Reconciliation and create a new way forward in partnership with Indigenous People."

"I am proud of the progress we have made and hopeful for the progress we will continue to make in accepting peoples of all walks of life, cultural backgrounds, religions, sexual orientation, and gender. May we all learn from the Indigenous Peoples teachings in accepting everyone as equal," said Inscho.

Inscho then welcomed Elder Jackie Whitford, who shared a blessing in her Indigenous language then in English. MP Gerald Soroka, Edson's Deputy Mayor Gene Chouinard, and Edson Councillor Peter Taylor were also on stage to welcome guests and take part in the many festivities of the day.

"This is a special day for two reasons," said Inscho, "September 2, 1919 was the date of the historic Edmonton Police service manhunt for a suspected murderer. Wilfred "Wop" May was a famous WW1 air force pilot hired to fly Detective Campbell from Edmonton to Edson to apprehend a murder suspect in the Coal Branch area. Wop landed on 1st Ave., and took off up Main Street, clipping our water pump on the way. It is the first recorded air chase in Canadian history, maybe even North American history, and it happened here in Edson."

"Today is also Alberta Day, a day to celebrate our province and all that we have to be thankful for. The Wop May story is a truly an Alberta story as well. Something we can also be proud of as it is an example of the resilience, talent, and resourcefulness of Albertans," added Inscho.

Vendors and a concession run by the Pine Grove Travel Club were set up around the park as well inside the museum. The event was a collaboration with the Galloway Station Museum, the Edson & District Historical Society, and the Town of Edson.

Masters of Ceremonies Peter Taylor said, "This event is put together by the Town of Edson and the Galloway Station Museum in conjunction with Alberta Day.

"Wop May Day is dedicated in memory of Wop's son Denny May, a great man who worked tirelessly to share his father's contribution to Canadian aviation history. Sadly, Denny passed away in 2021 and he will be sorely missed, and was a wonderful friend to the Galloway," said Taylor. "Some of Denny's family is here today. Although his wife Marg couldn't be here, we would like to welcome Denny's daughters and grandson to today's event."

There was a variety of activities lined up throughout the day including field games like sack races, three-legged races, and water balloon races.

# **Residents bring flooding concerns to Edson council**

During the September 6 Town council meeting, members of the community came to present concerns about reoccurring flooding of their properties.

Multiple residents of the Tiffin area of Edson came to speak about issues with the town sewer system that they believe are causing basements to flood during substantial amount of rainfall.

It happened in July 2019 and again on June 28, 2022. The group was represented by Melissa Weeteringen and Liane Richardson, who spoke on their behalf.

Weeteringen began by giving a summary of her own experiences with flooding. Both times the water came up from the floor drain. The damage caused was upwards of \$100,000 in 2019 and \$90,000 in 2022. Despite the presence of backflow valves they stated the water pressure coming up from the drains is significant. New electronic backflow valves would cost around \$18,000. "Our main concern," said Weeteringen, "is we just want to know where, why, and how water is getting into the sewer system." Richardson added, "And why it cannot handle what's coming in, in our area". They then asked if the town would be willing to help out with the cost of new electronic backflow valves, as other municipalities have done in the past.

"This isn't a new problem in our community," said Councillor Greg Pasychny. "This it the third event. The first one, which was the worst one, was in the early 2000s." He continued to say that steps have been taken by previous councils to mitigate the issue. This includes legislation that prevents new builds from having weeping tile that ties into the sewer system, which causes the overflow. Older neighbourhoods like Tiffin are still connected in the old way and so have those issues.


Weeteringen responded that they know that town is aware. "We're just wondering if there's anything that can be done to help prevent it from happening again. [And] if the town is willing to work with us

to come up with a solution on what we can do on our end and what the town can do on their end to make the problem go away."

Mayor Zahara concluded, "We appreciate you taking the time here today. We will refer this to Administration and hopefully follow up with you in due course. And this will certainly be a discussion as we talk about our upcoming budget."

Edson Family Day Home Providers also pay \$45.00 each month for liability insurance.





