are running our kids fun zone with bouncers, glitter tattoos, and games. It's our 15th anniversary, so we are encouraging everybody to put some glitter on themselves," said Tarves.

There was also a display that commemorated 15 years of Eddie's Big Run including some old metals, shirts, and photos.

David Johnston, a race organizer, said, "Today I helped with the set up and then I will be the lead for the runners on my bike. Runners for the 10K, 5K, and 3K sometimes can get a little tunnel vision and don't remember where they are on the route, so I lead the way. With the 3K there are a lot of kids, so we want to make sure they are not getting distracted and know where to go."

When David was asked about the reason behind Eddie's Big Run, he said, "It helps promote health and wellness, it promotes running in the community, but it also raises funds for the Trail System. The trail system is what we use for the run, so the money raised through Eddie's Big Run and sponsorships goes into paving and improving sections of the trails. And hopefully in the future, expanding the trail system."

Nolan Taylor came in first for the 10K run, "I am 15 years old and this is my first official 10K run. I did a 5K run for

Breast Cancer, but I ran the 5K twice." When asked what this run was like, Nolan added, "It was fun, there was a great turn out, great people, and great event organizers. It was quite unexpected to come in first place knowing I was running with adults. They were all great competitors. I can absolutely see myself doing more runs. I am a part of the Edson Youth Council; this year being my first term. I'm in grade nine at HRH and they have a great track program there. Anyone who's thinking of doing a run, should give it a try."

Tarves added, "We had a total of 258 runners this year. We will not have our final totals for a little while, but all proceeds from the run will go toward enhancing the trails in town and at Willmore Park. We are proud to administer an event which elevates the quality of recreation and active-living in our community. Recently, proceeds from Eddie's Big Run were used to purchase benches for along the trail system, and picnic tables for Glenwood Park."

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National Indigenous Peoples' Day hosted at Willmore Park

Indigenous Peoples Day on June 21, recognizes and celebrates the history, heritage, resilience, and diversity of First Nations, Inuit, and Métis across Canada.

The Edson Friendship Centre held a gathering out at Willmore Park from 2:00 p.m. to 6:00 p.m. for community members to join them in an afternoon of friendship and socializing.

Residents came together to share stories, culture, and cooking food like bannock over an open fire and roasted hot dogs. people listened to traditional music and drums being played in the background throughout the afternoon. Crafts and conversations were also enjoyed. Dream Catchers were a popular craft during the event.

Caroline Charbonneau, Wildfire Information Officer, and some crew were on site to answer questions. "We have always wanted to be a part of the Indigenous celebrations on June 21, but were unfortunately unable to attend until this year. Today we had the opportunity to bring a fire crew out and display all their fire hoses and pumps. The kids can try out the equipment and we also have an obstacle course they can do."

"We also have some fire prevention information to share with folks. FireSmart has been a really hot topic lately. We want people to do their part when it comes to FireSmart, whenever they can, to help fires from impacting our communities."

A free bussing service was offered to everyone wanting attend the afternoon at Willmore Park. Councillor Gean Chouinard volunteered his personal time to operate the Moving Edson Bus to ensure community members got a ride out to Willmore Park and back. Pick up and drop off was available from the Edson Friendship Centre starting at 1:30 p.m. and went to 6:00 p.m.

Elder Jackie Whitford was happy to share her knowledge of history as she knows it from growing up. A family from Holland was eager to learn from what she had to say.

Elder Whitford said to attendees, "I like to be called native or Indian not aboriginal. Over the years we have been labelled indigenous and aboriginal from the government. But I'm very strict and like to be called by what I've always been known to be, Indian or native."

"I was raised in a tipi and later a trapper's cabin. There was my grandfather, myself, and my handicapped aunt who lived together. I am a native of this land, that's who I see myself as. I'm very traditional. I follow all the protocols of being traditional, because my grandfather raised me the old way. I slept on my grandfather's back a lot. My grandmother passed away when I was a year and a half. Grandfather had me strapped to his back when he went out trapping or tending to what needed to be done," said Whitford.

"We want to share and have everyone acknowledge and have respect for our land. To come together as one, as protectors of this world. Mother Earth is crying right now, she is hurting. It's important that we all work together to save our earth. From what my

grandfather taught me as a little girl growing up. I have seen with my own eyes many things he told me were going to happen, are happening. It's important that I teach our kids, and other elders teach too. It's so important to our culture to pass that information onto the young ones. I respect everyone's culture, religion, or way of life. I think it's so important that

we don't loose that. It doesn't matter what culture you are from, it's important to teach so it's not lost." said Whitford.

The Edson Friendship Centre now has a tipi and a trapper's tent set up at Willmore Park. They plan on having different events and teachings at the park.

