
The Edson Public Library has been a community hub since 1945. Originally the library was based out of the old town hall. Over the many years it has changed locations four times (including the 2024 renovations). In 1949 the library was inside the scout's hall. In 1957 it was located in the Civic Center. The current 8th Ave location became its home in 1981. This location was then fully renovated over the course of 2023 to 2024.

Throughout the decades the library has been run

by a board of directors. This board is comprised of local residents who keep the library active in the community. The goal is to keep the library as one of the go-to places in the community.

Alongside the celebratory activities the library was also host to a yoga fundraiser for the Yellowhead Woman's Emergency Care Shelter. This was led by Renae Ilnicki, and raised \$190. For more information on the Library's community programming, see the story on page four





Edson's updated Fees and Charges Bylaw is now in effect

The Fees and Charges Bylaw is updated annually in accordance with Council's approved budget and sets the various rates for the Town of Edson, including Leisure Centre fees, utility rates, business and animal licence fees, planning charges, and more.

Some of the key changes include:

- Assessment Review Board non residential fee increased from \$75 to \$150.
- Adjustments to utility fees in accordance with the 2025 approved budget, including water, wastewater, waste management, bulk water, and landfill.
- Additional fees added for construction water, after-hours callouts, additional waste containers (additional organics container has no fee), and landfill construction/demo material from outside the region.

- Modified Planning and Development fees to match best practices.
- Business Licence fees for new residents and non-resident has been adjusted to merge into existing resident and non-resident categories.
- Animal licencing fees have been streamlined to remove repetition, and a category for service dog has been added at no charge.

The new bylaw also includes some rate and fee structure changes for the Edson and District Leisure Centre, which go into effect in March and July of this year. More information on those changes will be released on our website and social media channels soon!

New local market hosted at Edson Pioneer Cabin

Edson and area residents could enjoy some local shopping on February 1, at the Cupid's Corner Market. Local vendors had tables set up in the Pioneer Cabin selling a variety of goods. The sale was open from 11am to 3pm.

The market is the first of its namesake in Edson. The goal is to fill the void left by farmer's markets during the winter months. "We wanted to hold a market to be that gobetween for customers to have that option to make purchases," said Myrna Slusarcyk, vendor and event co-organizer.

"It is also something to get you outside and doing something on a Saturday," added Linda Price, vendor, and the other co-organizer. "Other markets would be during the week and a lot of people can't make it because of work."

This market focused more on nonfood items. The Cupid's Corner was specifically Valentines Day themed.

This included soaps and beauty products, candles, crocheted items, and more. "Everybody's welcome, but what we were trying to do was make sure we didn't have duplicate vendors. We were trying to make it individual. Each person has a unique item and that's what we want our customers to see, that there's a lot of uniqueness in what we bring out here," said Slusarcyk.

Because of the cold, only nine of the planned 14 vendors were able to make it. This same cold brought less

foot traffic than expected, but people still came to take a look. "It's hasn't been huge, but still fairly steady," said Slusarcyk.

The market was planned by a group of vendors. "We've grown to know each other over the years doing markets together and we just decided to plan our own," said Slusarcyk

The group is hoping to make this style of market a regular thing. "Its nice little hall. It's the perfect size for us really, we could even squeeze a few more in if we need to," said Price. The current plan is to host it once a month.

Lots to do at the Edson and District Public Library

The Edson and District Public Library has many new and returning programs for people of all ages to enjoy.

Residents of the area are welcome to come and make the most of the newly renovated space. These programs cover a variety of hobbies and interests. There is something offered almost every day of the week for people to enjoy.

This month the Library is happy to announce the return of the ever popular Friday movie and games night. Every Friday from 4:00pm to 8:00pm, drop in for board games, card games, video games, or role playing games. Then the kid-friendly family movie starts at 6:00pm. This includes classic cartoons, new releases, and fun movies —all safe for kids. "It's a great program for families to come and attend together," said Sarah Tonowski, Library Manager.

Also for the kids, is the Thursday Story-time with Mrs Trish. Every Thursday stories are read aloud for the kids. Storytimes happen at 10:30am and 4:00pm. Families are welcome to come to one or both.

Fridays now welcome the Seniors Movie program. Library staff are offering free coffee and tea, plus a movie for seniors every Friday morning at 11:00 am. The goal is to show a variety of classics, musicals, and more. "Seniors Movie was inspired by the desire to have more free and fun activities for seniors in our area. It is something that they can attend and engage with the community, while also enjoying some free entertainment. We will also take movie requests," said Tonowski

The library also hosts two book clubs. The first one is the Lunch Hour Book Club. Once a month this group meets at 12pm for a casual discussion on that month's chosen title. "Everyone is welcome, feel free to bring your lunch. Copies are available at the front desk the month prior to our meeting date," said Tonowski. January's book was 'Hotline' by Dimitri Nasrallah. February's meeting will be on Feb 18,

covering 'Go as a River' by Shelley Read.

