tion process in August of 2023. During the renovations the library was able to move to a temporary location along 2nd Ave provided by Cenovus Energy. On June 11 of 2024 the library officially closed the temporary location and began the process of moving back to the newly renovated location. They then soft opened to the public on August 16.

"It's really a community hub," said Edson Mayor Kevin Zahara. "That's one of council's strategic goals, being a connected community. We are very proud to support this project. We are very thankful for the folks that have contributed to this project, and on behalf of council, I congratulate everyone involved." Mayor Zahara along with other council members presented the library board with a plaque commemorating the achievement.

"The newly renovated facility begins an exciting new chapter for the community, and all Edson and Yellowhead County residents will use the library, said Yellowhead County Mayor Wade Williams. "Congratulations on achieving a functional, welcoming, and adaptable library for the evolving needs or our diverse communities."

Local MP Gerald Soroka presented a plaque to the library board. He also voiced his support for the project and praised the renovation and how it will serve the community. "That's the whole purpose of this building; to enhance the community. That's the big improvement that we should all be looking at —and from what I've seen, it's very spectacular."

West Yellowhead MLA Martin Long also said a few words praising the renovations and all the hard work that went into it.

The renovation project was a labour of love for many, including the library board and staff. Thought the process the group constantly fundraised to achieve the goals for the new space. "We're fortunate to live in a community that is full of many caring people. When the library board began our furniture, shelving, and equipment campaign we had no idea what to expect. What we discovered was a community of individuals, groups, and companies whose kindness continues to amaze us," said Shelia Buckle, Library board member and renovation project coordinator.

The Library has entered into a sponsorship with Peyto Exploration and Development Corp. The new official name for the location is the Edson and District Public Library, presented by Peyto.

County unveils community resilience murals

Yellowhead County welcomed people to the Wildwood Community Hall on October 17, for the official unveiling of the community murals.

From 4pm to 6pm people came and check out the finished piece, while also enjoying a free barbecue supper. Visitors could also enter draws, submit a name for the mural, and collect a free colouring book.

The community murals have been a work in progress since May of this year. Each one was painted with help from members of the community. Yellowhead County was present at different community events, or set up their own Paint Party events, so people of all ages could paint a part of the mural. It was achieved in a 'paint by numbers' style where each participant could fill as many parts as they wanted. In total, over 300 people from the various communities worked on the murals.

There are eight murals that combine into one large picture. This event was the first and only time that all the pieces were displayed as a whole. "We wanted to show off the size and scope of this project so people can appreciate the murals before they go to their forever homes," said Maddison Sharman, Heritage Coordinator with Yellowhead County.

The individual murals will be displayed in the different participating hamlets at the following locations: Wildwood's mural will be displayed on the Ag Complex, Evansburg's will be on the arena, and Niton's, Peers' Cadomin's, Robb's, Marlboro's, and Brule's will be on or near their community halls.

Each piece commemorates the different hamlets throughout the county with details specific to that place. "The murals, showcasing the diversity, beauty, and resiliency of each community, were designed with suggestions from the public and Yellowhead County staff," added Sharman.

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complete the murals will be set up in each location. The finished murals will be coated with a UV protective and anti graffiti coating, which will keep them colourful and detailed for at least the next 10 years. Detailed prints of the combined mural will be on display in the Yellowhead County offices in Edson and Wildwood.

The mural is actually only the first step in a larger project called 'Rise Together: a story of Community and Resilience.' The project will focus on stories from the 2023 wildfire season, and all that the area went though in that time. The murals were the first part of the project completed due to their size and purpose. "The murals are really the highlight of the project since it's celebrating all the great things about our communities. Not focusing on the negatives and not defined by tragedy —there's so much more here," said Sharman.

The project itself consists of seven parts. The other parts include a collection of extended oral histories from 25 different members of the community. These individuals all have dynamic stories from the 2023 wildfires/floods. They also will collect other stories throughout the community. These stories will be compiled into a book, and an exhibit commemorating the resiliency of the communities. On top of that, the county is commissioning local artists from each division to create one of a kind works about what their community went through. These pictures will be brought together as part of a traveling display.

Most of this project is already in progress. The County is currently collecting the short stories about the fires/floods, which will also be included in the book and exhibit. If you have a story or photos about resiliency from that time, you can send them to the County to be reviewed for the project. Just email them to:

Red Brick hosts mini-bazaar due to recent flooding

The Red Brick Arts Centre and Museum held their annual Harvest Bazaar on Saturday, October 19.

From 10 am to 3pm, people could stop by and peruse a selection of canned goods and handicrafts up for purchase. All proceeds go right back to the Red Brick through it governing organization, the Edson Cultural Heritage Organization (ECHO).

Every year the Red Brick hosts several major fundraisers. The Harvest Bazaar is one of these fundraisers, and has been put on for over 20 years. "We like to think of our Bazaar as a fundraiser for the Red Brick as well as an event for community members to enjoy," said Bobbi-Dawn Dreder, Manager at the Red Brick.