This treatment, part of our forest renewal program, will temporarily control herbaceous, shrub and deciduous competition, to improve the growth and survival of tree seedlings and saplings. Herbicide will be applied through either aerial or ground-based application.

Application of herbicides is scheduled to begin on or around August 10, 2024, pending approval from Alberta Forestry and Parks. The planned completion date for the program is September 15, 2024.

Edson will not be having fireworks on Canada Day. But, there are reasons behind this decision. Diana Inscho, Community Development Coordinator with the Town, said, "When we postponed the fireworks last year because of the evacuations and sensitivity to fire risk, we rescheduled them to RCMP Centennial Park Light Up in November. The response and attendance at Light Up was overwhelming. We had so much positive feedback that we decided to follow suit this year."

"Canada Day fireworks cannot start until 10:45 p.m. and the skies are still not very dark. Also, Canada Day often lands on a weekday or a long weekend when residents are away, so there is a large number of people who are not able to watch them," Inscho explained.

The 7:00 p.m. Friday evening timing at Light Up allowed even people with early bedtimes to view them. Also, the display was so much more brilliant against a darker sky and the newly lit lights on the trees," said Inscho.

"We embrace the opportunity to bring more people together at different times of the year to enjoy the outdoors and our beautiful RCMP Centennial Park. There have been comments about the possibility of

Increased number of abandoned campfires found

However, Caroline Charbonneau, Wildfire Information Officer, says, "An increased number of abandoned campfires have been found this past month. Please take extra precautions to ensure you fully extinguish your campfire before leaving your site and never leave a fire unattended. If you see smoke or flame in the forest and suspect it's a wildfire, Call 310-FIRE (3473) to report it."

"The recent precipitation this spring has not been significant enough to prevent wildfires from spreading. Soak your campfire, stir the ashes, and soak it again until the ashes are cool to the touch. It's important to understand that wildfires caused by humans are rarely arson and anyone could accidentally cause a wildfire. Keep watch of your surroundings when working and recreating outdoors and keep the risk of causing a wildfire to a minimum," says Charbonneau.

Just simple safety measures can ensure we all get to enjoy the outdoors this season.



Streaming services should expose Trudeau's latest tax grab

The new streaming services tax grab should be clearly itemized on bills so subscribers are fully informed of the additional cost

If streaming services want to fight back against the Trudeau government's new streaming tax, which will cost them five percent of their revenue each and every year, they need to be honest with customers and put the tax right on the bill so subscribers see it and understand how much it's costing

The truth is this is a tax. It will cost Canadians money. And everyone knows it, including the prime minister. Maybe not the prime minister of 2024, but certainly the prime minister of 2018, when, in response to NDP pressure to tax streaming services, Justin Trudeau sensibly refused, saying: "The NDP is claiming that Netflix and other web giants are the ones who will pay these new taxes. The reality is that taxpayers will be the ones to pay those taxes."

Well, that was then and this is now. Trudeau's 2018 logic has been thrown out the window. The Canadian Radio-television and **Telecommunications Commission** announced last week that it will require "online streaming services to contribute five percent of their revenues to support the Canadian broadcasting system." That means streaming services like Apple Music, Netflix, Spotify, YouTube and Disney+ will be hit with a new tax. And, as Trudeau pointed out in 2018, Canadians will be the ones paying the

The government's own analysis says the new measure will cost Canadians \$200 million per year. When businesses are forced to hand over hundreds of millions of dollars to the government, they can't just eat the cost. As Trudeau himself said, this

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streaming tax will be passed onto consumers. The industry agrees. Canadians should be "deeply concerned" with the government's decision to "impose a discriminatory tax," said Digital Media Association President and CEO Graham Davies, adding the move will only worsen the "affordability crisis."

Translation: prepare for higher prices.

The streaming services targeted by these new measures shouldn't take them lying down. They shouldn't cooperate with the government's plan to hide the new tax. Netflix, Spotify, Apple, Disney, YouTube and all the rest need to be honest with their customers about why prices are going up: the Liberals' streaming tax.


Conservative Leader Pierre Poilievre recently wrote an op-ed telling corporations not to rely on lobbying behind the scenes to influence policy. If businesses want policies to change, they need to convince voters so voters will, in turn, convince politicians. Canadians must understand why watching movies and listening to music will cost them more. They are fed up with tax hikes. But only if they know what's happening can they make politicians change course. That's the right way to stop the streaming tax.

In case it's not already obvious, simply sitting back and waiting for the next election isn't good enough. "Obviously, my future government will do exactly the opposite of Trudeau on almost every issue," wrote Poilievre in his op-ed. "But that does not mean that businesses will get their way. In fact, they will get nothing from me unless they convince the people first."