The second book club is new this year. It's the Silent Book Club that also meets once a month. This club differs in that you can bring any book you want. You simply grab a drink and enjoy an hour of quiet reading followed by an optional sharing time. "Whether you are a seasoned reader or just looking for an excuse to crack open a new book, this is your space. There are no rules, no pressure, just reading. The dates coming up are: Feb. 10, Mar. 17, and Apr. 14," said Tonowski.

"We hear all the time, that despite wanting to read more, people struggle to put down their phones and focus on reading. Silent Book Club helps readers prioritize reading by providing a set time and location as well as removing the distractions that phones/social media can pose. Everyon is welcome to participate and we look forward to growing a community of readers."

Alongside all these date-specific programs are the everyday ones. These includes the Cynthia's spectacular Grab and Go Craft Kits and the Seed Library, which is in it's third year starting in February. "Our Seed Library has run for a few years and last year we gave away over 700 full packages of seeds. We provide seeds that have been donated to our library and ask that you return seeds to us after you harvest," said Tonowski.

Library staff are also available to offer assistance with technology with a special emphasis on Tech Help Tuesdays.

"The Library is a reflection of the community and continues to support interests. If you tell us your wishes for new books, movies, and programs we will do our best to make it available," said Tonowski. "The purpose of these events is to bring people together in fun, innovative ways. Everyone is welcome to come enjoy our new space! The library is a comfortable, safe, and inclusive place to explore interests, make friends, and inspire curiosity."

Pursuant to Section 1(i) of the Municipal Government Act an "elector" means: 1. A person who is eligible to vote in the election for a Councillor under the Local Authorities Election Act. Pursuant to Section 47(1) of the Local Authorities Election Act a person is eligible to vote in an election if he:

- a) is at least 18 years old,
- b) is a Canadian citizen, and
- c) has resided in Alberta for the 6 consecutive months immediately preceding election day and is resident in the area on election day.

A poll may be demanded in the Town of Edson by electors equal in number to at least

- a) in the case of a municipality other than a summer village, by electors of the municipality equal in number to at least 10% of the population and
- b) in the case of a summer village, by 10% of the electors of the summer village

in accordance with the provisions of Section 223 of the Municipal Government Act and in accordance with the provisions of Section 251 of the Municipal Government Act. The petition for a vote must be received by the Chief Administrative Officer within 15 days of the last publication of this notice and shall contain on each page "an accurate and identical statement of the purpose of the petition". (Further requirements of the petition are provided in Section 224 of the Municipal Government Act.)

the most. Canada's top exports to the U.S. are natural resources such as oil, natural gas, and critical minerals, which are mainly produced in rural regions.

still impacts Canada's small towns

Almost all of our oilsands production ends up at American refineries. The same goes for many towns whose mining, agricultural products, and livestock end up in the U.S.

These looming threats hinder corporate investment, rural job stability, and any hope for economic growth in the impacted regions.

Trump's tariffs are also likely to increase U.S. foreign takeovers of Canadian companies as our dollar is weakened. Something we've allowed too much of already.

We need to move beyond the mindset of being peddlers of raw materials and start investing more in processing and manufacturing. This would give rural communities great economic diversity and stability. Canada could then sell these valueadded products on the global market ourselves.

Why are we leaving money on the table for someone else? India's growing manufacturing know-how has increased its economic stability from its previous boom and bust resource based economy.

The U.S. has recently shown itself to be an unreliable trade partner. Free trade is dead without mutual respect, and we must not allow Canada to be reshaped according to U.S. terms especially now, as they realize their tariff threats yield the desired

This should be a wake-up call for Canada to diversify our trade partnerships and also address interprovincial trade barriers to help unify our economy.

As a limited resource, Canadian energy should maximize benefits for Canadians, not sold on the cheap to our only buyer.

Hopefully, this is also a wake-up call for an Energy East corridor, on Canadian soil, so we can freely sell our energy to a wider global market, at a decent price.

Premier Danielle Smith issued the following statement upon the announcement of a 30-day pause on tariffs on Canadian goods:

"I am greatly heartened to see that U.S. President Donald Trump and the Government of Canada have agreed to a plan to crack down on fentanyl trafficking and other illegal activities at our shared border.

"The appointment of a Canadian fentanyl czar with authority to

States to target fentanyl traffickers is something Alberta has been calling for since it became clear in our discussions with U.S. elected representatives and administration officials that this would be a critical part of reaching a deal to avoid tariffs.

