement for a group facility, with meeting specifications for 10 or more people. We have the right amount of bathrooms, fire suppression, sprinkler systems, and turn radiuses. There is everything possible ticked off the check sheet to run a group facility," said Hickie.

"Safety is number one for our clients and staff that work here. In order to do that, we had to upgrade waterlines and sprinklers. Numerous cameras are everywhere, outside and inside. It is a fenced compound and there are also exterior lights as part of our development permit."

"Things are going really well. We have been out of the old location since August 1. We have been using a portion of the building as a temporary set up. As things become completed we can incorporate more. We should be fully in by the middle of October, with final completion by November 1. Everything takes time, as we want to ensure everything is being done right," said Hickie.

"With the completion of the upgrades, we will have wheel chair accessibility, two bathrooms that meet group specifications, a shower room, a laundry facility, and a separate staff washroom. There will also be a separate entrance to service perhaps FASD visiting specialists that will come in to do testing. It's a totally separate entrance and area to work from and have privacy, Hickie explained.

"We have an area for a commercial kitchen with all new appliances to meet those needs. Everything will be open and visible. Everything will meet specific guidelines and codes."

"Come winter months, we are looking at extending our hours to six days a week. So Monday through Saturday, then what we do on Saturdays is give out gift certificates and bagged lunches to hold individuals over on Sunday," said Hickie. "If it is extremely cold, we may look at opening on Sunday so there is a place to go. Right now we have summer hours and winter hours."

"We put out snacks for breakfast such as toast, cereal, and muffins along with a bagged lunch. Right now we are doing a lunch meal on Wednesdays, but once our facility is competed we will be going back to serving a supper on Wednesdays and a hot lunch on Mondays and Thursdays," added Hickie.

"We will be having a bike rack set up, so individuals have a place to store their bike while visiting the facility. Outside we will have a picnic area within the fenced location. Inside we are looking at getting some exercise equipment, and eventually looking at having a crafting area and some sewing machines. This move enables us to increase what options we are giving," Hickie said.

"We will be looking at perhaps starting a mentorship program in the future. We will be looking at partnering and collaboration with a number of different groups giving individuals a sense of being part of this community and being valuable. It will all depend on who our clients are and what mentorships we can bring in," Hickie said.

"Right now we have anywhere between 25 and 30 individuals that come in to access meals. We have partial funding from AHS. Thanks also to the Lions Club which have been doing monthly donations that cover the food. We go through any were from \$1,000 to \$3,000 every month just for food. We also count on the schools that bring us donations usually on Mondays and Fridays from their lunch programs or breakfast programs, if they have leftovers. Sobeys also gives us food donations, and the Food Bank if they have an over supply. Also, some restaurants when they have extra food from an event," explaned Hickie.

"We are super hyped about being in a building of our own and the clients are very excited. This will now be a place they can consider home-like," Hickie concluded.

Willow Winds Support Network has a skilled team in the Northwest Region to assist individuals with Fetal Alcohol Spectrum Disorder (FASD).

As September was FASD Awareness month, the network decided to host an open house on Sept. 24 at the Edson Provincial Building. The event was open to the community. It offered an opportunity to chat, ask questions, and have some discussions around FASD and the support that is available. Lunch was also offered.

Mallory Zaharko is the supervisor, Carole Haubi covers Edson and Yellowhead County, Natalia Callihoo covers Edson, Jasper, and Hinton, and Jordan Boisvert covers Hinton.

"We're all educated and trained individuals with a passion for advocating and bringing about awareness for FASD," stated Haubi and Callihoo. "FASD is a lifelong disability that affects the brain and body of individuals who were exposed to alcohol in the womb. It is a complex and unique disability that affects everyone differently. In Canada, FASD impacts one in every 25 people and it impacts more people than Autism Spectrum Disorder, Cerebral Palsy, and Down Syndrome combined."

Haubi added, "We help those with FASD or suspected FASD get diagnosed and provide supports with goal setting, mentorship, skill building, and independent life skills. We also assist with caregiver supports for youth, such as transitioning to adulthood, youth diagnosis, strategies, and support. We also provide free training for individuals and agencies. Training can be customized for agency preference."
