"The daytime takes more volunteers and requires it to be adults, due to time of day. It's takes over a month to build and a solid week to decorate. Our volunteers average from 20 to 40 people a night. Our goal is to scare you and give you a time to have some fun; 100% free," said Barrett.

"Tom [owner] always says 'no one should have to take food out of their cupboards to attend'. This day and age with the cost of living so high, it's truly remarkable to have such a great free event for everyone to enjoy," Barrett added.

# **Evansburg RCMP respond** to a robbery in Entwistle

Evansburg, Alta. - On Oct. 30, 2024, shortly after midnight, Evansburg RCMP responded to a complaint of a female with a machete and an attempted carjacking at the Pembina ESSO in Entwistle Alta. Upon arrival, officers located a male victim who had sustained a non-life threating laceration to his arm.

The investigation determined that the female suspect broke his window, and struck him with the machete as she demanded his vehicle. Attending officers quickly scene. RCMP members were able to de-escalate the situation, and safely arrest the female suspect without

incident.

A 25-year-old female has been charged with the following: Robbery; Assault with a weapon; Mischief under \$5000; Possession of a weapon dangerous to the public; Obstruct peace officer.

The suspect was brought before a Justice of the Peace and after a judicial interim hearing, and was remanded into custody. Her next court appearance is set for Nov. 1, 2024, at the Alberta Court of Justice in Ponoka.

*NOTE: A charge should not be* considered as evidence of guilt. In Canada, all persons are considered innocent until proven guilty in a court of law.





# **Edson Animal Rescue Society hosts 8th Annual Haunted Forest**

The Edson Animal Rescue Society (EARS) held their 8th Annual Haunted Forest fundraiser from October 24 – 26. The event has become a community staple over the years, with hundreds of guests taking part.

The fundraiser ran nightly from 6pm-9pm, and those guests looking for a less spooky experience could attend the Little Goblin Glow in the Dark Night on Thursday or come between the hours of 6pm-7pm on Friday and Saturday night.

Upon turning down Township Road 535 in Yellowhead County, attendees were greeted by volunteers who assisted with finding parking spots and watched out for those walking to and from their vehicles. Dozens of vehicles lined the road at any given time.

Arriving at the event grounds, guests stood in line to enter the Haunted Forest, which was adorned with a "Welcome Town of d'Edson" sign. Attendees were asked for a minimum donation of \$2 per person to enter, and could enter a raffle draw if they were dressed in costume. Guests could also purchase glow sticks before going into the Haunted Forest.

The decorations throughout the Haunted Forest walk were spectacular, with many themed areas like the d'Edson Pharmacy or the d'Edson Jail. Live scarers added to the fun, often showing up when you least expected it and making people jump and scream.

After the walk through the Forest, guests could enjoy treats by minimum donation, including popcorn, hot chocolate, pop, delicious bake sale items, and more. The first two nights of the Haunted Forest were so busy that EARS had to put out a call to local bakers asking for more treats to sell.

The event was manned by all sorts of volunteers, including some from Alberta Wildfire who handled the snack area. Other volunteers throughout the night included EARS members, the Edson Youth Council, and other animal enthusiasts who wanted to help out.

Other frights and delights that guests could participate in after walking through the Forest included spooky outdoor movies, glitter tattoos, an Adopt a Stuffie section, and toddler games.

# Pinedale Hall celebrates with Fall Harvest Supper and Dance

The Pinedale Hall celebrated the turning of the seasons with the annual Fall Harvest Supper and Dance on October 26.

The event featured a supper, a dessert auction, and a live music dance. Tickets were \$35 per person, with doors opening at 6pm.

The event started off with a traditional harvest supper. This year its was buffet style perogies with cabbage rolls, roast beef, and ham. This was followed by dessert, which was a choice between pumpkin pie and berry cake.

After supper, they moved on to the dessert auction. This year they raised \$3,175 for the upkeep of the hall. The event ended with live music and dancing. "We hosted around 110 people and the dance floor was full all night," said President of Pinedale Agricultural Association and event organizer, Sharon Hagen.

This year the Harvest Supper and Dance was completely sold-out within four days of being announced. "The event was fabulous with so much support and attendance," added Hagen. "We have an amazing support group that keeps our little hall going. It wouldn't be successful without the many volunteers that it takes to put on these events. We wouldn't be able to

keep the doors open if we didn't have such amazing volunteers."

The Fall Harvest Supper and Dance is an annual event that has been taking place for over 20 years. It serves as a fundraiser for the hall and a way to celebrate the community. This year it was especially necessary, since the hall had to fully replace the well this fall.