"Diplomacy has won the day. Let us ensure that continues, as we know there is much more work ahead of us.

"I once again call on our federal government officials and my fellow premiers to de-escalate rhetoric. abandon any non-tariff measures for the time being, and turn our efforts entirely to advocacy and good-faith negotiation. There are so many winwin solutions on trade and security between our two nations. Let us turn this crisis into an opportunity to find them for the benefit of Canadians and Americans.

"To this end, I am preparing to return to Washington, D.C. next week with my fellow premiers to continue our diplomatic efforts and will again return to D.C. later in the month to attend the National Governors' Association conference."

Lisa Baiton, Canadian **Association of Petroleum** Producers (CAPP) President and **CEO** stated, "CAPP is pleased the tariffs on Canadian energy and all Canadian products will be paused to allow for further negotiations with the United States. Our integrated energy infrastructure delivers the reliable, affordable and secure energy Americans and Canadians need every, single, day.

"Combined, Canada and the U.S. produce about 30 percent of the world's natural gas and about 25 percent of the world's oil. If we continue to stick together, the United States and Canada could be the most dominant energy superpower on the planet.

"Instead of tariffs, we should be working together to expand our energy trade and grow oil and gas production from both countries with the goal of exporting more Canadian and American energy to our global allies. More exports from us means our allies are using less oil and less natural gas from non-allied countries like Russia, Iran, and Saudi Arabia.

"Working together on expanding energy production and trade means everybody wins. It means continued access to reliable and affordable energy for Canadians and Americans and a stronger, more secure, North American economy."

Nova Theatre celebrates 70th Anniversary

The Nova Theatre in Edson celebrated their 70th Anniversary on February 1, and invited the community to join in. The theatre marked the milestone with a 10am showing of Mufasa: The Lion King, followed by a tour of the theatre for those interested in learning about what goes on behind the scenes.

Guests could take part in contests such as guessing how much candy was in a jar and how many feet of film was in another, and the event featured great décor such as a display of the theatre's uniforms over the years and a poster that guests could sign. One of the messages on the poster read, "The place to be always! Lucky to have a great theatre."

After watching the movie, kids were treated to goody bags and cookies. The goody bags included movie posters, a pair of Transformers sunglasses with a case, gummy worms, a Hunger Games keychain, a piece of a theatre screen, and a piece of film from a reel.

After receiving their treats, guests split up into tour groups led by Theatre Manager Sandy Moore and Assistant Manager Terry Simms Abu Al-Soud.

Sandy, who has been with the Nova Theatre for 35 years, brought tour groups upstairs and showed the projector, which contains seven different types of computers.

A full-time projection person used to be required to operate the projector and keep the film going. "He'd come up here and that's the last time we'd see him for the night," Sandy said.

The process is a lot more automated now, and a lot easier to fix than it was a few decades ago. "We can't splice film or kick [the projector] anymore," joked Sandy, adding that when issues arise now, techs can plug into the machine remotely and fix it. "Luckily, it's been very reliable," she said.

Terry took groups behind the theatre's screen and into the basement, which she said is home to the theatre's ghost, Frank. With no movie playing, kids thought it was cool that they could see behind the transparent screen, thanks to the unique fabric the screen is made of.

Sandy provided some additional theatre history and information to the Weekly Anchor, such as the fact that Edson actually had three theatres at one time. The Edson Theatre opened in 1938 and closed in the mid-60s, while the Glenwood Drive-In opened in 1952 but burned down on August 30, 1976.

The Nova Theatre opened February 1, 1955, and was owned by the Fowler family until 1976 when Landmark Cinemas purchased the theatre. "Our association with Landmark continues to this day," said Sandy.

Some of the first films played at the Nova Theatre after its opening included Gilbert & Sullivan, The Diamond Queen, Ma and Pa Kettle Back on the Farm, Green Fire, Law and Order, and Kiss Me Deadly.

County Council receives end-of-2024 Community Services update

The January 28 Yellowhead County Council meeting included a Community Services update from General Manager of Community Services Crystal McNernie. The update was based largely on November and December of 2024.

Community Services encompasses several departments at Yellowhead County, including Agriculture Services, Family and Community Support Services (FCSS), Heritage & Cemeteries, and Parks & Recreation.

In Agriculture Services, the County provided an Agricultural Service Board orientation in November for both new and standing members of the board. "It was a great learning opportunity for everybody," said McNernie.

McNernie said that another update involved the Provincial Grant application for the five-year funding cycle, which Ag Services Supervisor Jennifer Benson has been working on over the past couple of months.

