The Edson Friendship Centre welcomed the people of Edson to the National Day of Truth and Reconciliation at Centennial Park on September 30.

The event ran from 11am to 1pm with many different activities taking place. In 2021 the federal government declared National Day of Truth and Reconciliation a federal statutory holiday. This is the second year the Friendship Centre hosted the event.

The day started off with opening prayers, lightning of the sacred fire, and a drumming circle. The prayer and firelighting were performed by local Elders Dorothy Courtereille and Debbie Gaucher, with the drumming circle being led by the Mountain Cree Drummers.

Starting at noon, Secure Energy sponsored a free hotdog lunch that ran until 1pm. During the afternoon small orange cards were scattered around the park. "The cards had residential school information from local Alberta. People could take the information back to an elder and discuss what they learned and then they were given a gift. This helped open up conversations between

people," said Renay Woelfing, cultural programming coordinator with the Edson Friendship Centre.

Throughout the rest of the afternoon local Elders led visitors in three different Indigenous crafts. People could choose from Fish Scale Art, Dream Catchers, or Mini Drums. The crafts were an enjoyable activity for people of all ages and served as a memento for people to take home. They also allowed people to learn from and connect with local elders. Alongside the crafts were free range Indigenous games that people could enjoy at their leisure. There were also raffles and local Indigenous crafts for sale throughout the afternoon.

The day wrapped up with a free chili and bannock supper from 5pm to 6:30pm. There was also an outdoor documentary movie about residential schools and their effects.

One of the more important aspects of the event was the ongoing conversations happening around the fire.

"One of the main things about today, and what we really wanted to bring forward, was that this is not a day of celebration or of fanfare," said Woelfing. "This is a day of reflection. It's really about recognizing and educating people about the true history of Canada and how we're still healing. We have a long ways to go and it's about honouring that. You can go to the fire and share in prayers for the children that were found or for the survivors."

While this year's event was smaller than last year, lots of people came through and there was plenty of good conversations.

This whole event was planned and put on by the Edson Friendship Centre with funds provided by the Gord Downy and Chanie Wenjack fund.

The National Day of Truth and Reconciliation event marked the conclusion of a month for Truth and Reconciliation in September. Other acts of reconciliation have been happening throughout the month. On the October 5, Edson Town Council and town staff met with local elders to take part in a Blanket Ceremony; Town Council implemented a land acknowledgment; and on Sept 20 council began flying a survivor's flag outside the Civic Centre.

There is hope that Truth and Reconciliation will last far beyond the month. "So often we focus on days throughout the year of healing or remembrance, not just for Indigenous issues, but issues in general. It's really taxing on members that are living it. So we really encourage people to reach out to us throughout the whole year for reconciliation —because it can go all year. And it's so meaningful that by the time next year rolls around on September 30, people have that basis of true understanding, "said Woelfing.

## 22nd Annual Run of Hope raises nearly \$6,000

The Annual Run of Hope to raise awareness and money for cancer was held on October 1 in Edson. The run has been taking place for 22 years.

It was first started back in 2002 by two sisters Fern and Charlene. The run was very dear and personal to them as they had lost a sister to cancer. Over the years the run has become personal to many families that have lost a loved one to cancer or are fighting it now.

The Run of Hope's mission statement is to support those going through cancer treatments by promoting wellness, financial assistance, and research through fundraising efforts. They became a registered charity in 2012.

Board member Jody Martin, said, "Close to 100 people showed up for the annual event showing great community support. Donations raised totalled \$5,905.35." All monies raised stays in the Edson area.

If someone is interested in volunteering or becoming part of the Edson Run of Hope they can reach out to any of the board members or contact the group through social media.

Wanda Desautels said, "Everyone who is going through cancer and requires support

in the Edson area is eligible for some financial support. There is an application form requiring basic information that is available through the Primary Care Network or any board member. Edson Run of Hope will provide financial aid for many things. Travel, grocery, and accommodations are examples of what people can apply for.

Assistance with associated expenses for patients who are facing all types of cancer is available. Certain guidelines do apply, but monies can be given quickly to local people for cancer treatment appointments in Edmonton and Hinton.

The Run of Hope group thanked its donors and sponsors for all their support.

## **Highway to Mexico Project**

The Rotary Club of Edson is pleased to announce that it is ready to donate a Fire Truck to the City of Escuinapa, Sinaloa, Mexico. Over the past 23 years, the Rotary Club of Edson has worked with Grande Prairie Rotary Clubs and more than 120 vehicles have been delivered to municipalities in the state of Sinaloa, Mexico and beyond.

The Rotary Clubs of Mazatlan, Mexico distributes the equipment to meet the needs of various communities. The 2023 edition of Highway to Mexico involves 16 Rotary Drivers from Edson and Grande Prairie. They will deliver a fire truck, two ambulances and five school buses.