# **Opinion/Comment Growing LNG exports is in Canada's best interest**

#### The business case doesn't need any help from the federal government to be established.

Prime Minister Justin Trudeau isn't optimistic about liquefied natural gas (LNG) exports to Europe because he says there's no business case.

Even though the chancellor of Germany just came to Canada asking for LNG to help fill the five new import terminals it's building. And even though companies are ready to invest, if given the right signals.

For electric vehicles, the "business case" measure appears to be quite different.

The federal government is more than happy to spend hundreds of millions of taxpayer dollars to "establish a business case" for EV chargers that private industry will (hopefully) follow.

On Friday, Natural Resources Minister Jonathan Wilkinson released a report on Canada's EV charging infrastructure needs and how these are likely to evolve.

The report says that by 2030 Canada will need around 200,000 publicly accessible chargers. That assumes a 15

per cent market share of new vehicle sales by 2025 and 60 per cent by 2030, on the way to the federal target of 100 per cent by 2035.

"Adequate deployment" of charging infrastructure will require \$20 billion of total investment over the next three decades, the report says.

The federal government plans to spend \$900 million to support 84,500 new chargers across Canada by 2027.

This will be done through a \$400-million recapitalization of the Zero Emission Vehicle Infrastructure Program and a \$500-million investment by Canada's Infrastructure Bank.

"These new chargers are intended, in part, to catalyze private investment in this space," the report says.

"The federal government's funding of these 84,500 chargers – along with a host of other measures to promote EV adoption - will help establish a business case for the private sector to fund the rest of the network" and get Canada's EV network to reach 442,000 to 469,000 chargers by 2035.

Meanwhile, Canada is letting down its allies and losing money by not encouraging LNG investment.

At today's high prices, one large plant on the East Coast the size of the LNG Canada project being built in B.C. would add \$250 million to the country's gross domestic product.

Not to mention the 96,550 direct, indirect and induced jobs created annually across the country that could be added by growing Canada's LNG sector, according to the Conference Board of Canada.

And the 2,449 coal-fired power plants operating around the world – plus the 189 that are under construction – that could instead be fuelled by low-emissions Canadian LNG.

Growing LNG exports is in Canada's best interest. And the business case doesn't need any help from the federal government to be established. The industry just needs a supportive regulatory environment without arduous barriers and uncertainty.

# Monthly Update on the Coal Industry **High Efficiency Low Emission Coal**

An important first step in reducing CO2 emissions from coal is improving the thermal efficiencies of coal fired power stations. The higher the pressure and temperature of steam used, the higher the efficiency and the lower the CO2 emissions. Higher efficiencies allow a greater amount of energy to be produced from a single unit of coal.

A one percentage point improvement in the efficiency of a conventional pulverised coal combustion plant results in a 2-3% reduction in CO2 emissions. These technologies are in existence, widely available and financially viable.

HELE technologies have been developed to increase the efficiency of coal fired plants, therefore reducing CO2 and other greenhouse gas emissions and pollutants. Efficiency in electricity generation means that less fuel is used to produce the same amount of electricity.

#### Supercritical, Ultra-Supercritical and Advanced **Ultra-Supercritical Technologies**

Pulverised coal combustion systems using Supercritical, Ultra-Supercritical and Advanced Ultra-Supercritical technology operate at higher steam temperatures and pressures than conventional plants, meaning they have higher efficiency levels and lower CO2 emissions.



**Integrated Gasification Combined Cycle** 

Integrated gasification combined cycle (IGCC) systems produce a gas from coal, by reacting coal with oxygen and steam to form a "syngas". This gas – composed mainly of hydrogen and carbon monoxide - is cleaned of impurities and then burnt in a turbine to generate electricity and to produce steam for a steam power cycle. IGCC can achieve high thermal efficiencies of up to 48% IGCC power plants use less coal and produce lower emissions as improvements in efficiency reduce carbon dioxide emission.

#### **Fluidised Bed Combustion**

Fluidised Bed Combustion (FBC) is a flexible method of electricity production - most combustible material can be burnt including coal, biomass and general waste. FBC systems improve the environmental impact of coal-based electricity, reducing SOx and NOx emissions considerably