That's precisely why these streaming services, from Apple and Google to Spotify and YouTube, need to be honest with their customers about the streaming tax. They should add a separate item on every subscriber's bill showing exactly how much Trudeau's streaming tax is costing. They should direct angry calls to MP offices instead of customer service lines.

When everything feels unaffordable, a night in with a movie or a walk with a favourite album shouldn't get hit with yet another tax






Miate Nunez (9) and Mya Deville (9) set up their Lemonade Stand outside the Galloway Station

The Edson Community Gardens held an event called Fun for the Whole Family on June 22, from 10:00 a.m. until 2:00 p.m.

The community was invited to come and have some fun with plenty to see, do and learn, as well as lots of good food to enjoy.

Tours around the gardens were being offered with insights into the plants and the variety of insects and birds found there. They had information bulletin boards that shared information and you could scan the code to hear different wildlife sounds.

Different activities centres were set up for building bird and bat houses and for stringing beads for a special necklace or bracelet to take home.

Lisa Wilkinson had some great displays up on some of the creatures you can find around the area. There were quizzes and activity booklets kids could take home.

Wilkinson explained, "We have bats which we don't see very often, but they fly around at night eating bugs which is extremely important. There is a small pond here at the Community Garden, and ponds have a lot of different creatures in them. Some you don't see including a lot of insects. Dragonflies for example, lay their eggs on the water. The larva stay in the water until they start to develop their wings before leaving the pond. Dragonflies like bats, also eat bugs. Amphibians, of course need ponds, although some of them don't sped a lot of time in the water. All amphibians in Alberta do lay their eggs in water though. Our ponds are really important, just as our wetlands. All the natural vegetation supports insect larva."

Anne Auriat, manager of the Edson Recycle Depot and Community Garden, said, "We had two young doctors who were here on their residency help out considerably with our gardens this spring. The grade nine agriculture group from the high school came out and did wood chips and weeding which was a great help. Our staff did a lot of work. It's nice getting back to our school groups helping, with Covid we didn't have that help. This year we were booked every Tuesday and Thursday with school students in May and June. We also have a senior that comes here every single day."

World class competition at **Wildwood Bronc Bustin' Rodeo**

Spectators gathered at the Wildwood Agricultural Grounds on June 18, for the annual Wildwood Bronc Bustin' Rodeo.

Starting at 11am, was the Ranch Rodeo featuring a variety of ranch themed competitions. Then starting at 6pm was the 'bronc bustin'.

The ranch rodeo was technically a separate event put on by local Brian Dixon. The rodeo had various events including youth events like 'instant rancher race', and 'cows are out', plus adult competitions like 'hanging cowboy', 'trailer loading', and more.

The Calcutta was at 6pm with the brone riding starting at 7pm. "It was just fantastic," said Tove Steckhahn Jones, President of Wildwood Bronc Bustin'. "It was 30 of the best saddle bronc riders in the world, and the best bucking stock in North America." The Calgary Stampede returned as the event's stock contractor, providing horses for the event.

Over 1,000 people came out to watch the Bronc Bustin'. "It is a small town event, but our stands were full. It was standing room only. This was by far our best event yet," said Steckhahn Jones. The event also had onsite camping for those planning to spend the weekend.

"We want the cowboys to come out and get the best rides they can for the best points they can. Everybody is trying to win. We want the fans to feel that energy, but it's also that hometown feel, with these world renowned athletes —is just amazing. Our goal is just to put on a great event," said Jones.

Volunteers from the community also come out to help with the event, including the Wildwood Ag Society. "I want to thank our countless volunteers. There are so many volunteers that I couldn't name them all," said Jones.

Local resident Logan Hays took home the win with a 92.5 point ride on a horse named Exotic Warrior. He was the only rider in the event to score over 90 on two different rides. Hays is currently ranked at #5 in the world.

"This rodeo was started 19 years ago by Rod Hays. He lives in Wildwood, but he is a world renowned saddle bronc champion. He's an eight time Canadian champion, he's been to the NFR 20 times. Him and a group of people wanted to start a standalone event, and this was the first event of its kind," explained Jones. In 2016, the event gained accreditation with the Professional Rodeo Cowboys Association so points gained at this event can go towards a rider's world standing.

The end of the day dance featured Dusty Golden of Mayerthorpe, and the band Wild Rose Roulette from Alder Flats. The dance was a no minors event, and was included with the ticket.

Next year's event will be the 20th anniversary. The group has many plans to celebrate the occasion. So be sure come out and enjoy some high level rodeo, along side some local fun.