"The province has changed the reporting requirements for that grant. It's a lot more comprehensive than it used to be," said McNernie. "Really, they're looking for greater accountability from municipalities in terms of how they're meeting their responsibilities as it relates to the Weed Control Act and the Pest Control Act."

At the ASB Regional Conference at the end of October, the County-supported Drought and Livestock Agri-Stability Resolution passed unanimously. The resolution looks to re-evaluate and improve several aspects of AgriStability with the aim of providing a broader level of drought support for Canada's agricultural sector.

The resolution then went before the Provincial Assembly in January, where it was also carried. "It had 89% support from the membership," said McNernie. "That was good news, to see that it was supported."

Ag Services also took part in a meeting on November 14, 2024, that included the Assistant Deputy of Agriculture. The meeting discussed wild boar control, new trapping methods, and Bill 293 (the Pandemic Prevention and

Preparedness Act). The meeting was attended by 180 fieldman, assistants, and ASB staff.

Other updates from Ag Services included community outreach like their birdhouse workshops (focusing on chickadee, owl, and tree swallow houses), assisting Parks & Rec with outdoor ice creation and maintenance, and assisting Heritage with the construction of a headstone lifter and grave marker storage box.

FCSS updates included ongoing programming in schools, after-school activities, and community outreach, as well as the hiring of a Home Support position in the Edson-Central area. Programs include Fall Fun Days, the Good Neighbour Snow Shoveling Program, and the "Start Strong" Healthy Relationship program. Start Strong is ongoing in Entwistle and Grand Trunk Jr. High, "with positive outcomes in self-awareness and emotional expression."

FCSS also approved grants for Lobstick Successful Kids and Families (\$2,630), the Brule Community Association (\$3,740), and the Fulham Community After School Care Program (\$2,000).

"One of the biggest areas of focus for both Administration and the FCSS board over the last couple of months has been the development of the FCSS business plan," said McNernie. "That's been taking up a lot of time and we've been looking at really prioritizing or identifying what those priority areas are for FCSS. Moving forward, that process continues, and we will be looking at presenting back to Council in the spring with the outcomes of that report."

"With Heritage & Cemeteries, the two big accomplishments related to cemeteries was the purchase and installation of the new columbarium for the Evansburg Cemetery... and also the selection of our cemeterymanagement software," said McNernie. "That software will allow for better record keeping, plot management, and burial tracking. Just another tool for Administration to use to better manage the Evansburg Cemetery." McNernie noted that the software could expand to include another six to eight additional cemeteries, but that the focus for now is on getting Evansburg set up.

Other updates for Heritage & Cemeteries included acting as a liaison for the donation of a WW1-era kilt to the Northern Rockies Museum, and the organization of a collaboration tour with Parks & Recreation to explore potential partnerships for the two departments.

For Parks & Recreation, McNernie said that November and December "is really spent focusing on getting our outdoor rinks ready." "For the most part, by Christmas all of our rinks were open and accessible to the public," she said.
"The Bear Lake Skating Loop did
open in January so we didn't quite
get that one ready for the end of the
year, but it is open and all of our
rinks are currently operational."

Other updates included Fall Break Camps, Yoga and Pilates classes, cross-country ski and snowshoe rentals, and the YCE Multiplex.

The Community Services Highlights for November and December 2024 were accepted unanimously by Council as information.

Kirsty Maskowitz, Museum Coordinator.


Last year the Red Brick received 32 entries which all varied in style, but all fit that year's theme of 'Springtime'.

Looking to gain your High School Diploma?

The Canadian Adult Education Credential (CAEC) high school equivalency assessment is for adults who do not have a high school diploma or need an education credential to open new doors to educational, training, or employment opportunities.

"Pearson View, who administered the GED exam in Canada, stopped supporting the GED here, in May of 2024. It was then replaced by the CAEC exam. The CAEC was developed by Alberta Education and national partners and is a made in Canada replacement for the GED," says Clare Hemsley, who is an Adult Learning Assistant with Edson and District Community Learning.

"Like the GED, there are five different subject areas that you must pass: English Reading, English Writing, Social Studies, Science, and Math. Each of the five subject areas has its own exam. This exam can also be taken in French," Hemsley says.

"If you have taken and passed some of the exams under the GED system, they will continue to count towards your CAEC qualification and you do not need to repeat those exams up until May 2027," explains

Hemsley.

CAEC is not necessarily designed for individuals who wish to go on to further education. "University and college courses can require specific high school courses and you'll need to contact the institution directly to find which courses you require for admittance to a program," says Hemsley.

