

There were a lot of people coming to the event. "The first day we hit 1,000 individuals that came through the doors and today is shaping up to


be very busy as well." Approximately 3,000 people made their way though the show.

Any person who is deemed to be affected by the issuance of any one of these permits may appeal to the Subdivision and Development Authority by 4:00 p.m., on the 21st day after the date of issue as published on the Town's website. On Permitted Uses, grounds for appeal must relate only to interpretation, variance, or relaxation of Land Use Bylaw 2070. On Discretionary Uses, all aspects of the proposed development may be challenged upon appeal. Written notice of appeal, accompanied by the appeal fee as established by Town Council, must be filed through the Office of the Secretary of the Subdivision and Development Appeal Board at Box 6300, Edson, AB T7E 1T7. Direct Control District Approvals cannot be appealed.



Security Suites debated at Town Council meeting

Edson Town council held a Committee of the Whole meeting on April 30, to discuss the final changes to the updated Land Use Bylaw (LUB).

This meeting served only to discuss the changes. Final readings and approval will need to take place at an upcoming council meeting. The meeting was broken down into sections. Administration changes and residential and industrial feedack/

concern responses.

One topic that was of great concern was the new bylaws around Security Suites on industrial property. Many residents expressed concern with the changes as many have homes that are on business lots. The updated bylaws have suite size restrictions that would prevent them from rebuilding those building should they be lost. Most feedback asked for the removal of the size restrictions.

defined Security Suites/Surveillance Suites as subordinate to a principal parcel use an intended for more remote areas of a municipally to provide a form of extra security for business owners. They may be classified as dwelling if food preparation and sleeping quarters are included, but they are not intended to function as residential land uses for families to reside in. "It really isn't intended to create a situation where

Town Administration there might be individuals that are living predominately on a site that has industrial operations on it," said Becky Soby, Planner with Urban Systems, who assisted the town with the bylaw draft.

the mixing of residential and industrial uses due to safety concerns. Administration is recommending the current provisions in Section 8.27 of the proposed draft LUB No. 2296 remain as is. However, they still would like to hear council's feedback.

Mayor Kevin Zahara voiced his concern for the changes. "The fact remains that some of these places have been there for a very long time. And so people have invested money, a significant amount of money. So if something were to happen, and they would not be able to remain." replace their home, I'm very challenged with that. For me, I don't support the changes that are here. Dwellings should continue to be allowed, if they are existing on those specific properties. I don't think we should be allowing any new development."

Councillor Greg Pasychny added that often he sees pre-built homes like mobile home, or Atco trailers being used as security suites. These can also exceed the size limits. "I'm not against limiting them in the future. But is there a way we can add a provision or a clause for existing ones, that if something happens to them they can be

replaced?"

"I think it would have to be specific to allowing it to be rebuild to what it was before," answered Soby. "The intention of these regulations are to insure that these surveillance suites are built only Bylaws often prohibit for the purpose of surveillance of the site and not having residents live on it." Soby explained that the challenge would be that rebuilds would not align with that intention, and could not be defined as a surveillance suite.

> "I agree with the intent," stated Councillor Peter Taylor. "We shouldn't see residential dwellings in an industrial area. That being said, I cannot ignore the number of people who have come forward. I think we are going to have to have some kind of provision, in some way, that any existing suites may

Clayton Kittlitz,

General Manager of Infrastructure and Planning, responded to the concerns, "I can certainly appreciate the challenge. It is hard to deal with legacy issues and situations." He explained that the earliest drafts of the bylaw didn't even include the surveillance suites in Business Industrial (BI-2) zones. They were added in after discussions with the public. It is an option for an exception clause to be added. That is something that would need to be discussed by Administration. Although he would want to restrict the mixing of residential and industrial zoning for future builds.

Administration will record direction from Council and revise the current draft of LUB No. 2296 accordingly before preparing a final bylaw for first reading at a future Council meeting.



Spencer had already filmed half the movie when one of the actors decided acting wasn't something they wanted to do. So another actor, Elena, was brought in to take over the role. Having to re-shoot the movie, more of us got involved. It expanded from a couple of his friends, to more of us working along side Spencer. I did a bit of acting and was a crew helper. We used my apartment to do a few of the scenes. Spencer is very talented and he wrote the music for the movie as well. I was a part of the music video that was made".

Elena Hlebnicova was born in the Sylvia Union and lives in Edmonton now. "My part in the film

was very unexpected. I was very honoured to be considered for the role as I've never done anything like that before. Spencer trusted me right away, which was a big deal to me. I never knew Spencer even existed until he sent me a text the day before. I've done some martial arts before, and wanted to be in an action movie, so I was very happy to have been given this opportunity. I have to say that Spencer is a very special guy, I think we are pretty honoured to have a guy with his talent here in Alberta. All of us other directors believe Spencer has the whole picture. He writes it, he does the script, films and edits it. Even the score for this is a really big thing. His music has tension and everything like the big screen movies. Yes, we all helped where we could but Spencer is the mastermind behind it all."

Wayne Caldwell did some of the sound and camera work. "The group has been amazing to work




"Honestly, to learn how to race and train has been a learning curve for both myself and my team. We are new to each other, but the willingness from both sides is strong," Link said.

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Alberta Municipalities President calls Bill 20 a power grab by provincial government

towns, cities, and specialized municipalities, spoke out against the provincial government's controversial Bill 20 at a virtual news conference on April 29.