The Edson Rotary Fire Truck was graciously donated by the Town of Barrhead which will in turn be donated to the Escuinapa Fire Department – where it will protect the community for many years. The Rotary Club of Edson will also be delivering much needed firefighting equipment which is so badly needed by emergency responders

The Rotary Club of Edson is pleased in Mexico. This project would not be successful without the generosity of Alberta Fire Departments.

The eight vehicles will be driven from Alberta to Mazatlan by a team of volunteer Rotarians with two drivers per vehicle. It takes about a week to make the 5000 km trip. Once there, the much-needed vehicles and equipment will be provided to various communities. Rotarians Kevin Thurner and Raul Gurdian will be the Edson drivers. They will depart from Edson on October 6, 2023.

This project has a dramatic impact on the quality of life of people in the state of Sinaloa, Mexico.



### WHAT IT DOESN'T DO





# Town reviews Climate Vulnerability and Risk Assessment study

During the October 3 Town Council meeting, Council was presented the results of the 2023 Climate Vulnerability and Risk Assessment.

The assessment was put together by Stantec Consulting Inc, under direction of Town Administration. The results of this assessment can be used to procure grants and funding as well as making the town aware of the current risks.

This initiative was funded through an \$80,000 grant from the Municipal Climate Change Action Centre's Climate Resilience Capacity Building Program, in partnership with Alberta Municipalities, Rural Municipalities of Alberta, and the Government of Alberta.

Consequently, Stantec Consulting Ltd. won the bid for the project. The project kicked off in December of 2022 when the Town provided Stantec with existing data and studies on infrastructure and facilities. After completing the background information, Workshops were conducted with town staff to assess the potential impacts and consequences of climate change and extreme weather events on the existing town infrastructure.

The result was the final report, as presented to council, which gives overall vulnerability and risk ratings for each of the town's key infrastructure. The report also recommends a list of improvements and activities the Town could consider in order to enhance its overall resilience to climate change.

Representatives from Stantec, Senior Climate Risk Engineer Wayne Penno and Climate Scientist Katherine Pingee-Shippee, attended the October 3 meeting virtually in order to present their findings and answer any questions from council.

The two main goals of the assessment included "Expand the Town's understanding of how the municipal assets, infrastructure, and operations are vulnerable to climate change. Also, to recommend way to increase resiliency," said Pingee-Shippee. It is important to note that 'climate change' refers to drastic changes in weather that affect every day life.

This is most seen in climate hazards such as drought, flooding, severe storms, wildfires, and similar phenomenon.

As a general overview, on a scale from low to high, Edson scored in the following ways. Roads: Medium Vulnerability. Stormwater conveyance and drainage systems: Medium Vulnerability. Water Storage, Treatment and Conveyance Systems: Low Vulnerability. Wastewater Storage. Treatment and Conveyance: High Vulnerability. Ecological Assets and Parks: High Vulnerability. Administration and Operations Buildings: High Vulnerability. Recreation and Community Centres: High Vulnerability.

In total, Stantec noted 632 risks throughout all of these assets. They provided high level recommendations for fixing these areas. This included ideas like: incorporate climate considerations into key levels of decision-making; continually monitor and improve climate projections and expectations; assess climate-resiliency for infrastructure; build and develop climate-based communication and collaboration opportunities; and develop an implementation plan.

After the presentation Pingee-Shippee and Penno, took questions from council.

Councillor Ed Moore asked, "With 632 risks, how does that rate with other municipalities?" Penno responded, "That's probably about average. Most municipalities have similar types of assets as you have. Usually we're around 600 to 800 with a municipality of your size."

Councillor Krystal Baier stated, "You mentioned a few recommendations. Is grant funding available to help implement some of the strategies suggested?" Penno replied, "Our team gets involved a lot in applications for grant funding. So yes, there are opportunities. The government recognizes that climate impact is a big burden, especially small municipalities."

Mayor Kevin Zahara thanked Stantec for attending and for the detailed assessment. The report was adopted as information.

## Fall is here and so is flu season, children could be at higher risk

Back to school season is here, and with it comes fall illnesses. When it comes to the flu, we often look to Australia's flu season to help prepare for what's in store for Canada, and from what we are seeing, Australia's early start to flu season and high hospitalization rates for children is cause for concern.

As your Edson pharmacist, I'm reminding our community of the importance of preventive health measures as we head into a potentially challenging flu season. With children ages 5-10 making up a high proportion of children being hospitalized with the flu in Australia to date, it's important that we take any precautions we can to prevent the spread of the flu and keep our most vulnerable community members safe. Here are a few tips for preventing illness this flu season.