"If you did not gain enough credits to receive a high school diploma and you want to take the CAEC, you can, if you are 18 or over and have been out of school for 10 consecutive months. You must also have an Alberta student number.

You can take the CAEC exams in Edson. They cost \$60 each and must be booked and paid for online. The tests are computer based and can be taken at Edson and District Community Learning Society in the Provincial Building. For more information you can call the office at 780-723-6247.

You can retake tests in the next calendar month to a maximum of three times in a calendar year.

"We offer tutoring to individuals to help them reach their goals. We usually charge a \$25 registration fee, however, this may be waived depending on the student's situation," says Clare Hemsley.

Evansburg RCMP lay charges on male after reported kidnapping

(RCMP release) Evansburg, Alta. – On Feb. 2, 2025, Evansburg RCMP responded to a third-party report where it was believed an adult victim had been kidnapped at gunpoint in the area of Highway 16A and Range Road 81 in Evansburg.

Acting on this reported information, RCMP deployed significant resources, including dozens of members from Evansburg RCMP, Edson RCMP Traffic Unit, Edson RCMP, Whitecourt RCMP, Mayerthorpe RCMP, Parkland RCMP, Drayton Valley RCMP, Hinton RCMP, Barrhead RCMP, Saddle Lake RCMP, Real Time Operation Centre, RCMP Air Services, Alberta's Remotely Piloted Aircraft Systems (RPAS), Major Crimes Unit, Emergency Response Team, and the Federal Serious & Organized Crime Unit.

RCMP located the vehicle and attempted a traffic stop, but the driver fled at an extremely high rate of speed, especially considering the road conditions; due to the perceived danger to the victim, a pursuit was initiated. RCMP were able to make contact with the vehicle, resulting in the driver fleeing on foot; the victim was secured safely with RCMP members.

RPAS and members began attempts at locating the suspect in a

rural residential area, north of Range Road 150. The suspect was located running behind a shed and the suspect attempted to break into a residence but was confronted by the homeowner, containment was initiated and shortly after, the suspect came out of the forest in surrender.

Jeffery Joseph Fendelet (50), a resident of Onoway, Alta., was charged with flight from police, dangerous operation of a motor vehicle, resist/obstruct a police officer, mischief under \$5000, break and enter to a residence and forcible confinement.

Fendelet was brought before a Justice of the Peace, where he was remanded with a court date of Feb. 5, 2025, at the Alberta Court of Justice in Stoney Plain, Alta.

First reading to Aerial Fire Truck Debenture Bylaw

At the February 4, 2025, meeting, Council gave first reading to Aerial Fire Truck Debenture Bylaw No. 2321. This Bylaw would allow for the borrowing of a maximum of \$2,750,000 with a maximum interest rate of 6% and a maximum term of 20 years for the capital purchase of an Aerial Fire Truck in 2025.

Why does the Town of Edson need a new truck?

Engine 604 is reaching the end of its lifespan as a frontline fire apparatus. Fire Protection Association (NFPA)1900 (2024, Annex F-F.1) recommends placing apparatus older than 15 years into a reserve status, and older than 25 years into retirement. 604 has now been in service for 19 years. A direct replacement of 604 was estimated at \$1.1 million to \$2

With this in mind, an aerial truck (commonly known as a ladder truck) was recommended and approved as a replacement in the 2025 budget.

Why an Aerial Truck?

An aerial truck would provide a higher service level for our community with additional capabilities for increased life safety and property protection. An aerial has greater effectiveness for fire suppression, providing vertical access for both firefighting and rescue operations.

This would also enhance Edson's Fire underwriters Survey (FUS) rating, by improving the town's ability to respond to lowrise fires and large commercial incidents.

With the growing number of large buildings, both in height and overall size, having this extra capability is a growing need in our community. Some examples of such facilities include Weyerhaeuser, Walmart, Parkland Lodge, Schools, and larger apartment buildings. his also greatly impacts fire suppression operations in standard single-family homes as well.

The Town of Edson is aware of the "sticker shock" of a number like \$2.75 million. This is a substantial purchase for our community. A debenture was chosen by Council as a way to spread the debt payments over several years, giving generational ownership of this purchase as opposed to the bulk sum being fronted by current residents only.

It should also be noted, that while \$2.75 million is the number requested in the bylaw, this is the maximum amount being considered. As Council and Administration go through the 2026 budget process, all efforts will be made to find efficiencies to bring that amount to be borrowed down. Grants and other funding will also be explored as we look to keep this as affordable as possible for our residents.

How is this being advertised?

A notice of the Bylaw will go in the newspaper for 2 consecutive weeks starting February 10 through to February 23. Following this, electors have 15 days to file a petition against the Bylaw.