It was a beautiful day for the 9th Annual Shandy's Dream for a Cure on June 22. The fundraising event ran from 12:00 p.m. to 4:00 p.m. in the RCMP Centennial Park in Edson.

Barbie Brown Reichenbacher said, "We couldn't have asked for a better day for a BBQ. The weather was perfect and we had a great turnout almost selling out of our burgers and hotdogs. Our total raised (including online donations) is \$4,544.60 to date."

"Our fundraising goal is \$10,000 and we hope to reach that by year-end. Our online donation page is active until the end of the year. Our bottle drive is scheduled for September 21. We collect bottles year-round and donate them whenever we have a load. Our online link to donate is Barbie Brown-Reichenbacher - Your Way (akaraisin.com)," added Reichenbacher.

"It's always nice to meet new people and bring awareness to our cause by sharing Shandy's story because not everyone knows the reason behind our fundraiser. It's always a joy to see Shandy's friends and catch up with what's happening in their lives. The butterfly release is important to them because it gives them a chance to be a part of the fundraiser and honour their friend on her special day," Reichenbacher explained.

"Drake (Shandy's brother) enjoys chatting with Shandy's friends as well and sharing memories of his sister with them. He knows Shandy would be very proud of how we are keeping her dream alive," said Reichenbacher.

Food for the barbecue was donated by Coal Valley Mine, Independent Grocers, Sobeys, and Subway. Fresh Vine donated their food truck.

The Edson Fire Department came out with their fire truck to answer any questions, and allow kids to climb aboard to have a better look at all the equipment. A booth with memorabilia in Shandy's name, with more items each year, is always a special way to remember Shandy. A memorial walk around the park and

a beautiful butterfly release in memory of Shandy was done at the end of the day.

All proceeds from the fundraiser are donated to fund paediatric brain cancer research in Shandy's

Everett was born on August 15, 1932, in Prince Albert, Saskatchewan, to James and Alice Martin, into a family of 7 children. The family spent their early years in Saskatchewan and later relocated to the Edson area in Alberta.

His happiest moments were spent learning about all of these things and then being able to pass that knowledge on to those he loved, children, grandchildren and friends.

Everett and Heather moved the family to Cadomin in 1962, to pursue careers in the mining industry, right in the mountains and foothills he was to grow to love and know like the back of his hand. Everett and Heather both knew the value of passing on their knowledge of gathering, preserving and sharing food from the wilds as well as their ever-abundant gardens. Many a long night was spent with the family preparing and preserving after a long day of gathering.

Throughout his career, Everett would become an accomplished Welder, Blaster and Inventor. He did not always have the resources that would allow him to build all of the things his mind would think of, so his resourcefulness would kick in, and he would gather the things he would need wherever they could be located. Treasures were to be found at abandoned mine sites, discarded railway equipment, local dumps, which also just happened to be a great place to learn more about bear behavior. He would then take these treasures and create things from spring-fed fish tanks to gold dredges, just to name a few.

After Everett retired from the mining industry, he had a chance to follow a dream of being a big game outfitter. With the help of his good friends and family, he spent even more time doing what he loved, making new friends of people from all over the world, and thereby earning the name of Everett Martin The Bear Man.



PERSONAL MOBILE DEVICES IN SCHOOLS

Immediate Release: June 24, 2024 On June 17, 2024, Education Minister Demetrios Nicolaides announced a Ministerial Order regarding students' use of personal mobile devices in schools for the start of the 2024-25 school year.

Highlights of the Ministerial Order:

- K-12 students will not be allowed access to personal mobile devices during school instructional time;
- Personal mobile devices are defined as cell phones, smart phones, watches, headphones or any other personal electronic devices which connect to cellular networks;
- School administrators will work with students and families on a case-by-case basis regarding exemptions for health/medical concerns or special learning needs;
- School divisions have flexibility to determine and define student access to personal mobile devices during designated breaks (ex. lunchtime);
- School divisions will take steps to restrict student access to social media sites;
- School principals may make exemptions to allow the use of personal mobile devices for specific educational purposes on a case-by-case basis.

To address the requirements of the Order, GYPSD will start to develop administrative procedures over the summer which will:

- · Define student access to personal mobile devices during designated breaks;
- Define processes to potential exemption due to health/medical reasons, special learning needs or specific educational purposes;
- Define procedures for storing personal mobile devices while use is restricted;
- Define consequences for non-compliance;
- Define expectations for the use of personal mobile devices by GYPSD staff.

More information will be shared prior to the start of the 2024-25 school year. Please visit the Government of Alberta's <u>website</u> to learn more about the minister's recent announcement.


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Grande Yellowhead stretches from Jasper National Park, east to Evansburg, and north to the Hamlet of Grande Cache.