However, this year the Harvest Bazaar was smaller in scope due to unforeseen circumstances. This past August, the Red Brick experienced flooding in all its downstairs rooms. Any organizations that used that space were forced to move up in the building, limiting the space available for events like the Harvest Bazaar. "We typically host vendors and we used to host a lunch (last year Pioneer Cabin held the lunch). This year with it being a minibazaar it was much smaller," Said Dreder.

"We were fortunate to be able to get some of our canning done prior to the flood so we did have salsa, hot dog relish, jams, jellies, and antipasto. The board members generously did canning from home to donate," added Dreder.

The entire Bazaar was set up in the gallery area on the museum. Being a mini-bazaar meant that there was less of a crowd than usual, but overall the event was still successful. "While we weren't as busy as prior years we fully expected that without vendor tables and lunch that it would be a bit slower. We are still very appreciative to those who took the time to come by. We all had a great day and enjoyed seeing everyone who stopped in," said Dreder.

Due to the flooding, the Red Brick's other major fundraiser, The Festival of Trees, will also be slightly different this year. "This year we will be hosting our 19th Annual Festival of Trees online due to limited space. We hope that our renovations will be completed by the end of January and we can get back to normal operations," concluded Dreder.

· Face paint allows for better visibility than a mask and reduces the risk of obstructing your child's vision.

· Only visit homes that are welllit and welcoming to trick-ortreaters, and avoid houses that are dark or have no decorations.

· Remind your kids to look both ways before crossing the street and to use sidewalks whenever possible. If there are no sidewalks, walk facing traffic.

· Always supervise young children while trick-or-treating, and consider going in groups for added safety.

Edson Eagles off to a strong season start

The Edson Eagles, our community's Junior A hockey team, is off to a great start through the first eight games of the season, with wins against each of the teams they've played thus far.

The Eagles started the season with a 7-1 win over the High Prairie Red Wings on September 28, followed by a 5-3 win against the Northern Alberta Lightning.

Game three presented a close match up against the Lightning once again, with the Eagles coming out ahead with a 6-4 win on October 4. The team followed that up with a dominating 9-0 win against the Pioneers at the Redwater Arena on October 5.

The Eagles took on the Lac La Biche Lakers on October 11, winning that game 15-3, before playing their closest matchup of the season so far on October 13 against the High Prairie Red Wings. The game against the Red Wings went to overtime, where #87 Andras Kehl scored his third of the night off an assist from #8 Landy Johnson to secure the win for the Eagles.

The Eagles' most recent wins came in a set of back-to-back games against the Northern Alberta Lightning, with an 11-2 win on October 18 and a 7-2 win on October 19.

Don Chase, who is also Assistant GM, took over

the role of Head Coach this season from former Head Coach and current GM Ryder Prue.

"Our team has bonded together well and our veteran players have come together and made it a lot easier for the rookie players that are in the lineup," Chase said, naming Andras Kehl, Austin Berezowski, and Mason Buzzell as some players who have stepped up to make that happen. "It made it easier to get the game together and bond, both on the ice and off."

Chase is happy with their season so far but continues to look towards the future. "It's eight games in but so far I'd say I'm happy with what we've done in the short period of time we've played," he said. "We still have a lot to work on. We've kind of gelled quickly, but still got a lot of work ahead of us to improve."

Goals for the season include continuing to get out and make a difference in the community and, of course, to win. "The big goal is to win it all," said Chase. "I know that this team has had some pretty good years, but the endings haven't been exactly what they want. My goal is to bring home the Cup."

The Eagles now enjoy an earlier puck drop of 7:45pm on game nights, and they have a great home schedule this year for their fans to come out and enjoy, which can be found at www.edsoneagles.com or on their social media page.

Their next home game will be Saturday, October 26 at the Edson & District Leisure Centre in what is sure to be a fun matchup against the High Prairie Red Wings.

Then, on Friday November 1, the Eagles will be hosting the Crowsnest Pass Crush for a great night of hockey as well as a Costume Contest to celebrate Halloween. The event promises to be "an unforgettable evening filled with fun, costumes, and hockey!"

Fans are asked to come dressed in their best costume for a chance to be featured on Eagles social media, where fans online will be able to vote for their favourite costumes. School Bus Sofery Est Be Clever, Dress for the Weather

School Bus Safety Week across Alberta is an opportunity for everyone who rides a school bus, or knows someone who rides a school bus, to join forces in highlighting the importance of school bus safety. This year's theme is Bus Rule - Be Clever, Dress for the Weather.

The GYPSD reminds everyone that as we received our first snowfalls, it is a perfect reminder to be extra cautious around flashing yellow lights as buses navigate the conditions so everyone gets to school and back home safely!

Bus Stop Safety Tips for Drivers

- Be prepared to stop when a slowing school bus has its lights flashing.
- Stop at least 20 feet away from a stopped school bus that has its lights flashing.
- Avoid distracted driving (cell phone use, eating, grooming, etc.) especially during the times when school buses are making stops for student pick-ups and drop-offs.
- Watch and be alert for children waiting at their bus stops especially since it can be dark during pick-up and drop-off.
- Look for clues-such as safety patrols, crossing guards, bicycles, and playgrounds that indicate children might be in the area.
- Watch for children between parked cars and other objects.
- Follow the speed limits and slow down in or near school and residential areas.
- Parents driving children to the bus stop, please do not release children into streets/traffic and have them run to the bus.