"We found out our water well had failed and both Craig Waterwell & Drilling Ltd and Iron Full Metal Drilling Inc did an amazing job of getting us a new well drilled and tied in before the function. We are so thankful for all the support the community provides," said Hagen. The next major renovation planned is a remodel of the kitchen, which has remained basically unchanged since the 1980's.

The Pinedale Hall hosts two major fundraisers during the year: the Harvest Supper and Dance and the Valentine's Day Supper and Dance. They also host multiple smaller events throughout the year.

"We host a Christmas Bazaar,
Annual Spring Garage Sale, and
during the fall/winter we host a family
fun Bingo. Our hall is available for
rent and we are always open to how
we can support youth and non-profit
groups. We are always looking for
people to come out to volunteer or
join in," said Hagen.

# Occupational Therapists help with performing everyday activities

World Occupational Therapy Day took place on October 27 this year. Many local residents rely on an Occupational Therapist (OT) to help them perform everyday activities, especially after experiencing physical, mental, or emotional challenges.

OT's can help with performing activities like getting dressed, eating, moving around the house, being productive, going to work or school, participating in the community, and taking part in sports, gardening, or social activities.

Anna Vander Haeghe is an Occupational Therapist here in Edson. "Occupational Therapy focuses on helping people participate in activities they want so they can be as successful as they desire. We mix science and creative people-centered practices to help them achieve their goals. OT is always adapting, always adjusting, always learning because we work with people who are all unique. Therapy can be done in any environment to help target their goals."

Occupational therapy helps individuals live their best life at home, at work, and everywhere else. It's about being able to do the things you want and have to do.

If you think occupational therapy could help you or someone you know, you could start by asking your doctor about referrals to a specialist. Talk to the school nurse or guidance counsellor. They might be able to base their recommendations on your child's academic or social needs.

# Día de Muertos: Mexico's Day of the Dead

Once again, I have the honour to be in Mexico to celebrate the Day of the Dead. Authentic Mexican culture is a fantastic time of the year to visit Mexico and see the country come to life. Day of the Dead (Día de Muertos) is one of the most important celebrations in Mexico, dating back thousands of years.

Traditions connected with the holiday include honouring the deceased using calaveras and marigold flowers known as cempazúchitl, building home altars called ofrendas with the favourite foods and beverages of the departed, and visiting graves with these items as gifts for the deceased. Many will set these gifts up in their homes or at their place of work to honour their loved ones.

Facing the fact that death is real, and that although their loved ones are no longer with them, they can remember them and celebrate the life they once had. Families gather together, dressed in elaborate costumes, share home cooked food, and commemorate their deceased loved ones.

Faces are painted in bright colors to represent 'Una Calavera' a Mexican skull woman. Traditional music is played. Each family will have their own version of this special day complete with family traditions, altar displays, and recipes. At the end of the day families conclude their celebrations at the local cemetery where they leave offerings to honour their ancestors.

Every nationality has their own special traditions and it is nice to learn from each other and be accepting of one another. What I enjoy the

most about our travels is getting out and experiencing the culture and see how the people of the area really live; not just seeing the tourists attractions.

There is a movie available if you have not already watched it, called Coco. The movie takes place on Día de Muertos. It is all about understanding the importance of family, the need for forgiveness and compromise, and remembering your family and those who came before you.

The experience of death and grief transcends all races, religions, and cultures. Watching this movie with your children may just open a door to talking about these important issues.







Students learned about the teenager who challenged himself to run across Canada to raise awareness and funds for cancer research.



The Canadian Forestry Corps urgently needed labour to support forestry operations in the Jura Mountains in southeast France. The No. 2 Construction Batallion arrived on May 21, 1917 and immediately began operations.

Lumber was essential for the war effort, used for the sides of trenches, duckboards, artillery gun platforms, railway ties, ammunition boxes, accommodation huts, and bridges. "The work of No. 2 Construction Company allowed the mills to produce more than twice as much lumber as mills that did not have this support," states the Canadian Encyclopedia. "The men of No. 2 Construction Battalion showed the dedication of Black communities across Canada towards their country."







# Remembering the loss: Corporal Raymond Arndt

As we take time to recognize Remembrance Day on November 11, remember to take a few minutes to recall those who served and fought for our country.

Many lives were tragically lost, and those who came back were left with the impacts of experiencing such devastation firsthand. The two minutes of silence helps us to remember those who have passed, as well as thank our surviving veterans, and current service members.

Corporal Raymond Arndt, who grew up in the Peers and Edson area, was killed while proudly serving our country in Afghanistan.