Scrub-a-dub: Washing your hands frequently and thoroughly is one of the most effective ways to reduce the spread of germs. Be sure to scrub and lather your hands for at least 20 seconds - I like to sing happy birthday twice through to make sure I've allowed for full germ removal! This is also a fun way to engage young children in proper hand washing technique. Don't forget to get the back of your hands, in between your fingers, and under your nails. If you don't have access to a sink or soap, keep some hand sanitizer handy. Having alcohol-based hand cleansers as a backup can help reduce germ spread.

· Sleeves up! Thankfully vaccination is one sure way to protect children against the flu. One of the most effective ways to protect yourself and your loved ones this season is by getting your annual flu shot. Flu vaccines can be lifesaving for children, significantly reducing their risk of flu-related death and also reducing risk of severe, life-threatening influenza by up to 75%. Influenza immunity wanes from year to year, so even if you got the flu shot last year, it is important to get vaccinated again for continued protection. You can book your flu shot appointment at shoppersdrugmart.ca/flu or through the PC Health app, available to download for free at https://www.pchealth.ca/.

· Booster time: Early signs suggest that this fall we may be not only combating the flu, but also another COVID-19 wave. With waning immunity, it's recommended that this fall, Canadians should get another COVID-19 vaccine booster if it's been at least six months since their last dose, or COVID infection. This booster is particularly important for those at increased risk of COVID-19 which included people 65+, long-term care residents, those with underlying medical conditions, pregnant people, First Nations, Métis and Init communities, people who are racialized, and those who provide essential community services. You can book your COVID-19 vaccine appointment at shoppersdrugmart.ca/flu or through the PC Health app.

Be sure to visit your local pharmacy to get your flu shot this season. Your pharmacist is here to answer any questions you have on the vaccine, or additional tips on reducing the spread of flu.



### **Muskeg Flyers Club seeks support** after wildfire and floods

The Muskeg Flyers Club, which maintains the Hornbeck cross county ski trails north of Edson, are in need of some community assistance after losses due to the recent wildfire and floods in the area.

"We have lost our grooming sleds and equipment due to the wildfire at Willmore (our off-season storage site) and then the floods washed out three bridges. We cannot operate without some community support to help us out. We also need a few more people to join our board as a few of them are moving on," said Lisa McCartney, Secretary with the Muskeg Flyers.

The club has always stored their trail grooming equipment, the ski clubhouse doors and windows, and mowers for summer grooming in a shed at Wilmore Park. They also stored their emergency safety skimmer for persons rescue in the shed as well.

The unfortunate, devastating wildfire at Wilmore Park included the total loss of their shed full of all of the equipment.

"We had insurance on our tow grooming sleds, but we were not able to claim any of the other items," said McCartney.

In the meantime, they have been able to purchased a new grooming sled as

well as a new pull behind mower to get the trails ready for winter. Thanks went to Mountainside Sales and Rentals for a \$2000 donation towards the ski club's mower.

The Flyers are currently in need of a skimmer to pull behind their sleds in case of a rescue emergency. "If anyone knows of a company that may have an unused skimmer they would like to donate to the club, please contact Vivian Williams 780-712-1906. We are also hoping to find a sponsor partner to help us purchase new plexiglass windows for the ski club shelter," said McCartney.

"We have had some significant damage to our bridges on the ski trails," said McCartney. The bridges are not salvageable and the club is looking to replace them using old oilfield bridges, if they can source any. Again, Mountainside Sales and Rentals came to the club's aid and offered them free use of a track hoe to help.

The Flyers will be organizing a Fall Ski Trails Work Party and Bridge repairs soon. Please contact the club for more information. Their tentative date for kids ski rental is October 28.

Cooking brings family and friends together and provides an outlet for creativity and can be relaxing. But did you know that cooking fires are the number one cause of home fires and home injuries? By following a few safety tips you can prevent these fires.

- Be on alert! If you are sleepy or have consumed alcohol don't use the stove or stovetop.
- Stay in the kitchen while you are frying, boiling, grilling, or broiling food. If you leave the kitchen for even a short period of time, turn off the stove.
- If you are simmering, baking, or roasting food, check it regularly, remain in the home while food is cooking, and use a timer to remind you that you are cooking.
- Keep anything that can catch fire oven mitts, wooden utensils, food packaging, towels or curtains away from your stovetop.

### If you have a small (grease) cooking fire and decide to fight the fire...

- On the stovetop, smother the flames by sliding a lid over the pan and turning off the burner. Leave the pan covered until it is completely cooled.
- For an oven fire, turn off the heat and keep the door closed.

# GYPSD Third Annual National Truth and Reconciliation Week

(GYPSD) The Third Annual National Truth and Reconciliation Week occurred in GYPSD schools from September 25 to 29th and was marked by important conversations including the truths of the Indigenous Treaties and the Residential School system. 