Bill 20 makes sweeping changes to municipal governance and elections, with apparently very little mandate from Alberta residents, 70% of which don't want to see political parties in local elections.

The Rural Municipalities of Alberta (RMA) states they are "frustrated by many of the changes proposed in the recently announced Bill 20. Alberta's municipalities play a crucial role in ensuring that local planning, infrastructure, and service provision align with the diverse needs of Alberta's communities, residents, and industries. The changes in Bill 20 threaten municipal autonomy by granting the province greater authority to intervene, overturn local decisions, and potentially even remove elected municipal officials without adequate justification or process."

The following statement highlights ABmunis President Tyler Gandam's remarks during the association's April 29 media conference:

"Bill 20 is an attempt by the provincial government to grab more power and wield more control over how people choose to live in their own communities. If passed, the proposed legislation will fundamentally redraw the blueprint of our local democracy and alter how people's local needs are met and who represents them.

"The bill reduces the autonomy and authority of a recognized order of government – your local government. It also undermines the power of the local voter. Alberta Municipalities is concerned that the bill will intimidate and even silence legally elected officials who dare to criticize the provincial government.

"If passed, Bill 20 will allow corporations and unions to fund candidates of their choice. The bill does almost nothing to improve transparency regarding financial donations to individual candidates and the money being raised and spent by third-party advertisers. Independent candidates risk being outspent and drowned out by party candidates who enjoy the financial backing of corporations and unions.

"If the bill passes in its current form, local government elections will end up being about what influential corporations and unions want, not about what voters want. Essentially, Bill 20 puts local governments up for sale to the highest bidder. We know this doesn't sit well with Albertans, who have repeatedly said that "big money" has no place in local politics.

"Bill 20 would allow the provincial government to remove councillors and repeal bylaws it doesn't like based on backroom cabinet decisions made without public scrutiny or accountability.

The fact that cabinet decisions are confidential means that the public can never truly know why these decisions were made. Our association is speaking out about this because some of our members fear repercussions if they disagree openly with the provincial government. The possibility of a locally elected official being removed at any time, for any reason, is deeply unsettling and likely to have a "chilling effect" on councillors who might otherwise speak out against the provincial government.

"Our question to the Premier and the provincial government is: Who stands to benefit from Bill 20? We ask because local governments and most Albertans have not been calling for these changes. Time and again, Albertans have said they do not want political parties at the local level. Who is the government listening to if it isn't Albertans? We call on the provincial government to answer these questions and explain its rationale for introducing Bill 20.

"To date, the provincial government's reasons for introducing it have been flimsy. It has freely admitted that 70 per cent of Albertans don't want to see political parties in local elections. It says that 98 per cent of communities won't see it, as Calgary and Edmonton are the only places where the idea will be piloted. In truth, this "pilot project" will affect more than 2.4 million Albertans half of all Albertans.

"We've reviewed Bill 20 and we don't see how it will make local elections any more transparent, free or fair. Local government decisions are made in public. By contrast, Bill 20 would allow decisions to dismiss councillors and repeal bylaws to be made by provincial cabinet ministers in secret.

"Bill 20 is an attempt by the government to centralize, strengthen and

tighten the provincial government's hold on power. Bill 20 does not improve tne lives of Albertans, it does not build up our province, and it does not make it easier for our communities to grow in unity and harmony," stated Gandam.

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

Edson and District Public Library getting ready to reopen

We may soon be able to enjoy the newly renovated Edson and District Public Library. Trisha Thurner, with the Library, stated, "We have no set date in mind as to when we will reopen the doors at the renovated library, other than very soon. We are hoping once the Spray Park is open, we will be open."

"We have been very fortunate this year with some new board members who have been incredibly helpful in giving us the big push for the last leg of our fundraising efforts. With all the grants we were able to get, along with all the matching grants from our funders, we have been able to get this beautiful expansion fully funded and almost set to reopen," said Thurner.

There were, however, no extras available for new furnishings. "We still have furniture from the 80's, which by all means is still good and we are using a bunch of it. But with a larger area now, we will need some new furniture to fill in the new space," said Thurner.

When asked what it was like to move into a smaller area until the completion of the library renovations, Thurner said, "I believe it was the hardest on our high-needs individuals. Because the library is such a big part of the daily routine for so many individuals within our community, it was a real shock to the system."

"It was very hard for us as staff too, just coming off the end of Covid. We just got everyone's trust in coming back and letting them know we were there for them, to sorry, we now need to move into a smaller place. It was very tough."

"But the reason behind the renovation is so valid, we will have a brand new quiet space that didn't exist before. Anybody that's been at the library after school is out knows there wasn't a spare chair. It was absolutely essential for us to create a space where people could come and sit and enjoy some quiet space, and a reading space," said Thurner.

"It's also very important that we have a teen area. A teen area never existed before in the history of our library," said Thurner. "With us being so beautifully situated between the schools and across from the park, we are very much like a drop in centre. It's a safe place for everyone. We keep things rated G. When you walk in to the library, the expectation is that everyone is

welcome, and to remember it's for everyone."

"We are going to require all of our patrons, all of our regulars, to let us know what they really think about the new space. We have what the architects' believe is their idea of perfect. But of course the Edson and District Public Library is built for our communities' vision of perfection. So it is very important that everyone lets us know what they think," concluded