Safety Tips When Getting On the Bus

Remind your child to:

"A flood in August impacted the entire downstairs of the Red Brick which resulted in damage to the building and loss of a large number of items that were being used to support these programs," said Vander Haeghe. "This donation is going to be directly used to replace the specialized items, furniture, and

materials that children, youth, and families use. This includes sensory rich items such as a squeeze machine, light towers, crash mats, weighted products, special tables, and program materials as well as furniture for the space including tables, book cases, pillows, carpets and much more. At this time, much of our remaining materials are in storage due to lack of space."

"We are looking forward to moving back into the lower level of the Red Brick following repairs which is estimated to be February 2025. Thanks to this amazing community support, the LEAP Society will be able to replace everything that was destroyed by the flood," said Vander Haeghe. "We would also like to extend a big thank you to ECHO Society, Edson Mennonite Church, Town of Edson Programs and Edson Public Library for their ongoing support by providing us space to allow us to continue running at this time."

100 Women Who Care members in good standing may nominate a local organization (charity, non-profit, or service group) by completing the nomination form at least one week prior to the next meeting. If an organization's name is drawn at the meeting, the nominating member will give a short fiveminute 'pitch' to the membership.

This is followed by a five-minute Q & A. If an organization is nominated or presents at a meeting, but is not chosen, it can be nominated again at a future meeting. The organization selected to receive a donation at a meeting, is not eligible for reconsideration for twelve months.



YHC Council appoints Deputy Mayor, board members

Annually, Yellowhead County Council holds an organizational meeting to determine the Deputy Mayor for the term, appoint Council members and members-at-large to boards, and schedule meeting dates for the following year.

At their October 22 Organizational Meeting, Council first voted to elect Councillor Brigitte Lemieux as Deputy Mayor for the term of November 1, 2024 to October 29, 2025. The Deputy Mayor acts as Mayor in the event that the Mayor is absent or unable to perform his mayoral duties.

Lemieux, who was also the Deputy Mayor for the past one-year term, noted that it was a "pleasure to accept the nomination."

In planning their next year of meetings, Council opted to remain with their same schedule of regular Council meetings held twice a month on the second and fourth Tuesdays, and a Governance & Priorities Committee meeting held once a month on the third Tuesday. All meetings start at 9:30 AM at the Yellowhead County Administration Building in Edson.

The agreed upon schedule of meetings also included variances for Christmas, RMA in March, a lighter summer schedule, and a cancellation of all regular and GPC meetings in October 2025 due to the upcoming election.

Regular Council meeting dates are as follows: 2024 – November 12, November 26, December 10. 2025 – January 14, January 28, February 11, February 25, March 11, March 25, April 8, April 22, May 13, May 27, June 24, July 22, August 26, September 9, September 23.

GPC meeting dates are as follows: 2024 -November 19, December 17. 2025 – January 21, February 18, April 15, May 20, June 17, July 15, August 19, September 16.

The County's next Organizational Meeting will be held on October 29, 2025, after the election has concluded.

When it came time to consider Council appointments to boards, Council opted to "stay status quo for the remainder of the year." "At this point in time we don't have any other boards to appoint Council to, so if anything does come up in the future we can deal with it at that time," Mayor Wade Williams noted.

Finally, Council was asked to appoint Membersat-Large to County boards/committees that have vacancies due to resignation or current terms

ending by December 31 of the current year.

Members-at-Large are typically appointed for a three (3) year term unless provided otherwise in the Committee Terms of Reference, Bylaw or Legislation.

Council had the following vacancies or expiring terms requiring members-at-large appointments:

- Agricultural Services Appeal Board - requires 4 Members-at-Large, 1 year term January 1 -December 31, 2025.

- Agricultural Services Board (ASB) - requires 3 Members-at-Large.

- Family and Community Support Services (FCSS) - requires 6 Members-at-Large (including 1 Parkland County Resident).

- Heritage Board - requires 4 Members-at-Large.

- Library Board - requires 1 Member-at-Large. - Recreation Board - requires 7 Members-at-Large.

- Subdivision and Development Appeal Board (SDAB) - requires 1 Member-at-Large, for a 1year partial Term, ending October 31, 2025, due to a resignation.

Following Closed Session discussion regarding the applicants, under the requirements of the Freedom of Information and Privacy Act, Council voted to appoint the following Members-at-Large:

Bowman, Robert Mitchell, and Jo-Ann Sobon FCSS Board: Jane Henry, Lynette Nienaber,

Heritage Board: Colleen Talpash, Jack Williams, Stephen Parker, and Randy Breeuwsma

Library Board: Linda Dickson

Recreation Board: Amanda Tangedal, Lois Haggart, Lori Johnstone-Stang, Shelley Byrne, Heather Hawkins, Faye Saunders, and Alex Donkin

SDAB: Robert Kosterman and Jo-Ann Soban. While it was originally referenced that only one appointment was required for this board, "Council decided to remove one member from the [SDAB] board, so now we have two new members," said Councillor Patrick Soroka.