On August 5, 2006. Master Corporal Raymond Arndt, aged 31 at the time, was a reservist with Royal Edmonton Regiment based in Edmonton. He was killed in a head-on collision involving a large cargo truck and the G-wagon he was riding

The incident occurred during a re-supply convoy delivering medical supplies to the Canadian Forward Operating Base at Spin Boldak, on the Afghan-Pakistan border, about 35 kilometres

southeast of Kandahar.

Master Corporal Raymond Arndt was a very good soldier according to his relatives. He was very dedicated, hardworking, and he loved to smile and tell jokes.

Walter Arndt, Raymond's father in Edson, said, "A loss like this hits us all hard. He was a loving husband, son, brother, uncle, and friend. Ray had a love for life and for his family, and had a wonderful sense of humour. Ray was proud of who he was and of the work he was doing in Afghanistan."

"Raymond was known in many different ways and to so many people. He was described as an incredible friend, very generous, fun, outgoing and charismatic, logical, and loud. He had a wonderful way of making a person feel like the most important person in the world. Raymond was born in Hinton and grew up in Peers. He attended all his schooling in Edson. At a young age Raymond had a love for the army and was a member of the Edson Cadets for a number of years," says Walter.

# Misguided fertilizer cap threatens The Weekly ANCHOR Canada's carbon-smart farmers

Fertilizer cap won't curb climate change but will cripple Canadian agriculture

The fall harvest is in the storehouse, and it's time to put away all proposals to cap fertilizer use in the name of saving the planet.

The Saskatoon-based Global Institute for Food Security (GIFS) conducted a comprehensive analysis of carbon emissions across Saskatchewan, Western Canada, Canada, and among international peers. Its study examined emissions from transportation, seed production, fertilizer and manure use, crop inputs, field activities, energy consumption, and post-harvest processes.

The studies, published last year, had very reassuring results. Canadian crop production was less carbon intensive than other places, and Western Canada was a little better yet. This proved true crop by crop.

In other words, Canadian farmers are focused on ensuring food security, not causing the droughts, fires, or storms that critics unfairly blame on them.

Carbon emissions per tonne of canola production were more than twice as high in France and Germany as in Canada. Australia was slightly less carbon intensive than Canada but still trailed Western Canada.

For non-durum wheat, Canada blew Australia,

France, Germany, and the U.S. away with roughly half the carbon intensity of those countries. The U.S. had twice the carbon intensity for durum wheat as Canada, and Italy almost five times as much.

Canada performed exceptionally well in lentil production. Australian producers had 5.5 times the carbon emissions per tonne compared to Canada, while U.S. producers had eight times as much. In some parts of Canada, lentil production even acted as a net carbon sink, absorbing more carbon than it emitted.

Canadian field peas produce onetenth of the carbon emissions per tonne as found in Germany and one-sixth that of France or the United States.

According to GIFS, Canada excels in agriculture through practices such as "regenerative agriculture, including minimal soil disturbance, robust crop rotation, covering the land, integrating livestock and the effective management of crop inputs."

The adoption of zero-till farming is especially important. Zero-till farming is an agricultural practice where the soil is left undisturbed by avoiding plowing or tilling, which helps retain nutrients, moisture, and greenhouse gases in the soil.

Western Canada has been especially keen to adopt the zerotill approach, unlike the United States, where only 30 percent of cropland is zero-till.

The adoption of optimal methods has already reduced Canadian carbon emissions substantially. Despite this progress, some net zero advocates are pushing to reduce carbon emissions from fertilizer use by 30 percent, similar to cuts being proposed in other sectors.

This target is unfair to Canadian agriculture, as the industry has already made significant progress in reducing emissions. Nitrates are essential for crop growth, so farmers are already highly motivated to keep them in the soil

rather than losing them to the atmosphere, regardless of concerns about global warming. Fewer nitrates would lead to lower yields and decreased protein content in crops.


Farmers are already motivated by their personal and economic interests to use fertilizer as efficiently as possible. While universal adoption of optimal techniques might reduce emissions slightly, Canada is so far ahead in this game that a hard cap on fertilizer emissions could only be detrimental.

In 2021, Fertilizer Canada commissioned a study by MNP to estimate the costs of a 20 percent drop in fertilizer use to achieve a 30 percent reduction in emissions. The study suggested that by 2030, bushels of production per acre would drop significantly for canola (23.6), corn (67.9), and spring wheat (36.1). By 2030, the annual value of lost production for those crops alone would reach \$10.4 billion.

If every animal and human in Canada died, leaving the country an unused wasteland, the drop in world greenhouse gas emissions would be only 1.4 percent. Any talk of reducing capping fertilizer inputs for the greater good is nonsense.
